## Taxes

Many of us in the community have been concerned about rising taxes and, by extension, the government budgets fueled by those taxes. Recent emails circulating among residents attributed a significant tax hike to county council action and initiated a small explosion of citizen anger. A number of residents complained directly to county officials. Both Council President Eric Wargotz and Councilman Gene Ransom responded to those concerns. They stated that they did not enact a significant tax hike and they noted actually cut the county property tax rate to ameliorate the substantial state increase. They specifically disputed the numbers that were quoted to them from the emails.

Most importantly, though, both Mr. Wargotz and Mr. Ransom have offered to come to Symphony Village and meet with us to discuss tax, budget, and delivery of service issues. The ballroom of the clubhouse has been requested, and it appears that request will be approved. The date has yet to be established, but the event will be held in the evening. I encourage everyone who has an interest in these issues--and we all do--to attend this forum.

### **RECIPE FROM THE KITCHEN OF...Marlene Tennier**

#### Antipasto



#### Ingredients:

- 2 (8-ounce) cans refrigerated crescent rolls, divided
- ¼ pound imported ham, sliced
- ¼ pound Genoa salami sliced
- ¼ pound large pepperoni slices
- 3 large eggs
- 3 tablespoons grated Romano cheese
- ¼ pound provolone cheese, sliced
- ¼ pound Swiss cheese, sliced
- 1 (12 ounce) jar roasted sweet red peppers
- Ground black pepper to taste

#### Directions:

- Spread 1 can crescent roll dough on the bottom of a 9x13x2-inch pan lightly coated with vegetable cooking spray. Layer ham and next 4 ingredients over dough. Top with red peppers.
- Whisk together eggs, black pepper, and Roman cheese; pour over peppers. Top with remaining can crescent roll dough. Cover with aluminum foil.
- Bake at 350° for 25 minutes. Uncover and bake 10 more minutes or until center is set and top is lightly browned.
- Cut into squares and serve warm or at room temperature.
- Serves 4-6

## FEATURE ARTICLE OF THE MONTH

### THE TURKEY VULTURE

I wanted to write about a bird all of us in Symphony Village would recognize. The Turkey Vulture (*Cathartes aura*) is the most common vulture in the Americas, and I'm sure you have seen them soaring on the shifting currents of air above our community. Turkey Vultures hold their wings in a V-shape and often rock from side to side in flight, flapping their wings infrequently. The tail extends beyond legs and feet in flight. The flight style, small-headed silhouette, and under wing light-dark pattern make these vultures easy to identify at a distance. The vulture's bald red head, an adaptation to reduce feather fouling, makes it easy to ID up close.

An adult Turkey Vulture reaches a body length of 24-32 inches with a wing span of 6 feet and can weigh 3-5 pounds. The body feathers are brown-black with the flight feathers on the wings appearing silvery-gray beneath. The bill is relatively short, hooked, and ivory in color. An immature bird has a gray head and a black beak tip. Because they have no vocal organs, vultures are mostly mute, making *hissing* sounds when they feel threatened. Hungry young can be heard making *grunting* sounds.

Although there is no actual nesting construction, the Turkey Vulture's nesting site is in a protected location--on a cliff, inside a hollow tree, or on the ground inside an animal burrow. One to three cream-colored eggs with brown spots at the larger end are laid. Both parents incubate, and the young hatch in about 40 days. The chicks are fed regurgitated food by both adults and they fledge in 10-11 weeks.



Turkey Vultures soar over open areas looking for carrion, their preferred food source. Their sophisticated immune system protects them from disease associated with decaying animals. Unlike most birds who use sight to locate food, Turkey Vultures can also use their keen sense of smell. In addition to dead animals, vultures feed on plant matter, shoreline vegetation, pumpkin and other crops, live insects, and other invertebrates. Look for Turkey Vultures along roadsides cleaning up road kill or near the water feasting on washed-up fish.

On a personal note, besides seeing Turkey Vultures soaring almost daily, I have also seen them feeding on a roadside deer carcass along Route 213 and on a dead fox on a grassy knoll bordering the new section of Opera Court in Phase IV. Several weeks ago I was outside talking with some neighbors, our small dogs on leashes nearby, when three Turkey Vultures that had been soaring high in the sky came down for a closer look (about 20 feet above our heads). Were they checking out the two little dogs? We're not sure. It's something to think about if you have a small dog. According to all the literature I've read, a Turkey Vulture **will only kill a helpless animal**, preferring carrion, but on this day those Turkey Vultures appeared **very** interested.

Interesting Facts:

Groups of Turkey Vultures often spend the night at communal roosts. Favored spots may be reused for many years.

You may see a Turkey Vulture standing on the ground in a spread-winged stance. This is believed to be for drying wings, warming the body, and baking off bacteria.

The Turkey Vulture is not related to eagles or hawks. They are in the family *Accipitridae*.

A group of vultures is called a “venue” and vultures circling in the air are a “kettle.”
