So what's the 5th Quarter? Well, it's nothing like the 19th hole in golf, but just maybe its name came about from the concept. All teens attending the home football games at Kent Island High

School are invited during school and during the game to attend the "5th Quarter" following the game. The 5th Quarter is sponsored by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. It is held on the school property and is supported by volunteer adults from at least five local churches: Kent Island United Methodist Church, Safe Harbor Presbyterian Church, Island Alliance Church, Shore Christian Fellowship (non-denominational), and St. Luke's Episcopal Parish.


Many kids attend because of the games, food, speakers, and camaraderie. On several occasions there were nearly 700 teens! Touch football, volleyball, youth rock bands, speakers, pizza, and drink give the kids something to do on a Friday night. The speakers have included an athlete turned preacher in Baltimore City and a Christian State Police Officer and motorcycle racer. On some occasions, teens from the Fellowship of Christian Athletes provide testimonies.

Volunteer adults help to set up canopies, tables, and games, pass out pizza and drinks, help clean up, and provide security (in addition to the regular security persons on the grounds).

One of the goals of the members of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at the Kent Island High School 5th Quarter and the supporting adults is to show other teens by example the fun that can be had in a Christian atmosphere. Hopefully, the athletes will reach out to their friends and invite them to youth fellowship activities and to church.

Each of us awoke to the following e-mail on Saturday morning from Erin Wheeler, 5th Quarter Adult Volunteer/Coordinator from Shore Christian Fellowship Church— "Wow – what a night! Great start to the third year of 5th Quarter events. The word is definitely out, and hundreds are coming. I believe the students feel that we love them, after attending an event – for much love is evident. This is a major team effort! It is awesome seeing the body of Christ unite to share God's love with our community. Thank you for all of your support and help this evening!!!"

We're introducing a new feature called <u>Do You Know</u>? It will be a forum for Villagers to pose noncommercial questions for which others may have answers. For example:


- 1. Do you know a good spot to watch the sun set? The sun rise?
- 2. Do you know a local spot to fish without a boat?
- 3. Do you know a local spot to go crabbing without a boat?
- 4. Do you know a non-toxic treatment to deter Japanese beetles?

For this month:

- 1. Do you know what solution I can make to use in my hummingbird feeder?
 - Answer: Mix 4 parts water with 1 part granulated sugar (for example, mix 1 C water with ¼ C sugar) and bring to a boil. Cool. Change the nectar in the feeder at least weekly.
- 2. Do you know where I can take my grandchild to learn more about the Chesapeake Bay? Answer: From the May 2007 *Libretto*: "Visit 'Our Chesapeake Legacy' at the Chesapeake Exploration Center. ... Located on the waterfront at the Kent Narrows, the Center is just off Route 50/301 and the Cross Island Trail. Open daily from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m."

Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge by Linda Blume



The Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge near Cambridge is a wonderful place to spend a day exploring the outdoors. In its varying habitats, Blackwater is home to many species of resident and migratory birds such as bald eagles, osprey, great blue herons, and wild turkeys. It's also home to a variety of mammals. You might see the endangered Delmarva fox squirrel in wooded areas or muskrats or nutria in the marsh. A good place to begin is the Visitors Center (Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. -4 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 9 a.m. -5 p.m.; free) to see wildlife exhibits and films and to pick up additional Blackwater information such as interpretive trail guides. Be sure to go upstairs to the new marsh viewing room to see more exhibits and to use spotting scopes to scan the area for wildlife.

Then proceed to the 5-mile long Wildlife Drive (open daily dawn to dusk; 3.00 per car, exact change needed) for a leisurely drive through various habitats, parking as the spirit moves you to get out and walk one of the marked trails or to scan for wildlife from the Drive. Be sure to stop at Observation Point and use binoculars to scan the sky and the treetops for bald eagles (year round) and osprey (March – October).

Blackwater hosts special events all year. Check their web site at <u>www.fws.gov/blackwater</u> for the schedule.

Directions (about 45 miles from Symphony Village):

Take Route 50 East through Easton and across the Choptank River Bridge in Cambridge. Go about 2 miles and turn right onto Route 16 West (Church Creek Road) at the red light just beyond the Dorchester Square Shopping Center. Go straight through the red light at Snow's Turn. Go past South Dorchester High School on the left. Turn left onto Egypt Road at the blinker light just beyond the school buildings. In about 7 miles, Egypt Road ends at Key Wallace Drive. Turn left to go to Wildlife Drive or turn right to go the Visitors Center (about 2 miles on the left).

Future Day Trips

Have you taken a day trip to a destination you can recommend? Would you share with your neighbors? A short paragraph is all we need. Include the destination name, what to see and do, directions, admission charge (if any), hours, as well as anything else of particular interest. ¹/₂ box of Angel hair pasta3 slices of bacon, cut into 1" pieces¹/₂ zucchini, chopped

ALASKA By Brenda Stoltz



Ever since my good friend moved to Alaska 20 years ago, I have wanted to visit there. In August, John and I finally turned that wish into a reality by signing on with Princess Cruise Line for a land and sea package. At last we were on our way, and our itinerary allowed us time to spend several days with my Alaskan friend.

The land portion of our trip began with two days in Fairbanks and included a River Boat Cruise on the Tanana and Chena Rivers which took us to sled dog demonstrations, to see Santa's reindeer, and on a tour of a reconstructed native Indian village. Later we visited part of the Alyeska Pipeline and found out why they put "pigs" in the pipeline. (Ask John about that.) Of course, no trip to Fairbanks would be complete without panning for gold, which we did, and we found enough gold to buy a tee shirt. Unfortunately, recovering from jet lag had us going to bed much too early to witness the beautiful Northern Lights which often grace Fairbanks' night skies. Traveling south on the train to Denali National Park, Mt. McKinley Lodge, and Talkeetna, we were struck by the vast wilderness of Alaska still colorfully painted with an abundance of wild flowers. Only the sharp eye could catch the animals as we moved along, but we did see a moose foraging in a marshy area near the train tracks. The next four days were filled with hikes through Denali, a bear sighting, horseback riding, and visiting with my friend. The most spectacular event, however, was flying over the snow capped mountains and glaciers of Mt. McKinley in the Alaska Range.

Our first week ended all too quickly as we move from land to sea. In Whittier, we boarded the Sapphire Princess–our beautiful home away from home for the next 7 days. The first two days we sailed through



breathtaking fjords outlined by misty mountains and accented by beautiful blue glaciers. The thunderous sound and powerful sight of a calving glacier is awesome, and the birds and animals in the icy water near the glaciers had us running from port to starboard. It is amazing how small 40-foot humpback whales and 20-foot orca whales look from 15 stories up, but they are still impressive sights. After a full day out on the deck enjoying the sights, we moved inside to take part in my favorite evening activitiy, namely, eating. We ate delicious meals all week and enjoyed

tasting new and unusual items on the menu. Midweek, in Skagway and Juneau, we took a train up a mountains, watched the salmon forge the currents as they swam up stream, saw more whales, sea lions, sea otters, eagles, and bears. At Mendenhall Glacier, our bear sighting was too close for comfort; so (being the chicken I am) I stayed back as other tourists took pictures of a black bear and her cubs eating salmon while a grizzly bear walked nearby. A bright sun greeted us in Ketchikan (known for its rainy weather), so we spent our last day in Alaska exploring the town under sunny skies–looking at the beautiful and intriguing Totem Poles, more relentless salmon runs, and an hilarious lumberjack show. Back onboard ship we danced and watched wonderful theatrical shows. Yes, the shipboard activities were great fun, but I was most impressed by the spirit and beauty of Alaska. It was a wonderful trip, but now it was time to say goodbye to our country's "Last Frontier." As the ship sailed away from the shore, I was reminded of a quote by naturalist John Muir: "Everybody needs beauty as well as bread, places to play in where nature may heal and give strength to body and soul."

Tip of the Month

Whatever the case our service technicians are more than happy to remedy any questions or concerns you may have regarding the landscaping, irrigation, or maintenance of your residence. However, sometimes a quick solution to the problem may only require a couple minutes of your time in the event that we are not on site that day.

This issues tip of the month is regarding irrigation and more specifically irrigation heads that seem to "stick" in the air after your system has operated. Sometimes the friction of the plastic allows the irrigation head to stay extended and therefore, leaves the black plastic head sticking out of the ground. In most cases there is nothing wrong with the head Itself and only requires a second to correct. To fix the problem lightly push down on the on irrigation head with your hand or foot and the shaft will quickly retract. If the problem persists or you do not feel comfortable, please feel free to call our irrigation department.
