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OPERATIONS COMMITTEE UPDATE

Update from Committee to Improve Energy Efficiency in the SV Clubhouse



In February, the committee reported about changes being made in the Clubhouse to improve energy efficiency and reduce costs. These changes have been in place for over a month and we are pleased to report that the response from the community with helping us meet our goals has been tremendous. During our process, the committee generated a Home Energy Savings Checklist for the individual homeowner. You will find this list on our website under Affairs of State. Additional hard copies are available at the front desk.

Remember when you are dealing with electricity, be safe. Hire a qualified professional to do the work. Remember when you are walking through your Clubhouse, please turn off lights in rooms that are not being used. We all pay for the costs when electricity is left on.

Landscape Sub-Committee For Common Areas

Residents from the Landscape and Operations committees met with Lasting Impressions



personnel recently to discuss best methods for dealing with common area turf issues. Limiting erosion on slopes and hillsides and swales was an important topic as we toured the perimeter of our community. We also viewed some of the swale areas behind homes and the two ponds. Some conclusions we drew were to mow some of the steeper hills on alternate weeks, and where the turf was thin, to mow as needed. This will slow erosion, especially in the summer when non-irrigated grass stops growing. It was agreed to raise the

mowing height in some swales to four inches to help slow down rainwater. We also want to remove any common area plantings, mulch or vegetation that will inhibit the free flow near the drainage grates. Finally, the inside slopes of the two ponds along with some of the steeper slopes in the common area perimeter will not be mowed. This will allow natural vegetation to grow and will help hold back eroding soil until the pond retrofit planting takes place in the fall. Chris Combs, who will oversee the landscaping for Lasting Impressions and his associates, John and Ricardo, offered many practical solutions to the challenges presented in our common areas. We appreciated the time they allocated to learning about the common areas and answering our questions. We all look forward to further discussions as we continue to improve our great community. As always, residents' inputs are appreciated. Please use the Landscape Form which can be downloaded at the official website for your comments.

CLUBS AND CLASSES

Symphony Village Bird Club

Members of the Bird Club attended the Eagle Festival at Blackwater NWR in mid-March. On the guided Eagle Prowl, we saw 11 bald eagles, large flocks of snow geese and tundra swans, a group of white pelicans (unusual in this area, but this is the third year they have wintered at Blackwater), great blue herons, a red-tailed hawk, tree swallows, and dunlins.



Inside the Visitor's Center, the "eagle cam" showed us two adorable fluffy chicks 10- and 12-days old. While we watched, a proud parent nipped off pieces of a fish and fed the babies. One of the chicks definitely got more than his/her fair share of this meal! The Eagle Prowl guide mentioned that on one day since the eggs hatched, you could clearly see a fish, a rabbit, and a duck on the edges of the nest – I wonder if eagle chicks prefer <u>variety</u> in their meals? The "osprey cam" showed an empty nesting platform since the ospreys had not yet returned to Blackwater, but four turkey vultures used the platform to perch on and to preen their feathers. In the program tents, we saw a gyrfalcon, a peregrine falcon, screech owls, a barred owl, a red-tailed hawk, and more. Despite the cloudy and chilly weather, we had a great time.

The Atlantic Hotel in Berlin, Maryland Reopens



The Staff of Fager's Island announces the reopening of the historic Atlantic Hotel in Berlin, Maryland. This 1895 landmark originally known as the Hotel Atlantic consists of seventeen preserved rooms, a honeymoon cottage, the Drummer's Cafe and restaurant, and the Atlantic ballroom which is suitable for special occasions and private dinners. The Victorian rooms, ladies parlor, and generous hallways have been completely restored. New bedding, top quality linens and flat screen televisions are a few of the upgrades included in the restoration. The Drummer's Cafe, kitchen and common areas have been brought back to a period of glory once enjoyed under the supervision of Charlie Smith, (retired managing partner of Ocean City's Fager's Island). There will be lunch and fine dining daily as well as catering for special events. There is a full service bar associated with the cafe. The general manager is Robin Kauffman and the chef d'cuisine is the locally popular Leo D' Aleo.

Built in 1895 by Horace F. Harmonson and his wife, Virginia Lingo Harmonson, the Hotel accommodated many traveling salesmen, "Drummers," who crisscrossed the region during the turn of the century. In the early days there was a livery stable in back of the Hotel. It was on this site that sales of mules and horses were held. The livestock would arrive in Berlin by rail and then be driven up through the town from the station to the Atlantic Stable. Mr. Harmonson had a horse-drawn bus ready to meet incoming trains. The bus would carry passengers directly to the Hotel. "Drummers" would check into the Hotel and immediately order up a horse and buggy from the stable to make their rounds. In addition to the "Drummers," the Hotel was frequented by those on their way to the ocean, those interested in hunting and fishing (guides were readily available), and those who simply delighted in good food. The Hotel was purchased in 1986 by ten local businessmen intent on preserving a piece of history. The careful restoration process has returned the Hotel to its former glory. The hotel is located at 2 North Main in the historic village of Berlin, Maryland. www.atlantichotel.com (410-641-3589).

1-pound crabmeat (added after following ingredients)


2 - 8 ounce containers cream cheese

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
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
