They shopped for neighbors nine times and processed six requests for the loan of medical equipment. We suggested that three residents consider joining the Caregivers' Support Group and passed along 59 Prayer Chain requests. We made 12 donations to various charities in memory of residents or loved ones and entered pages into the Memorial Book in memory of three residents.

Yes, it was a very busy year, but that is old business, and we're looking forward to the challenges and joys of 2010 with some new Street Captains. In the past month or so, Marlene Tennier (Sonata Way), Nancy Cotter (Symphony Way), and Janice Carmody (Opera Court) decided to resign from Neighbor to Neighbor. Meet SV Outreach Committee

By Karin Larsen Leaving the interview with Outreach President, Loretta Quigley, I remembered a quote by Anais Nin, "Each friend represents a world in us, a world possibly not born until they arrive, and it is only by this meeting that a new world is born." This quote came to mind because it felt as if I made a new friend, a "can-do" neighbor.

Who are these folks living in SV who participate in the mission and definition of Outreach? You have probably heard the lofty definitions "to surpass in reach, to be more or greater than, to systematically provide services to particular segments of a community, to reach out." After interviewing Loretta, these definitions became very tangible. These Outreach members make it all happen. They are dedicated to providing support and services to our neighborhood and community.

The Outreach partners include Hospice of Queen Anne's County, Adult Day Care Foundation, Jeff Davis Post American Legion, Centreville Police Department, and the Chesterwye Center as recipients of volunteer services and financial support that this 501(3) (C) non-profit corporation provides. The Neighbor to Neighbor Program, part of the Outreach Program at SV, meets the needs of SV residents through SV volunteers who provide services for The Memorial Book, Medical Equipment Sharing, Transportation, Spiritual Support, the Meals Program, and Pet Support. The Caregivers Support Group, also part of Outreach, is our forum for sharing experiences, concerns, and the knowledge we have gained from being caregivers.

Loretta communicates warmth, strength, and leadership. She recalled how in 2007, while looking for another meeting, her husband Stephen, gently pushed her into the doorway of an engaging Outreach meeting that was in the Clubhouse. Now, it's been two years at the helm of the SV Outreach Program, Inc., following prior dynamic leaders. Asking about her leadership style, Loretta says that micro-managing doesn't appeal to her. She doesn't need to be the boss in her relationship with the committee because there are so many highly motivated and capable individuals that work to get the job done. "You have to love what you do, it has to work for you, and if you don't feel it, it's not for you." Loretta says she is stepping down in June to turn the presidency over to the next leader.

An important bit of information to know is that Dorothy Hamm began Outreach to help people in the SV community and the community at large. Dorothy continues to be an invaluable resource to the group. The next president was Joyce Edmonston, providing her energy, enthusiasm, and humor to continue the effort.

The following folks comprise the current **OUTREACH EXECUTIVE BOARD: President Loretta Quigley** provides the leadership to delegate tasks.

Vice-President Carlene Cooke provides total support to the president. Wide in scope, this role is tough to define because her effort is to assist the president and to support all of the project work to ensure all wheels are turning. One example is co-chairing the card party. She will do whatever needs to be done and has worked on many successful projects.

Secretary Shirley Clark takes and prepares the minutes and sends all the correspondence of the Outreach Program, including thank you notes and invitations.

Treasurer Marilyn Williams keeps the books per tax requirements and you can imagine what this involves, as many wonderful SV accountants provided their assistance for Outreach prior to Marilyn becoming treasurer.

Development Manager Linda Blume assists members in implementing tasks such as advanced ticket sales for the recent card party, tracking the donors and tickets for the events, and organizing and helping as needed. She makes sure the details are covered. Linda has overseen the success of many fundraising projects.

Historian Carlene Cooke maintains all the historical records for Outreach.

Small Events Chair Nancie Cameron is responsible for creating new smaller fundraising events for Outreach. She organizes and takes care of the food preparation for these events such as the inaugural SV card party. Nancie also controls the food budget.

Neighbor to Neighbor Chair Eleanor Strietman has led the Neighbor to Neighbor Program since January 2008. It is funded by and part of the Outreach Program. She oversees the workings of the Street Captains. She was an important presence at Welcome Night. During my interview with her she commented, "We live in a loving, caring, compassionate community where people are really concerned about their neighbors and neighborhood." Pat Loiacono and Helen Schultz originally formed the group as an Outreach subcommittee because they recognized situations arise when neighbors need to help one another. This organization facilitates and coordinates meeting the physical, spiritual, or any other needs of our neighbors.

Neighbor to Neighbor Secretary is **Pat Porter**.

Caregivers Support Group -- Beth Dewhirst facilitates regular meetings to share experiences, concerns, and information to assist and support those caring for loved ones. Beth provides the quiet, private meetings in her home.

The Board of Directors for the Outreach Executive Board are **Dorothy Hamm** and **Joyce Edmonston**; both were past presidents of Outreach.

Some of the other members who work hard for SV Outreach are **Diane Briggs**, a newer member; **Nancy Frey**, working on various projects; and **Terry Nudo**, who worked on the cookbook with chief editor **Nancie Cameron**.

Loretta also mentions **Linda Gardner** and **B.J. McClaeb**, great behind the scenes workers, and **Anita Morris** another behind the scenes gal who can be found assisting with food service and set up whenever needed. Another contributor is **Allen Beck**, chef extraordinaire, with his contagious, positive, and friendly attitude. Also, **Lauren Rose** helped **Carlene Cooke** with the invitations and details of the card party. **Cass Smith** is always a great resource for plants and flowers and was a huge presence at the House Tour luncheon, designing table decorations and helping to arrange for the Mother's Day plant sale spearheaded by **Beth Dewhirst**.

Outreach is another amazing SV group that encouraged asking and answering the question, "Who are these folks of Outreach and what do they do?" Now we know a little more, although some folks are still under my radar. There is subtle energy lurking around our neighborhood. Reminds me of something I read by Claudette Renner, "Though our communication wanes at times of absence, I'm aware of a strength that emanates in the background."

The folks you have just met are strong and caring implementers of Outreach. It sure feels good to know we have friends, supporting and providing services for us at Symphony Village and BEYOND!



CERT in Action

Did you know that during our Winter Snow Storm on December 18-19 the SV CERT team went into pre-action via email to offer snow shoveling to any home where an emergency was occurring? Twelve of our CERT volunteers were ready to shovel snow from the street to the door in the event an emergency vehicle had to be brought into our village. Persons also monitored the Queen Anne's County Emergency Operations Fire/EMS Dispatch (151.085 MHz) using scanners for any advanced notice of emergency equipment headed our way. Had there been an actual emergency, the SV CERT telephone chain would have notified CERT members to assemble.

The CERT team sprung into action again during the snow storms of January 30, February 9-10 and again 12 members were ready to support emergency shoveling. This time the telephone chain (as opposed to email on December 18) was tried and proved successful.



The CERT team has designed an **Emergency Information Form** to be completed by any resident who might need

special assistance in the event of an emergency prior to arrival of professional emergency personnel. These forms were blast emailed to all residents with email addresses on January 17. Additional forms are available from Laura in the Clubhouse. Completed forms should be returned to Laura.

File of Life.... Is a card upon which you write your name, doctors, emergency contacts, medical information, allergies, and other important information for quick access by emergency personnel. The card fits into a plastic sleeve with the words **FILE OF LIFE** on it and includes a magnet so you can attach it to your refrigerator. Emergency personnel know to check the refrigerator. You can obtain the File of Life for \$1.50 from Kathy Gauthier, Concerto Avenue, 410-758-1743. If you have one, **check it often and keep it updated!**

Traffic Speed on Rt. 213 at Taylor Mill

DON'T MISS THIS GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY to take action to reduce the traffic speed limits on Rt. 213 at Taylor Mill Road. This intersection has all the elements for an accident waiting to happen. It is not a matter of **if** it will happen, but only **when** it will happen.

A Town Council meeting took place February 2 with the new State Highway Administration's Assistant District Engineer – District 2, Jeffrey Wentz. He listened to many residents' complaints concerning the speed limits through Centreville. He then stated that the State Highway Administration would conduct a study of the situation and prepare a proposal for a solution to the problem within 45 days. The original topic for discussion involved the speed limits on Rt. 213 between the bridges at either end of town. After further comments from the residents, the study was extended from Taylor Mill Road to Northbrook. We need the scope of the study to extend to Rt. 301, where the traffic accelerates as it heads into town and speeds by Taylor Mill Road. The dips in the highway between Rt. 301 and Taylor Mill Road cause a very short sight distance, making left-hand turns extremely dangerous. Lowering and enforcing the speed limits would definitely improve this serious situation.

Please write or email Mr. Jeffrey Wentz explaining your concern about the speed of the traffic through the intersection of Rt. 213 at Taylor Mill Road and the danger it presents.

RESTAURANT REVIEW Brian Boru Restaurant

Brian Boru Restaurant (489 Ritchie Hwy., Severna Park, 410-975-BORU (2678)) is impossible to dislike! That's my challenge for Symphony Village folks wanting some



"Irish Country Fare," or a "Taste of the Glens." Try this elegant pub if you like to eat traditional Irish food, chophouse type offerings like prime rib, or local seafood dishes eaten in a rich, warm and woodsy atmosphere. The spacious pub portion of the restaurant opens to additional large dining rooms where light filters through etched glass

windows. My friend Claire and I sat in a comfortable booth where a friendly and efficient waitress, Debra, served our delicious Irish Whiskey and Tomato soup. This soup was simply delicious, containing fresh pieces of tomato and herbs and a rich flavor with a kick. Maybe it was the whiskey? The soup went well with the Corned Beef Poppers, which were sensational! We loved the unusually tender round bites of corned beef dipped in beer batter, flash fried, and served with a tangy bistro sauce. We also loved the delicious Irish Soda Bread and our Chieftain Salads which contained romaine lettuce hearts, crumbled Cashel Blue Cheese, roasted walnuts, dried raisins, cranberries, and homemade croutons served with their raspberry honey dressing. This salad was large and filling and, at \$7.99, was well worth it. The menu is filled with such choices as Shepherd's Pie, Murphy's Pot Roast, Irish Seafood Gumbo, Wicklow Style Lamb Chops, Brian Boru Sea Bass, Miss Peggy's Crab Cakes, burgers, and a full range of sandwiches and side orders. This was a great place to eat and is owned by the Irish Restaurant Company. Galway Bay was their first restaurant, which opened in Annapolis in 1998. They own the Kinsale Inn and Kilarney House Restaurant and Pub and pride themselves on "developing each restaurant with its own unique character and design and yet all possess a common trait of honest hospitality." Brian Boru also offers a full gluten-free menu and a Sunday brunch. On Friday and Saturday nights, local talent takes the stage

with live music. Brian Boru Restaurant combined food, service, and ambiance in a daringly delicious way.
