#### **Crafting Volunteers from the Village**



Joanne Milczakowski, Janet Hughes, and Dorthea Turek go weekly to the Little Purls group at the Grasonville Senior Center to participate in a knitting, crocheting, and sewing group. These "Villagers" help make handcrafted articles for charity. The group, run by Sue Thompson, meets Fridays at 1 p.m. Sue then sends the crafts to charities in this area and around the country. The charities include Head Huggers,

which provides caps to hospitals for people who have undergone hair loss, and Miracles Happen which sends baby clothes and blankets to maternity homes and pregnancy treatment centers. Pregnancy Crisis Centers in Easton and Cambridge, Project Gabriel, and St. Anne's in Hyattsville are some of the recipients of these handmade items.

Sue also runs several additional groups including one at the Kent Island Senior Center and another at the women's prison in Jessup where she teaches knitting and crocheting. Her goals are listed on her two websites-- HeadHuggers.org and Miracleshappen.us. Her website also includes patterns for her hats, baby blankets, and baby clothes. # House Tour



We were amazed to learn of all that we can take advantage of including transportation to doctor appointments for those who are not able to drive and a county ride bus for transportation to the Senior Center for activities and meals. There is tax preparation for Seniors at no charge and advice on the many aspects of the Health Care maze. There is also a nursing aide assistance program for those who need regular help with daily activities but who do not need nursing home care. #### Michael Cogan's Update on Emergency Medical Services Issues

Following a residents' meeting several months ago, a number of us have been working on the issue of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) from the perspective of Symphony Village needs and interests. The EMS Issues Group has worked to learn the organizations, people, and issues involving EMS in Centreville and Queen Anne's County.

As part of this process, we recently set up a meeting with the Centreville Town Manager to discuss the town budget. Though unplanned as an EMS meeting, the meeting became a broad discussion of EMS, and was attended by Eric Wargotz, President of the Queen Anne's County Board of Commissioners; and Mary Robey, member of the Centreville Town Council.

One outcome of the meeting was the recognition that we, as a community, are at a decision point. The county – led by Commissioner Wargotz – is working to assume responsibility for, and control of, all EMS services. [Note: this does not include fire services.] Currently, EMS (and fire services) are not under county control; they are primarily controlled by the various volunteer fire companies located throughout the county. We must decide whether to place our support behind the centralized county concept, or the decentralized volunteer company concept and publicly express that support.

Updates from the EMS Issues Group meeting in March will be included in the next Libretto.

### Helpful Hints from George Drake:

Since the information on the SV Online Calendar is changed periodically, it is posted online in a timely manner. Thus, it is best to view the calendar online periodically as opposed to printing it out the first of the month and finding out around the 15th that events have changed.

To view the SV Online Calendar:

Type in the Internet Address: http://calendar.yahoo.com/svbcc\_calendar (that's an underscore after the abbreviation "svbcc"), then press Enter. It's a good idea to then add this "page" to your **Favorites (or Bookmarks)** as follows so that you can readily access the calendar from your Favorites (these are instructions for users of Internet Explorer –other software is similar):

- 1. Enter the address above at the Address line of Internet Explorer and make sure the calendar comes up on your monitor. Then, go to step 2 immediately.
- 2. Select (click) Favorites (Bookmarks) > Add to Favorites, then click OK.
- 3. To view the SV Calendar at another time, just click Favorites > Yahoo! Calendar ....

To access the Directory and the Libretto:

Type in the Internet Address: <u>http://villagehoa.org</u>, then press Enter. Add this to your **Favorites** (**Bookmarks**) as you did the Calendar. From here you can click on the Calendar or Secured Documents (Directory, Minutes, *Libretto*). It will call for the user ID and Password which you can get from Jan at the Clubhouse or from the directions given you when you were welcomed to Symphony Village.

#### **Recognizing a Stroke**

#### The 3 steps are **S.T.R.** - Read and Learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the

symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

**S** is **SMILE** - Ask them to **SMILE**.

T is TALK - Ask the person to TALK: to SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE coherently such as, "It is sunny out today)."

**R** is for **RAISE** - Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

NOTE: Another sign of a stroke is this: Ask the person to stick out his or her tongue. If the tongue is crooked or if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke. If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

## FROM THE KITCHEN OF.... Brenda Stoltz

### "Kugel with Raisins"

(Delicious and easy to make)



This is a traditional noodle dish served at Jewish holidays. Variations include: Apple Kugel, Apricot Kugel, and Cheesy Potato Kugel.

12 oz. medium egg noodles (Matzo Farfel can be substituted.)

6 eggs, beaten 1/2 cup raisins

2 Tablespoons ground cinnamon

1 cup white Sugar

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 Tablespoons melted butter
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. Grease an 8 x 8 inch baking dish.
- Prepare pasta according to package directions -- drain -- rinse and drain again. 3.
- Add beaten eggs to egg noodles in large mixing bowl. Let stand 5 minutes. 4.
- Stir in raisins, salt, sugar, cinnamon, and butter. 5.
- Transfer mixture to prepared baking dish. 6.
- 7. Bake at 350 degrees F for 50 to 60 minutes.

#### FRANK OGENS SYMPHONY VILLAGE CANDIDATE FOR CENTREVILLE TOWN COUNCIL By Valerie Siegel

Frank Ogens has accepted the community's invitation to run for a seat on the Centreville Town Council. The election will be held at the Fire House (not the Town Hall, as in previous years) on Monday, April 2, 2007. Polls are open from noon until 8 p.m.



Frank has been on the Eastern Shore since enrolling at Washington College almost 40 years ago. He has lived in Queen Anne's County for 29 years, and has taught Law and Economics at Kent County High School for ten years.

Frank has more than 20 years' experience in the corporate arena including management of \$20 million in accounts for Ross Laboratories. He was also an entrepreneur for four years as owner/operator of Skip Jack Camera Supply on Kent Island. His experience and education help qualify him to effectively address many of the key issues facing 21<sup>st</sup> century Centreville.

These issues include EMS Service, which is as important to the younger population of Centreville as it is to those of us in Symphony Village. Fifty percent of the population of Centreville is 25-65 years of age. Children need reliable and available emergency medical services as much as older adults. A budget review is also in order to determine whether Centreville's expenses are in line with other towns of similar size and demographics. In this connection, taxes should be reviewed as well, especially in light of the growing tax base.

Another area of major concern is managed growth. Specifically, what can we do to improve restaurants, shopping, and services in our town? Are there block grants available to give downtown a face lift? What can be done about parking to support our merchants? Frank wants to explore these and other ways to promote our beautiful little town and keep our dollars here.

Frank's willingness to serve on the Centreville Town Council gives Symphony Village a political voice in our town for the first time. If you are registered to vote in the State of Maryland, you can vote in the city election on April 2. If you changed your registration through MVA, it would be a good idea to call 410-758-0832 to make certain your registration was recorded with the Queen Anne's County Board of Elections.

If you need to cast an absentee ballot, applications are available at the Clubhouse. Campaign Treasurer, Nick Barbalace, will pick up your application, deliver it to the Board of Elections, and pick up your absentee ballot for you, so feel free to call him at 443-786-4789.

Nick is also accepting campaign contributions made payable to him and noted in the memo "For Frank Ogens' Campaign." If you would like to participate in the Symphony Village campaign to have Frank Ogens be our voice on the Centreville Town Council, contact Cyndy Bourke, Mike Cogan, or Jack Dedrick. There are 2800 people in Centreville, so there is plenty of work to be done!

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
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
