BIRD CLUB – Linda Blume

A small contingent of the Bird Club traveled to Pickering Creek Audubon Center earlier this month. After days and days of rain and clouds and generally gloomy weather, the sunshine felt fantastic. Our walk began slowly with very few birds being spotted, but eventually we saw more and more. A member of the Talbot County Bird Club was extraordinary at identifying birds on the wing as well as flitting quickly through the brush. A few birds did sit



still long enough for us to see them with our binoculars. I think the highlight was seeing several ruby-crowned kinglets – my first sighting. We also saw 21 other kinds of birds, including bald eagles, bluebirds, and lots of white-throated sparrows. Our next trip will be on Saturday, December 1, to attend the 50th Anniversary Celebration and Open House at Eastern Neck NWR in Rock Hall. The day's schedule of events will be posted on <u>Eastern Neck NWR</u>, and we'll then decide what specific events to attend. GAZEBO and VICTORY GARDEN

Gazebo Garden - Jack Hennessey

Many residents found the Gazebo Garden a pleasant place to have lunch. The warm spell in early November was a good opportunity to weed and get rid of unwanted plants. We are happy to report that Don Downey, one of our major workers in the past, has a respite from his travels and will be able to help with our cleanup. We will be providing spare crepe myrtle bushes to two residents who have requested them. We have had a few problems this year. One of our sprinklers disappeared, some hornets made a nest in one of our benches, and our water supply was cut off and the pipes drained. Since we still had flowers growing, Jack had to carry buckets of water to save the flowers. This was all eliminated when we had our first major frost on November 5 that killed all of the remaining flowers. We expect to fill 8 or 10 plastic bags with weeds, which Steve Guy will use for his compost pile. Good idea Steve!

<u>Victory Garden</u> – Jack Hennessey

There is not much activity in the Victory Garden, which is pretty much covered with weeds. Jack has a few radishes, beets, and leaf lettuce growing; and Richard has a lot of arugula. The farmer has harvested his soy beans and will soon be cultivating. If the timing is right, he will plow our area, as well as his own area for winter wheat. All gardeners are requested to remove all cages, fences, stakes, and stones to make cultivating easy. Dave Peterson hopes to till our area before Thanksgiving. He will till it again in time for the St. Patrick's Day planting of peas, cabbage, and potatoes. Overall, we had a very successful garden year in 2012. We did have one problem. There was a large hornets' nest in a tree on the path to the garden, and Pat Murphy got stung three times on the head. Jack got a can of hornet spray with a 20-foot spray reach and eliminated the problem.

READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – Jack Hennessey

The Book Club met on October 15 to discuss the book *The Cellist of Sarajevo* by Steven Galloway. This book was recommended by Jack Hennessey. It also happens to be the annual selection by the One Maryland-One Book Program, to be read by all Marylanders for 2012. This program is spearheaded by



the Enoch Pratt Free Library. In addition to the cellist, the story follows the lives of three others: a baker, a young father, and especially a female sniper. One day a shell lands in a bread line and kills 22 people. The cellist vows to sit where the shell fell and play Albinoni's Adagio once a day for the 22 people killed. The sniper is assigned to protect the cellist. All residents are encouraged to read this thrilling tale! The Centreville library has many copies

of this book. Jack provided pumpkin dip and ginger snaps (made by Joan) for dessert.

The book for our November 20 meeting is *Once We Were Brothers* by Ronald H. Balson. This book was recommended by Lee Ettman. *Once We Were Brothers* is the compelling tale of two boys and a family that struggles to survive in war-torn Poland. Sixty years later, a wealthy Chicago philanthropist is accused of being a former Nazi SS Officer. This book is a fast-paced thriller and well worth reading!

Correct Operation of the Clubhouse's Main Front Door

As you all know, the main entrance to the Clubhouse has an ADA Compliant Door. This door is controlled from the outside with a "key card." When entering the building, it is mandatory that no one stand in front of the door while someone else is using their key card to activate opening. The door simply will not open if someone is standing in the way. Also, when entering, do not linger in the door opening – the automatic recycling mechanism cannot work when someone is standing in the opening. Also mandatory, do not pull on the door handle to "hasten" the door's opening – you will cause damage to the mechanism. When exiting the building, you can use the automatic door opener touch pad to the left of the doorway *or* you can gently push on either the right hand or the left hand door to open that door (this is contrary to rumor – the left door, when exiting, can be pushed gently by hand to open without causing damage to the mechanism). Sombrero Mexican Kitchen By Karin Anne Larsen

Bienvenidos! Sombrero Mexican Kitchen welcomes you with great food, service, and ambiance. Do you enjoy dining in a clean, bright, and cheerful atmosphere while eating freshly prepared foods? If you like fresh veggies, homemade sauces, and handrolled burritos served by friendly staff, then come say hello to Gennaro DiBenedetto (owner of Carmine's NY Pizza Kitchen). He and Mexican native, Martin Hernandez Zarate (recognizable from Carmine's) joined forces in 2012 to open Sombrero Mexican Kitchen. Their goal is to provide customers zesty and flavorful

tastes of Mexico in a casual eatery where patrons can feel "right at home in our casa."

My *Café Don Juan* along with my delicious "Loco Lunch" deal of a *Steak Bonita Fajita*, actually did give me that warm homey feeling. The presentation of skirt steak marinated in fresh citrus, Mexican seasoning, grilled with green peppers and onion was delightful – so was the equally tasty *Carnita Gordita*, tender slow roasted pork and pickled red onions with Mexican rice and black beans, sampled by my lunch mate. On a return visit for dinner, two of us tried the *Chile Relleno*, hand-battered fresh poblano pepper stuffed with Mexican cheeses, topped with fresh tomato sauce and sour cream, and *Shrimp Tacos* consisting of mango-habanero shrimp grilled with a creamy shredded cabbage mix with fresh cilantro and queso fresco. Do try a refreshing margarita shaken with Sombrero's own sour mix of fresh squeezed limes added to a choice of 20 unique tequilas with your dinner.

Please don't miss the tantalizing desserts Sombrero's offers. Try the *Sopapillas, Fried Ice Cream*, or the *Tres Leches Cake* (a super moist vanilla milk cake with a light cream frosting). The *Xango* fried cheese

cake burrito served with vanilla ice cream and garnished with strawberries is delicious. RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Even More Special Chicken Salad

From the Kitchen of Janet O'Connor

2 cups small-cubed, rotisserie chicken (combination of white and dark meat)

½ cup chopped dried fruit (cranberries, golden raisins, etc.) or

1 cup seedless green grapes halved

½ cup (2 oz.) finely chopped Swiss cheese

½ cup sliced celery

3 tablespoons sliced green onions

½ cup sour cream

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1/4 cup toasted sliced almonds

Combine all ingredients. Refrigerate.

Best flavor when made 8 hours ahead of serving.

Serve on potato rolls, in wraps, or in cream puffs. Serves 4-6.







