Maintaining a People-Friendly / Pet-Friendly Community



As a People-Friendly / Pet-Friendly community, we strive to maintain an environment that enables us to harmoniously co-exist with each other and with our winged and 4-legged residents.

In addition to our common-sense rules (e.g., no-noise, no-junk, etc.) to facilitate peaceful existence with our human neighbors, we also have a SV [Pet Policy](#).

It's a simple formula, designed for us to show mutual respect for one another. In summary, our [Pet Policy](#) and the [Queen Anne County Animal Control Article III, 9-21\(a\)](#) regulations include, but are not limited to, the following nuisance offenses:

- owners with unleashed animals,
- owners who allow their animals to defecate or urinate on another homeowner's private property,
- owners who allow their animals to defecate on Symphony Village common property without immediately cleaning it up and disposing of it at their own home,
- owners who allow their animals to excessively bark, howl, or make other harsh noises.

Due to increasing complaints regarding offenses throughout the community, this policy will be strictly enforced, effective immediately. The above rules apply to all SV residents and visitors, with residents being responsible for ensuring compliance by their visitors and equipping them with the necessary supplies for waste disposal.

Committee of 1812 Fundraiser: The History of Rum

The Queen Anne’s County War of 1812 Committee announces four fundraisers to be held in 2012 featuring food and beverages of the 1812 period. Each event will include wine tasting accompanied by food of the times. The committee is raising money to purchase commemorative signs to mark War of 1812 historic sites within the county. Signage will include the 1812 War Monument that will mark the site at Slippery Hill in Grasonville where a small band of QAC men stood and faced down more than 300 British soldiers.



The January fundraiser will feature the History of Rum, specifically Mount Gay Rum which was one of several rums imbibed here in 1812. The fundraiser will take place on two nights: **Friday, January 20**, 4 – 7 p.m. at Centreville Liquors and **Friday, January 27**, 4 – 7 p.m. at The Winery in Chester. There is no set fee, but donations are requested either in cash or by check made out to “Early Wars of Queen Anne’s County.”

The liquor laws of QAC do not allow the tasting of hard liquor in QAC stores. However, the vendors of the various liquors will be assisting in the sponsorship and will be featured exclusively during the wine tastings.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

THE RED ZONE PIZZERIA

When you enter Red Zone, you can feel the energy and delicious aromas when you either sit down and eat or order take-out. Since we have eaten here, the food is always freshly prepared and delicious. The owner, Hasan Uzun, busy cooking and running his establishment, says he hails from a small Turkish town called Giresun. Did you know that he wears three hats—owner, chef, and delivery person? Mr. Uzun says he is proud that his business is a certified green establishment and that twice it has been voted “Best Carry-out” by Queen Anne’s County residents.

Choices abound with *Gourmet Pizza, Stromboli, Steaks, Burgers, Hot Sandwiches, and Hot and Cold Subs and Wraps*. Did you know that Red Zone also features the new *Rustic* choices such as *Chicken Balsamico Rustico* and *Cheese Steak Rustic*? They come with waffle fries that are delicious. I love their *Fresh Wings (Naked)*, but you can get them breaded, boneless, spicy, and as chicken fingers. Also yummy and fresh are their hot subs, especially the *Eggplant Parmesan* and *Meatball Parmesan*.

Don’t forget to try their *Complete Dinners*, which are fresh and delicious. I recommend trying their *Flounder Dinner* or *Crab Cake Dinner*. However, it’s really hard to choose because the *4-Piece Fried Chicken Dinner* is also delicious! Although everyone has favorite pizza choices, Red Zone offers fresh and gourmet pizzas that may compete with your established favorites. One to try is their *White Supreme Pizza with Ricotta and Mozzarella Cheese, Tomatoes, Broccoli, and Fresh Garlic* or their *Vegetarian Pizza with Mushrooms, Tomatoes, Onions, Green Peppers, and Black Olives*.

So for those of you who have just moved to SV, or if you haven't given the "Old World Quality" of Red Zone Pizzeria a try, do call or stop by. Red Zone's flavors may be far away and old world, but the food is cooked right around the corner from SV, and their prices are reasonable!

RECIPE

Crispy Oven-Baked Chicken

from the kitchen of Linda Blume

2 large bone-in chicken breasts	1½ teaspoon dry oregano
1 cup milk	1 teaspoon dry basil
1 tablespoon vinegar	½ teaspoon dry thyme
½ cup water	1-2 cups dry seasoned breadcrumbs



Cut each chicken breast crosswise into thirds.

Mix milk and vinegar. Let sit for 5 minutes.

Add water, oregano, basil, and thyme to milk mixture. Stir well. Put into a plastic bag.

Add chicken pieces to the bag, mix, close the bag, and refrigerate 2-4 hours.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Grease a glass baking dish. Place breadcrumbs in a shallow bowl.

Take each chicken piece out of the marinade, shake off excess, dredge in breadcrumbs, and place in the baking dish.

Bake, uncovered, 40 minutes or until done.

Copper Creations



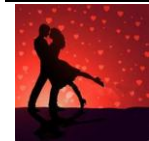
