The community voted on the best chili with the 1st place going to Dorthea Turek, 2nd place to Eileen Rowley, and 3rd place to Mary Drake. In addition to the great chili and

comradery, the group was able to watch the Ravens win the football game. Below is Dorthea's winning recipe.

Chili Con Carne with Beans

By Dorthea Turek

2 T salad oil

3 medium onions, chopped

2 garlic cloves or ½ tsp bottle garlic

2 lb ground beef

1/4 cup mild chili powder

2 tsp cumin

1 tsp dried oregano

1—6 ounce can tomato paste

2—15 ounce cans whole tomatoes undrained and cut in small pieces, use scissors

1—4 ounce can chopped green chilies, undrained

½ cup green peppers chopped 27 ounce can Bushes Chili Beans 15 ounce can light red kidney beans

1 T brown sugar

- ❖ In 5 quart pot (Dutch oven) heat salad oil. Add onions and garlic, sauté until tender about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add ground beef breaking up clumps of meat and stirring occasionally, until liquid evaporates and meat is browned, about 10 minutes. Spoon off fat if too fatty.
- Stir in chili powder, cumin, and oregano, cook 1 minute. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, green chilies, and green pepper.
- Simmer, covered over low heat stirring occasionally, about 1 ½ hours. Add beans and brown sugar and heat through. It can cook another 30 minutes.

Notes-- I use Bushes chili beans, these are pinto beans not kidney. I had cooked chili the night before and reheated in the morning so the flavors came together. I use a mild chili powder bought from a mail order company named Penzeys Spices. They have a catalog and can be found on the internet.

OPERATIONS UPDATE ---

2009 Operations Committee's Initiatives and Accomplishments

On behalf of myself (Ed Frey-Chair), Claudia McGurk (Vice-Chair) and the following active members of the Operations Committee--Jim Dell, Tom Weeks, Gerry Walls, Doris Pullman, Dave Peterson, Tom Love, Cass Smith, Jim Cooke, Lloyd McAtee, and Dave Hoffman, we would like to highlight some of the major initiatives and accomplishments for 2009.

We have three sub-committees as part of the Operations Committee:

- 1. Energy Conservation-Tom Love- Chair
 - a. Members: Jon Briggs, Jim Cooke, Dan Kober, Lloyd McAtee, Bob Offerman, Dave Peterson, and Jim Pullen.
- 2. **Landscaping**-Cass Smith-Chair
 - a. Members: John DiLaura, Dorothy Hamm, Dave Hoffman, Sandy Love, Betty McAtee, Kathryn Marchi, Ellen Norman, and Eleanor Strietman
- 3. **AED/Safety-**Tom Weeks-Chair
 - a. Members: Gerry Walls, Jack Dedrick, George Drake

Although members of the Operations Committee chair these sub-committees, they are also comprised of other residents who have been a real asset to the community and these committees. We would like to thank those residents who served on these sub-committees and helped us complete the work associated with the 2009 initiatives and accomplishments.

The following is the list (not in any particular order or priority):

Energy Sub-Committee

- Continued the effort that Dennis Sesplankis started of switching to high efficiency light bulbs
- Reduced the hot water heater temperature by 10 degrees. Insulated the 250-gallon hot water heater and pipes in the Clubhouse equipment room
- Installed insulation pads on the electrical outlets located on the outside walls
- Posted signs around the Clubhouse reminding residents to turn off the lights, etc.
- Reviewed United Propane bills—based on that review where the price appeared to be high. Reviewed this with United Propane and they lowered the unit price
- Installed a separate switch for the lights above the bar
- Contacted United Propane regarding the Terms and Conditions in reference to the minimum purchase requirement and confirmed that this did not apply to SV residents
- Started to explore the use of a generator for the Clubhouse for those times that we are without electricity for extended periods (still under review)
- Started to explore the use of ceiling fans in various rooms in the Clubhouse (still under review)
- Investigated home owner tips to help reduce energy cost in residents' homes (article appeared in the December *Libretto*)
- Worked with Dennis Sesplankis to have the front yard light and the pool lights put on separate circuit breakers so that the pool lights weren't on unnecessarily
- Reviewed the air leakage at Clubhouse doors resulting in having weather seals added (this was in lieu of having to replace the doors)
- Got approval to install turn on/off light sensors in the Clubhouse restrooms and timers on the fans in the fitness room. This helps to eliminate the constant running of the lights and fans
- Studied an alternate energy source to heat the indoor pool and/or heat/cool the Clubhouse—it was determined this was not feasible at this time


Landscaping Sub-Committee

- Identified the "common areas" of the development so we knew where to concentrate our efforts for improvement
- Identified the "no mow" areas, including the ponds, which should help reduce the goose population
- Identified areas in need of erosion protection and documented with photos
- Worked with the Corsica River Conservancy and DNR to inform residents of the Bios wale Project
- Worked with the Town of Centreville to implement the Pond 1 and 2 retrofit. This included organizing meetings to keep the residents updated on the process and time table for implementation.
- Developed a street tree replacement plan that the Operations Committee approved and made a recommendation to the HOA Board. This approved

- implementation was scheduled to be completed in December 2009. This initiative will be continued in 2010.
- Developed a draft of "Street Tree Standards and Specifications"-this will be reviewed by the Operations Committee in 2010 for a recommendation to the HOA Board/Developer.
- Oversaw the installation of approximately 40 rain gardens in coordination with CRC and the Covenants Committee
- Initiated the use of "Gator Bags" to improve the ability of the newly planted street trees to survive
- Held educational and maintenance meeting with "Rain Garden" participants

AED/Safety

 Together with George Drake and CERTS were able to get approval from the State of Maryland to install AEDs in the fitness room and card room.



- Worked with Dennis Sesplankis and Laura Wright in monitoring the performance of Landscaping and Irrigation vendors. Reviewed on a regular basis the "Complaint Log" and participated in meetings with the vendors to insure that improvements in service were implemented. Based on the 3-year contract with our landscaping vendor "Lasting Impressions" we were able to negotiate additional savings for the 2010 contract year (modified aspects of the original "statement of work" by eliminating or modification of certain work elements) and additional savings of \$23,000 versus the 2009 contract. We should also note for 2009 we were able to achieve savings versus 2008 cost by combining lawn and fertilization with one vendor versus multiple vendors. In addition due to having one vendor and having a 3 year contract we received a 5% savings based on their contract price.
- Developed the "Statement of Work" recommendation to the HOA Board for snow and ice removal. This included the use of Calcium Chloride salt to prevent corrosion to the concrete. Our recommendation with some modifications was approved by the Board for implementation beginning with the 2009 snow/ice season
- Developed and recorded a detail analysis of necessary repairs that the developer needs to make to defective sidewalks, etc.
- Facilitated in conjunction with the builder/developer having the Town of Centreville take ownership of the street lights (including the electrical cost), the maintenance of streets in Sections 1 and 2 (this includes snow removal for those streets), and the electrical cost for the sewage pumping station that serves Symphony Village
- Due to safety concerns, members of the Operations Committee retrofitted the horseshoe pits by eliminating the pavers and replacing with sod

- furnished by the builder. New pits were installed with the correct stake distance.
- Elimination of the storage trailers for the outdoor furniture (saved the labor and \$2,000 rental cost of trailers) by keeping furniture in its regular location
- Worked closely with the builder/developer on some appearance issues in the community--for example, the re-landscaping of the front entrance by replacing the dead bushes, maintenance of the unsold lots, the repair of the cupola on the pavilion behind the clubhouse, and the addition of a sidewalk from the parking lot to the pool.

PUBLICATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS UPDATE

Meet The SV Press

Finally out and about in this neighborhood and discovering people, committees, and lots to do, I began my sampling of SV culture in November. I roamed into a committee meeting that intrigued me, the Publications and Communications Committee. My goal was to find out who these strivers of the "who, what, when, why, and where" of Symphony Village are and what each of them do.

In this mode, I entered through a glass door where the Publications and Communications folks were meeting. It wasn't hard to feel the passion in the room. These high-energy women and men were planning, brainstorming, and making lots of decisions about the SV publications. Wow...the *Libretto*, the directories, the SV website, Welcome Night—these communication tools helped me feel connected after moving to SV.

So, let's meet the SV press! This is just a bit of what they do, because mostly they just DO, and want to be under the radar.

In ABC order of last names:

Linda Blume assembles articles of local interest for the *Libretto*, maintains the rules for uniformity of the *Libretto*, and provides editing expertise for the *Libretto*. She supports activities of the chairperson and helps with the Welcome Nights for new SV residents.

Charlene Smallwood Brown provides an interactive computer-based service for SV residents to access photos of their neighbors. This includes populating and updating databases with residents' photos, names, and addresses; developing, integrating, and maintaining interactive computer-based applications that link residents' photos with their names and addresses and that recognize mouse/ keyboard input to enable SV residents to access photos of residents for inclusion in the photo directories. Charlene assists in proposing and reviewing articles and edits the *Libretto* newsletter for publication. She also participates and supports the chairperson to welcome new residents to the community and facilitates distribution of information to SV residents.

George Drake obtains new advertisements, scans and modifies them as necessary for the computer using Photoshop for placement in the ad section. He composes the ad pages in InDesign and prints in Acrobat for placement in the *Libretto* and the SV website. George also assists in the editing of articles and converts the MS Word document to a PDF (portable document file) and then combines it with the ads for the finished *Libretto* which is forwarded to John Schultz for uploading to the website and to Laura Wright for hard-copy printing for Villagers without a computer. George is also the backup for the Webmaster, John Schultz, and writes and edits articles for the *Libretto*.

Kathy Gauthier helps with the Welcome Nights, editing, and sale of "File of Life."

Joan Hennessey has been on the committee for 4 years. She contributes by editing each edition of the *Libretto*, using the wisdom and myriad of skills inherent in being a Retired English Teacher. Someone referred to Joan as the "Comma Queen of Symphony Village."

Carol Hodges is chairperson and leads the committee members to carry out their jobs on the Publications and Communications committee for the customers--SV residents. She schedules the meetings, composes the agenda, and schedules and runs the Welcome Nights. Carol welcomes new residents and gets them listed in the directory. She writes and delivers the reports at the HOA meetings and also contracts with clients for ads and sends what she gets to George Drake. She is responsible for implementing the goals of the committee effectively.

Gil Hoffman edits, provides computer technical support, and scans pictures for the directory.

Brenda Stoltz edits and occasionally writes articles for the *Libretto*. She assists Pat Scheirer with typing the Libretto every other month and helps at Welcome Nights.

Bob Rose helped with the picture directory and does editing.

Pat Scheirer formats the text and adds the pictures to the *Libretto*. Pat's process begins with Carol, who sends her items from in and around the Village. She then edits the articles and selects the pictures from Google images. She also enjoys being "under the radar" as one of the *Libretto* editors.

John Schultz maintains the website and works to keep it current. This job involves more than can fit on one page. It includes the resident directories, with the exception of the Picture Directory. He maintains the SV Resident and Prayer Chain email lists as well as possible. He is always looking for input from the residents, especially pictures.

Dorthea Turek takes the committee minutes, edits the *Libretto*, and helps with Welcome Nights.

Karin Larsen is the newest member, learning and sampling and volunteering to write some articles.

Homeowner Fire And General Safety

Part III of III by Your CERT Team

As we head into winter, each homeowner should consider the following actions to prevent emergencies or actions to take in case of emergencies. It's a good idea to locate house main electrical, water, and propane shutoffs and you might even put a tag on them for future reference (and in a panic situation, you'll find them quickly and be sure of the correct shutoff!).

HEAT PUMP: If you are not on a periodic preventive maintenance program for your heat pump, contact a contractor and get on one. If snow covers the vents of your heat pump, use a broom to clear them so air can circulate around it.

OUTDOOR GRILLS: When using ANY type of outdoor grill, it should be at least 3 feet from the house. If the grill is too close to the house, the heat will warp your siding – or worse, the flames could ignite the siding. Always keep the propane canister outside!

FIRE ALARMS: Check them twice a year at daylight savings times. Press the TEST button to see that they alarm. Replace the battery at this time also. If you hear a chirping sound coming from the alarm, you need to immediately replace the battery.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS: Check them to see that the needle points to the green (full) area. If not, replace them (or get a recharge if they are rechargeable). Periodically turn the extinguishers over and shake them a couple of times to make them ready if you need them.

HINT: Once you have located your various shutoffs, tag them so you can easily find them when you need them.

Most of these points are reminders of what we were all told along with a zillion other things when we closed on our houses and are meant to be a reminder of where things are around the house. – Your CERT Team

The Bird Club will hold an <u>indoor picnic</u> on Thursday, **January 28**, at noon, in the Arts and Crafts Room at the Clubhouse. Everyone who is interested in birds is cordially invited to attend. <u>The Great Backyard Bird Count</u> is an annual four-day event that will take place February 12-15. Bird watchers of all ages and experience levels count birds to create real-time snapshots of where birds are in the U.S. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or

you can count for as long as you like on each day of the event. We'll discuss details at the



Bird Club Picnic (see above) or you can read ahead by going to www.birdsource.org/gbbc. Count data will be entered via a computer web page or by mailing in hardcopy forms. All the details are on the web site. There is also a checklist on the web site of the birds you may see in this area in February. she can publicize SV participation in the *Libretto*. For anyone who wishes to join Linda, who'll be in the Clubhouse gazebo on Saturday, February 13, starting at 1 p.m. (weather permitting) to see what birds can be counted in that setting.

QAC Arts Council & Center for the Arts: "Small Works"



HOW WILL THE STATE TREAT SENIORS THIS YEAR?

The Maryland General Assembly meets from January 13 through April 12, 2010. The State Government funds a myriad of services on which seniors depend. Functions from nursing home oversight, to utility regulation, to teacher retirement programs fall within the State's purview. Half of all Medicaid funds are provided by the State as well as a large amount of the costs to maintain senior centers, meals-on-

wheels, and local transit buses.

The 33rd annual Legislative Rally is on Tuesday, January 19, in Annapolis. The event will include Town Hall style meetings with the Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House as well as meetings with individual delegates from each district. Caucus leaders from Kent County's district (the 36th) are Nancy Voss of Denton and myself. This year, like last year, the "gorilla in the room" is the budget.

The State budget outlook is bleak. According to the Maryland Budget and Tax Policy Institute, Maryland's estimated revenue for this fiscal year is \$3 billion below last year. After cuts already being made, a shortfall of \$2 billion is estimated for this year. Busch mentioned the relatively low unemployment level in the State compared to other states but wants to consider tax incentives for small businesses, which hire new employees. He said that restrictions on spending Federal stimulus money further restrict the State, and 2010 will be a year to "try to hold our own."

Never assume that legislators know the issues or the concerns of seniors. "Everyone knows that seniors vote more than any other group. The bad news is that they are also the most unorganized of any voting group," according to Ted Meyerson, President of United Seniors of Maryland. "It will take all the strength we can muster to continue to preserve and enhance the mental, physical, and financial well-being of Maryland seniors," he added. 4 T. Swiss cheese

3 T. Mozzarella cheese

1 cup heavy whipping cream

3 eggs

1 tsp. sea or kosher salt to taste

3 T. white wine (not "cooking wine")

10 oz. fresh crabmeat

4 T. butter

3 shallots or scallions

1 tsp. fresh ground pepper or to taste

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Sauté shallots or scallions in butter and add crabmeat and stir for 3 to 4 minutes. Add wine; raise heat and cook until liquid has evaporated. Set aside to cool.
