READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB

CERT COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

WHAT IS CERT?

The mission of the Symphony Village Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is two-fold: (1) to prepare, protect, and assist our families, friends, and neighbors within Symphony Village as first responders in the event of a minor or major disaster before official emergency personnel can arrive, and (2) to assist the Queen Anne's County Emergency Management organization, as required, within Queen Anne's County in the event of a major disaster. To become a member, a person needs to complete a certification course in CERT including CERT procedures, first aid, CPR, and use of an AED (defibrillator). Anyone is welcome to join CERT; we especially need persons with medical, fire, current CPR/AED/First Aid Certifications, or similar backgrounds and training. We have meetings about every 6 weeks and often have local speakers. We periodically have refresher training and drills.

Next CERT meeting is Tuesday, January 25 at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse.

COMPUTER TIP OF THE MONTH

Have you ever installed a new program or new software and your computer went haywire? If you have Windows XP, this tip will help you. A restore point should be created before installing it. In fact, a restore point should be created periodically. "A restore point is a representation of a stored state of your computer's system files at a specific time. Restore points are a component of the Windows System Restore utility. By creating a restore point, you can save the state of the operating system and your own data so that if future changes cause a problem, you can restore the system to the way it was before the changes were made."

To create one on XP click on START, ALL PROGRAMS, ACCESSORIES, SYSTEM TOOLS, SYSTEM RESTORE. Choose "Create a restore point" and then click NEXT. Choose a name for this restore point such as "Before camera installation" or "January 2011." Click on CREATE and you are finished.

Should you have a problem later with your computer after installing something new, repeat the procedures, except choose "Restore my computer to an earlier time." Follow the instructions from there. All documents, pictures, etc. that have been created will not be lost. (Written under the direction of Juana Ridgway.)

<u>City of Santa Fe, New Mexico or La Villa Real de la Santa Fe de San Francisco de Asis</u> By Karin Larsen

Did you know that Santa Fe is the highest state capital in the United States? This capital is



located 7,199 feet above sea level straight through the center of its own Capitol building. Other high capitals in the states of Wyoming, Colorado, Nevada, Utah, and Montana, don't even come close compared to Santa Fe. Our one week stay here only gave us a hint of this beautiful city. We tried to explore the historic sites, Indian pueblos, ancient Indian ruins, old mining towns, high mountain Spanish colonial

villages, and New Mexico wineries. We didn't have time to enjoy the many outdoor activities such as skiing on Santa Fe's high mountain slopes, or biking, horseback riding, and walking the Dale Ball Trails, but did get to sample one of the many Santa Fe area casinos, owned by individual Pueblos.

Did you also know that Santa Fe is listed as the second largest art center in the United States, after New York City? This includes, \$\$\$-money spent on art. This city is widely popular as a center for the arts in part because there are the highest numbers of artists living in Santa Fe per capita. We are glad we went to the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum. She is one of Santa Fe's most well-known artists. She owned a home and lived part of her life in Santa Fe, painting the beauty she beheld living in the Southwest. There was a special exhibit showcasing her early work and actual art supplies that were never viewed when we visited. More than one thousand of her works in different media can be seen there. We also visited Canyon Road, east of the Plaza, which is where international collectors go to see and purchase more art than I have ever seen in one rather small area. Here you can experience Native American, Southwestern, and indigenous American art. The architecture is also fascinating! Such were our visits to: The New Mexico Capitol, the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Francis of Assisi (the mother church of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Santa Fe), the Loretto Chapel and the San Miguel Mission including the Barrio De Analco Historic District—all beautiful examples of Spanish Territorial or Pueblo style of architecture.

We loved visiting the Santa Fe Southern Railway. This railroad operates as a tourist rail experience and rides about 15 miles to the southeast. Other enjoyable visits were to the New Mexico Museum of Art which houses collections of Southwestern art, and the Institute of American Indian Arts Museum filled with Native American art infused with political

commentary. We also liked the New Mexico History Museum located behind the historic Palace of the Governors, showcasing the history of New Mexico. Throughout this week, one of my favorite places was in and around historic downtown near the Plaza. This is a one-block square adjacent to the Palace of the Governors, the original seat of government since the time of Spanish colonization. There is so much more to enjoy in Santa Fe so my plan is to return someday to attend the "Indian Market" which is one of the "biggest event of the



year and an annual favorite for thousands of collectors and fans." This is supposed to be the worlds biggest and best Native American art market during the summer. This was one week of our two-week December trip to visit a family member and take advantage of a time share exchange. Stay tuned for part two detailing a trip to Phoenix in next month's *Libretto*.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

TWO TREE RESTAURANT



Two Tree Restaurant, located in Millington, Maryland, "population 450 and no, they didn't omit any 0s," is as impressive in food and service as it is in warmth and ambiance. Established in 2008, owner Dennis Hager and Chef Brian Carter combine small town originality and elegance with excellent upscale food. Carol Hodges tried this restaurant and Bruce and I got curious. So one dark evening we drove to Millington and repeatedly drove around this charming town

over and over until we finally found <u>Two Tree Restaurant</u>. The modest outside did not prepare us for the warm and cozy, yet chic inside décor. Friendly staff greeted and seated us at a welcoming table.

We started with the "Grilled Duck Sausage." This was served with a delicious mix of aged Welsh cheddar, sweet onion relish, and fresh berries. Delicious and different comes to mind. Talk about different, the waitress recommended Chef Brian's featured appetizer, Frog Legs. Wow, this will be a first! Delicate and flavorful, the tender legs were delicious. Next up, the "Lump Crab Bisque" was thickly filled with jumbo lumps of crab with a sweet sherry flavor. If that wasn't enough, we tried Chef Brian's featured "Lamb Osso Bucco" and shared the "Beef Short Ribs". The beef short ribs were braised boneless in veal demi-glace and served with wild mushroom garlic mashed potatoes and vegetable of the day. Other dishes that looked luscious enough to ask about were the Pork Tenderloin, Chicken Napoleon, Rockfish, and Roasted Duck. Chef Brian sears the "Pork Tenderloin" with Two Tree's own mild jerk rub which is served with + fresh mango salsa and Caribbean rice and peas. The "Chicken Napoleon" consists of chicken

breast medallions "sautéed and layered with baby spinach, fire roasted peppers and melted fresh mozzarella." This dish is finished with white wine butter sauce and served with fingerling potatoes. The "*Rockfish*" is pan-seared and "topped with grilled tomatoes and jumbo lump crab butter served over rice pilaf" and the slow-roasted duck with Grand Marnier-dried sherry glace is served with "savory long grain-wild rice and roasted cauliflower".

We recommend this "casual, elegant and family friendly" restaurant to our SV neighbors. "What's Up" magazine said the "food and service is outstanding." "Great crab cakes too," they said. We can't wait to go back and try Two Tree's breads and pies, baked fresh on the premises. *Go give the Tree, a try!*

The address is 401 Cypress Street, Millington, MD. 21651. 410-928-5887. Daily menu features local products. Seating is from 11 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. daily; to 9:30 p.m. Friday & Saturday. Reservation encouraged. The restaurant is located at the corner of Cypress and Sassafras (MD 291 and MD 313) in the heart of downtown Millington.


MUSHROOMS AND SOUR CREAM CASSEROLE

From the Kitchen of Joan Hennessey

6 T. butter or margarine
2 tsp. prepared mustard
3 T. flour
1 (16-oz.) ctn. sour cream
1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 tsp. pepper

¹/₄ c. parsley, minced 2 lbs. fresh mushrooms, sliced

2 tsp. salt



Melt butter in saucepan over low heat; blend in flour. Cook 1 to 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Stir in sour cream and add remaining ingredients except mushrooms. Cook until heated through. Remove from heat. Combine sauce and mushrooms. Pour into greased 2 ½ quart casserole. Bake at 350° for 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

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
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
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
