# **CLUBS AND CLASSES**

#### SYMPHONY VILLAGE BIRD CLUB

#### <u>Field Trip</u>

A small contingent of the SV Bird Club traveled to Pickering Creek on March 31 for a bird banding discussion and demonstration. The day began on a high note when we saw two bald eagles perched in the top of a tall tree on Taylor Mill Road just before Route 213. One or both eagles are often seen perching there – look for them when you drive out.

At Pickering Creek, volunteers based at the Ward Museum began by describing <u>why</u> birds are banded and <u>how</u> birds are banded. Each band was described as a bird's social security number, completely unique. A record was set recently when a bird banded in 1956 was re-captured – that's 56 years being banded plus an estimated six years old at the time of banding. Wow! There is data on over 60 <u>million</u> banded birds at the Bird Banding Laboratory in Laurel, Maryland, where data from the United States, Canada, and parts of Mexico can be researched.

Four mist nets had been set up along Pickering Creek trails that morning. The first time we checked the nets – nothing. Wasn't looking good. We adjourned to the Welcome Center for more discussion. We checked the nets again – still nothing. It wasn't looking any better. So we went on a short bird walk and saw tree swallows, sparrows, coots, red-winged blackbirds, a bald eagle, bluebirds, starlings, a chickadee, juncos, and vultures. We even noticed a nesting box for native solitary bees – who knew solitary bee nesting boxes even existed? Back to the reason we were there – will the third time be the charm?



Yes! One little sparrow is lightly snagged in a net. Gently, ever so gently, the bird's legs, then wings were detached from the gossamer netting, and the bird was placed in a catch bag for the short walk back to the Welcome Center where the banding would be done.

The bird was identified as a dull morph white-throated sparrow. Its leg was banded and the number recorded on the

banding log; its wing was measured and recorded, as was its tail length. Time for a weigh-in: the bird was placed head first into a painted toilet tissue tube glued to a square of cardboard, weighed head-down on the scale, and the weight recorded. When carried to the open door, it quickly flew to a nearby evergreen, maybe reflecting on what had just happened.

#### Spring Has Sprung! Time to Check Your Dryer Vent!

As birds begin to choose nesting sites, it is time to check the outside cover over your clothes dryer vent. If the cover is the <u>least</u> bit ajar, you may have starlings or robins deciding it is the <u>perfect</u> nesting site. **You don't want that to happen – what a mess!** To prevent the possibility,



cover the vent with plastic mesh or chicken wire. Make sure the mesh openings are large enough for excess lint to fly out and away from the house.

If you already have your dryer vent covered, check it often to make sure there isn't a buildup of lint that has <u>not</u> made it all the way to the

great outdoors. There could be serious consequences if this opening is clogged.

#### Energy Saving Ceiling Light by Bob Offerman

In our Gershwin, we have one ceiling light that is used several hours each day – the one over the kitchen sink. It would be nice to replace that 65 watt energy hog with something that consumes much less electricity... as long as it doesn't look like an industrial light.

I've been waiting to replace it until an LED replacement was available that had the same "color" as conventional incandescent flood lights.



Well, it's here – a 10.5 watt LED floodlight that seems brighter than its 65 equivalent watt rating, and has similar "warmth". The latest version only draws 9.5 watts. It is dimmable. The box is marked as "CREE 65 watt equivalent ecosmart 499 485". It's sometimes referred to a "CR 6". Price is about \$35 each, available online at Amazon.com or EBay; also Home Depot and others.

Installation is easy – instructions are on the box. The trick is to remove the old trim by unhooking the two springs that hold it up, and then to remove the support bracket by removing its thumbscrew.

We don't use our ceiling lights enough to justify replacing all of them, but replacing the lamp over the sink will be worth it. At an electric rate of \$.10, it'll take about 6300 hours for the lamp to pay for itself, followed by another 29,000 hours of expected lamp life. At 6 hours of use per day, the lamp will last about 16 years and will have paid for itself after the first 3 years. And electric rates are bound to rise, making it even more attractive in the future.

## **RESTAURANT REVIEW**

#### Maria's Sicilian Ristorante and Café



Unless you crave seeing spectacular and active volcanoes of the central Mediterranean while you're savoring Sicilian cuisine, just take yourself to *Maria's Sicilian Ristorante and Café* to savor the cooking of Chef Jose at this decades old restaurant in historic downtown Annapolis. Owner Maria still visits tables and greets guests at her charming restaurant, as she and Proprietor Charlie Priola, preside over this romantic and cozy Annapolis fixture. Maria's offers lunch with a "*pre-fixe*" or a full lunch menu of authentic Sicilian cuisine. Some delicious choices are the *Linguini Alla Vongole* of fresh clams sautéed in garlic, olive oil, and white wine. I love the *Quattro Stagioni*, a brick oven pizza consisting of artichoke hearts, green peppers, mushrooms, prosciutto, and tomato sauce topped with mozzarella.

The dinner menu abounds with choices of meat, chicken, veal, fish, and a broad choice of pasta dishes. Yummy choices are the *Antipasti Caldi*, and hot and cold appetizers such as the *Mozzarella Carrozza* consisting of mozzarella cheese wrapped in Italian bread, then fried and topped with anchovy cream sauce. You just have to try their *Zuppe* from their dinner menu and my choice is the *Stracciattella* or Sicilian wedding soup. Next, I recommend the *Pollo Gamberi Mona Lisa* consisting of chicken and shrimp sautéed in olive oil and white wine then tossed with broccoli, asparagus, mushrooms and peas in a Romano cheese cream sauce served over risotto. Some sweet choices to complete your experience are Maria's *Cassata* cake, *Creamsicle Cheesecake* or a fresh *Cannoli*.

So if you still like white tablecloths, excellent service, and culinary influences of Spain, North Africa, and Greece, then try the deeply delicious flavors of Maria's. Watch out, you may soon wonder where Maria hid the Volcanoes!

Lunch prices range from \$5-\$17. Dinner pricing seems typical of most fine dining at Annapolis restaurants.

 containers (6 oz.) key lime pie flavor light yogurt

1 tub (8 oz.) fat-free whipped topping, thawed

- In large, heat- resistant bowl, dissolve gelatin in boiling water.
- Stir in yogurt with a wire whisk.
- Fold in whipped topping with wooden spoon.
- Spread in crust. Refrigerate overnight.
- Garnish with a slice of fresh lime






