Adult Grief Management Classes Offered by Hospice

Hospice of Queen Anne's Bereavement Program will offer a series of grief management classes this spring for adults dealing with grief after the death of a loved one. These bereavement services are available to <u>anyone</u> in Queen Anne's County who is living with grief regardless of the cause of death.



A Grief Management Class is a place where bereaved adults can learn more about grief and how to deal with it in the presence of others who understand because they too have experienced significant losses. Participation in this class may *prevent* grief-related problems

later in one's life. The class is not group therapy, but when it works well, it certainly can be therapeutic. It is not a social group, but friendships often form as class members get to know each other. Each class will focus on topics related to grief, and will include activities, teaching, and open discussion.

This series of classes will meet on Tuesday evenings from 6:30-8:30, for eight weeks, from March 30 until May 18 at our offices at 255 Comet Drive in Centreville.

Participants are asked to make a commitment to attend as many classes as possible. There is no fee for this class. Registration will be held on a "first-come, first-served" basis, and class size is limited. 

Symphony Village Library

There has been very little activity for the library committee, although two proposals to improve the current system were submitted but not approved by management. Another proposal has been drafted to submit to management for consideration. Apparently, residents are reading some of the books provided.

To inform new residents, the current system is very simple. We have a hardback book display in the card room and a paperback display in the gym area. Café Sado is an exciting restaurant located in Chester's Castle Harbor Marina. Sado means "way of the tea," and the tea ceremony is a traditional ritual of service which emphasizes the focus and grace of Japanese culture. Graceful, delicious, and harmonious describes the service, food, and atmosphere at Café Sado.

Specializing in Japanese sushi and sashimi, this restaurant offers a fusion of French and Southeast Asian cooking. This restaurant offers water views, outside dining, and seating for approximately 130 people. The décor is elegant with a beautiful bamboo floor and an Asian modern flair. We have always found the service staff to be friendly, and we love sitting in one of their comfy booths with pillows overlooking the Marina.



The menu at Café Sado is rich with choices. Sharing and sampling is fun if you order dumplings, Satay, Thai dishes, sushi dinners, or vegetarian dinners. Your dining can be indoors, outdoors, or downstairs at the bar. If you dine upstairs, instead of sitting at a table, you can choose to sit at the fresh sushi bar and

see the choreography of the expert sushi chef, Tony Wong, as his hands do a dance preparing as many as 27 different rolls, 18 different maki, and at least 17 different nigiri sushi (sushi is seasoned rice with vinegar and nigiri sushi is a small oval of rice topped with fish or shellfish). (Maki is rolled rice surrounding fish or vegetables.)

Favorites are the California Roll, Kani (Red Snapper), Sake (Smoked Salmon), and the Hamichi (Yellow Tail). Another delicious dish to order is the Green Shrimp Curry with Green Beans. This is a traditional green curry combined with coconut milk, jumbo shrimp, mixed vegetables, and fresh basil leaves. If you're a curry lover, try the Penang curry of beef, an aromatic curry with wok-seared flank steak simmered with coconut milk, lemon grass, and coriander. If you want to enjoy a great sushi dinner, try an assortment of fourteen pieces of sashimi or share the Sado Deluxe, which serves a Harmony Roll, California Roll, an assortment of six pieces of Sushi, and six different types of sashimi. I know you're probably wondering about the dessert. Dessert is usually not possible, but if you must, try the Fried Ice Cream, and the Green Tea Crème Brulee, which is green tea infused crème brulee topped with lemon candy and served with a vanilla ice-cream sandwich.

You really cannot help but enjoy Café Sado on Kent Island. You can always find fresh, and artfully presented seafood, vegetables, poultry, or meats. If you are a vegetarian, you can choose from five different dinner entrees. When you go there, you may see me at the sushi bar, eating my Unagi-Fresh Water Eel, or my Tobiko-flying Fish Roe, while enjoying a Yuengling beer.

Antarctica Adventure Aboard the Star Princess

e departed Dulles at 10:05 p.m. February 8 on United for a short, ten-hour flight direct to Buenos Aires. We were surprised to find out at the airport the Argentine government just imposed a \$141 per person arrival tax which became effective on January 1. An unforgettable welcome to South America! A short cab ride to the dock and we were onboard the ship in less than 12 hours after departing Dulles! The world is a small place when air travel is concerned.

After two and one half days on the open seas with a wave height under ten feet, and a 20-hour period of wave height over 25 feet, we arrived in the Falkland Islands only two hours late. The population of Stanley is 2,200, and the whole population of the Falkland



Islands is under 3,000. Yes, about the size of Centreville! Stanley is located on the side of a small hill, a patchwork of small wooden homes painted a rainbow of colors. The city is a walking tour that takes only a few hours. In fact, there are more penguins on the island than humans. If you ever take a trip to the Falklands, make sure you arrange a trip to Volunteer

Point to see the King and Magellanics penguins. They are one of the most wonderful sights you will ever have the opportunity to see!!!

After 36 hours at sea, we arrive at the tip of Elephant Island. The glaciers were located every half mile ranging in size from a half mile to over six miles wide. Large icebergs were arranged around the island like small hills beached on the water, many were 200 feet below water with only 15 feet above water. We thought Elephant Island was to be a small island, but we cruised along the coast for over four hours! After spending the night cruising toward King George Island, we were to cruise into Iceberg Alley; but we hit heavy fog, and we caught sight of large icebergs 100 yards away from the ship. Due to

the fog, the camera took pictures only showing the fog and shadows of the bergs. In the afternoon, we crossed the Bransfield Straight and entered Admiralty Bay. We were able to see the Poland Antarctic station named Arctowski Station, one of 12 manned year-round stations in Antarctic! Two Polish scientists were leaving the station after a year stay, and the ship dropped two new scientists off along with supplies for the 2010 winter. I guess we saw a bit of history.



The Star cruised overnight to reach the Neumayer Glacier channel. Words and photos cannot describe the beautiful views we were looking at the entire day. We had blue skies, snow, and ice-covered white mountains over 2,000 feet high. We saw more glaciers than have even been named. After about five hours, with winds around five knots, the ship crossed into an opening in the mountains, and we were greeted by an Antarctic blast of winds over 90 knots. The ship did a fast about-face and got out of the wind. Lucky we were near the end of the channel. Icebergs were quite plentiful.

We bought three DVDs--<u>Antarctic 2010</u>, <u>Guide to the Penguins</u>, and <u>The Frozen Continent</u>. We will arrange a showing at the Clubhouse soon. You had more snow in Centreville than we had down in Antarctica!!

Overnight, we cruised up the Bransfield Strait and arrived at Deception Island on the way out of Antarctica. Deception Island was famous for Whaling and Sealing in the late 18th century.

Last night and today (as I write this on board ship) we are crossing Drakes Passage on the way to Cape Horn this evening. Waves are seven to ten feet; the ship is bouncing a bit, but overall great weather. We have looked at just a small piece of Antarctica. The size is just overwhelming!! Ice has been measured at 10,500 feet deep. To cruise around Antarctica would cover over 10,000 miles! The miles we cruised since Elephant Island

will be fully covered in three to four-foot deep ice come May. We just learned that large cruise ships will be banned from the Antarctica Sea's after 2011. If you are thinking of ever seeing this part of the world, now is the time to take action. Princess has two more cruises planned in 2011.

We arrived at Cape Horn just in time to get hit with high winds and, of course, high seas. The ship came within two miles, slightly overcast but clear. After seeing the Cape, we sailed on down to Ushuaia overnight. Morning was sunny and clear. Big beautiful snow-covered mountains all around Ushuaia, quite a sight to see. We took a small cat boat up the Beagle Channel and saw the local bird population, the first fur seal to arrive this year, and loads of South American sea lions!

Blueberry Cream Cheese Pound Cake

From the Kitchen of Dorthea Turek

1 8-ounce package cream cheese,

softened

½ cup vegetable oil

1 package yellow cake mix (18 ounce)

1 package instant vanilla pudding (3 ounce)

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 cups blueberries (frozen or fresh)

- Preheat to 325 degrees. Grease a 9-inch tube pan well. You can use a bundt pan but I have more luck with a tube pan.
- Combine cream cheese, oil, and eggs in a bowl and beat until smooth. Add cake mix, pudding mix, and vanilla at medium speed until blended. Fold in berries with spoon and not mixer. Spoon batter in prepared pan.
- Bake 60 minutes or until a wooden toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool cake in pan on wire rack 20 minutes. Remove from pan and cool completely. May sprinkle powdered sugar on cake or glaze.
- Glaze: Combine 1 cup powdered sugar and 1 tablespoon milk, mix until smooth, and put on cake.

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
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


















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
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
