## READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB - Jack Hennessey

The Book Club met at the Clubhouse on January 15 to discuss the book Cutting for Stone, by Abraham Verghese, a medical doctor. He seems set on demonstrating his intimate knowledge of surgical procedures, much to the reader's dismay. He also gives lengthy descriptions of the game of cricket, which for the uninitiated, is another distraction. In spite of these, the story is interesting and exciting. The setting is primarily in Ethiopia during the time of Haile Selassie. Most club members are old enough to remember this as a time of revolution. The setting moves back and forth between Ethiopia and New York City. The primary characters are twin brothers, born to a beautiful Indian nun and a British surgeon. Orphaned by their mother's death in childbirth and their father's disappearance, the brothers come of age in the time of revolution. This book is an unforgettable story of love and betrayal, medicine, and ordinary miracles, and two brothers whose lives are forever entwined. It is interesting to note that the title for the book comes from the Hippocratic Oath still taken by doctors. In early Greek times, physicians were distinguished from surgeons. Physicians were instructed to leave surgery to surgeons. This book was recommended by Joan Hennessey, who provided a delicious homemade coconut custard pie and beverage for dessert.


The Book Club will meet on February 19, 7 p.m., in the Clubhouse to discuss the book The Book Thief, recommended by June Silverman. The story starts in Germany near the start of WWII. It details the adventures of a young girl, given up for adoption, and raised by her foster parents in Munich, over the course of the war. It is very interesting to see how she becomes the book thief, and how her stepfather becomes the most beloved person in her life.

## BIRD CLUB - Linda Blume



The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) will take place February 15-18. It is an annual 4-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are. Everyone is welcome - from beginning bird watchers to experts. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or you can count for as long as you like each day of the event. Participants tally the number of individual birds of each species they see during their count period and enter these numbers on the GBBC website. Go to the website for all the details and to read highlights from last year.

The Eagle Cam at Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge has been replaced and is now showing a bald eagle nest on the refuge in real time. When the new camera came on-line, they were surprised to see three eggs already in the nest, so hatch time can only be approximated to mid-February. After the disaster at the nest last year, hopefully this year's new family will thrive. For sure, it's fun to watch! The new Osprey Cam is not yet on-line as we go to press, but since the osprey
 don't return until mid-March, hopefully that camera will be fully functional by then.


## Symphony Village Alarmers???

How would you like to be part of a team that distributes food and drink from a mobile canteen to Queen Anne's County Fire and Emergency Personnel during major fires or other emergencies? Sound interesting? Read on.

Personnel from the QAC Emergency Services (ES) presented an idea to our CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) hoping that Symphony Village residents would embrace a canteen project as something they would be proud to do to aid firefighters, EMTs,
 paramedics, police, and others during emergencies in QAC.

In a nutshell, the QAC ES and the QAC Fire Departments would provide a bus modified into a canteen vehicle and reimburse us for the cost of food and drink to stock the vehicle. SV would provide input to the plans and design of the interior of the canteen, and selection of the foods and drink that would be distributed. Once we have the plan and vehicle in place, SV would provide the manpower to respond to ES requests to send the canteen vehicle to multi-alarm fires/disasters. SV persons would serve emergency personnel with items such as canned soups, stew, hot dogs, sandwiches, coffee, tea, bottled water, Gatorade, or whatever, from the canteen.

## Protect Your Home - Whole House Surge Protector by Bob Offerman

Power outages and lightning strikes are two of the less endearing aspects of life on the Eastern Shore. They are also two major causes of power surges on our power, telephone, and cable TV services. In the last several years, surges on electric lines have caused a number of damaged TVs, heating/cooling systems, and appliance (washer/dryer) failures throughout Symphony Village. Damage is most likely to occur if the equipment is operating at time of the surge.
Damage can also be caused by surges entering the house through telephone or cable TV lines. These surges typically damage modems, TV sets, and telephone answering machines. Equipment may be damaged even if not operating.

A surge protector works by diverting electrical surges to ground. There are several types of surge protectors available. The two most common are point-of-use protectors and whole house protectors.


Almost all of us have small point-of-use suppressors (usually look like outlet strips) protecting our TV sets and computers. Many of them include protection for the telephone lines and cable TV feeds that are fed through them. If properly sized (minimum 1500 joules for electric feeds), they should provide protection from all but very severe surges. To play it safe, these protectors should be replaced every 4-5 years because they "wear out" electrically. (Some protectors have an indicator light that shows if they're still working properly.) These small protectors do not protect the other electrical equipment in your home such as heating/cooling, washer/dryer, water heaters, ranges, microwave ovens, etc.

The electrical system of your entire house can be protected with a whole house surge protector that is connected to the circuit breaker box in your garage. Because it is located at a point of entry into your home, it protects everything behind it inside the house.


After some research, the unit I selected was a Square D Surge breaker SDSB1175C. It can be flush mounted in the wall alongside the circuit breaker box, and attaches to the breaker box through a dedicated $20-\mathrm{amp}$ dual circuit breaker. It has two green LED lamps that show the unit is functioning properly. It has replaceable parts if needed. It also has modules to protect incoming cable TV and telephone lines. These modules can be easily relocated to the Honeywell "smart box" where those wires come into the house. (In our Gershwin, it's located under the burglar alarm in the laundry room.)
Although the list price is much higher, these units can be purchased online from Home Depot and Lowes for under $\$ 250$. Add in the cost of the required dual circuit breaker and the total parts cost is under $\$ 300$. That price does not include installation.

## Important - Whole house surge protectors should only be installed by a qualified electrician because of the shock hazard involved.

## NEW CANTON RESTAURANT

Villagers, when your food energy is depleted, regain your balance by driving 15 minutes to "New Canton Restaurant" for healthy body and soul Chinese food. Under new ownership, new management, and a new chef for the last year, "New Canton Restaurant" offers an exciting spectrum of delicious food choices,
 friendly service, and a calm atmosphere. In fact, it was the case recently when four of us sampled four tempting entrees that impressed our respective taste buds. To start with, the freshly prepared Dim Sum was scrumptious as were the Hot and Sour and Egg Drop soups. Next, we received huge hot platters of delectable General Tso's Chicken, delicious Szechuan Beef, and spicy Szechuan Pork. and Chow Pa Chun. The Chow Pa Chun consisted of duck, sliced roast chicken, jumbo shrimp, and roast pork combined with perfectly prepared vegetables, including mushrooms, snow peas, and bamboo shoots. The four of us found the food incredibly palate pleasing. Based on prior visits, you may wish to sample the Mayo Shrimp with Walnuts, Sesame Chicken, and Sweet and Sour Pork. Hot Tea comes with the meal, as do homemade almond cookies for dessert. Additional positives are that the chef does not use MSG; there is a full service bar; and patrons are encouraged to request their favorite dishes if not on the menu. What more can you ask for? Yes, there are some Thai choices, a healthy choice menu, daily chef specials, and very reasonable pricing that won't empty your wallet. Oh, and you can call me if you can't find anyone to go with. I'll drive!

## RECIPE DF THE MONTH

## Beef and Cheddar Pie

From the Kitchen of Linda Blume

$11 / 2$ pound ground beef
1 cup finely chopped onion
$1 / 2$ tsp. dry mustard
$1 / 2$ tsp. salt
$1 / 4$ tsp. pepper
$1 / 4$ cup all-purpose flour
$11 / 2$ cup extra sharp shredded cheddar cheese
2 crust refrigerated pie crust

- Take pie crust out of the refrigerator.
- Preheat oven to 425 degrees.
- Cook ground beef and onion until both are done.
- Sprinkle dry mustard, salt, pepper, and flour onto beef mixture. Cook 3-4 minutes, stirring constantly.
- Stir in cheddar, take off heat, and set aside to cool slightly.
- Fit one crust of dough into a 9" pie plate.
- Spoon in beef mixture.
- Top with second crust and crimp edges.
- Cut several vents into top of pie.
- Bake 20-30 minutes or until crust is golden brown.
- Let sit for 10 minutes before serving.

Note: Serve with a large green salad.
