

BIRD CLUB — Linda Blume



The ruby-throated hummingbirds continue to flock to my feeder now that child-rearing is over for this summer. The aerial acrobatics that

both male and female employ to protect the food source are really fun to watch as they begin to bulk up in preparation for their epic fall migration to Mexico and Central and South America. Recently, while two males were frantically chasing each other, a female (who had been hovering in hiding under Shasta Daisy leaves) slowly rose straight up like a mini-helicopter, landed on the feeder rim, and proceeded to drink nectar while the males continued their dance. I've seen this scenario played out many times in years past. I've also observed that females will share my 6-feeding-hole feeder, but males will not. Several times, I've seen a hummingbird sitting on my shepherd's hook taking a bath in light rain showers – adorable! Let me know some of your bird-watching stories from this year.

I'm seeing more butterflies this year than last, but the number is still fewer than a few years ago. My patio pot of parsley has hosted several broods of Eastern Black Swallowtail butterfly caterpillars – I grow the parsley more for them than for me.



We haven't had any Club field trips lately, but I hope to re-start that, plus have a pavilion picnic, this fall. Stay tuned for details.



GAZEBO and VICTORY GARDENS

The weeding party on June 15 was so successful that another party was scheduled for August 10 at 10 a.m. All gardeners were invited, along with any other resident who wanted to help. Ten bags of hardwood mulch have already been delivered to the gazebo

tomatoes, and many of these have been shared with residents. For some reason,



LUNCH BUNCH – Marge Strano and Bea Trotta



READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – *Jack Hennessey*

At the July 18 meeting, we discussed the book *And the Mountains Echoed* by Khaled Hosseini. This book received a rating of 8.0 (on a scale of 1 to 10). This is a very popular book, and I was #22 on the waiting list at the Centreville Library, so I bought a copy. The club has begun selecting copies of recent publications, because many members were reporting that they had read the latest selections "a year or two ago."

For our August 15 meeting, the selection was *The Silver Star* by Jeanette Walls, recommended by Dorthea Turek. This is a heartbreaking and redemptive novel about an intrepid girl who challenges the injustice of the adult world – a triumph of imagination and storytelling. It is 1970 in a small town in California. "Bean" Holladay is 12 and her sister, Liz, is 15 when their artistic mother, Charlotte, takes off to find herself, leaving the



girls enough money for a month or two. Bean and Liz decide to take a bus to Virginia where their uncle Tinsley lives in a decaying mansion that has been in Charlotte's family for generations. The girls start school where Bean easily adjusts, but Liz is withdrawn. Then something serious happens to Liz. Read this novel to learn the surprising turn of events.

CERT CANTEEN PROJECT



The Symphony Village Community Emergency Response Team has taken on a project to convert a used QAC Adult Medical Bus into the QAC Fire and EMS Canteen. When completed, SV folks will serve beverages and snacks from the canteen to QAC Fire and Emergency Medical Service personnel during major fires, other disasters, and training drills.

Initial work on this project

has been to remove or relocate the seats, remove the existing lettering on the outside, and wash and polish the bus. Near future modifications include the installation of a pass-through serving window, a serving counter, and a work table. Longer term plans are to install generator-powered

electric, propane, a food preparation area, and plumbing and sinks.



Physical work thus far has been accomplished by Ron Dillon, Steve Hardy, Dennis Marchi, Steve Guy, Ron Brown, Bob Linkins, and George Drake. Work is done in a shed at Pintail Point, thanks to coordination and access by Royce Holm.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

EASTON DINER

There's no doubt about it. Diners offer comfort food and Easton Diner is no exception. Easton Diner is locally owned and was established November 2008 by joint owners, Cookie and Alan. Their diner amply fits Wikipedia's definition of the diner that is characterized by offering a wide range of foods (mostly American), a casual atmosphere, a counter, and late operating hours. Unlike restaurant chains, diners will usually try to customize their menu to local cuisines and their prices to local patrons.

Easton Diner caters well to Eastern Shore folks by featuring a large choice of seafood dishes. You can order a delectable bowl of *Cream of Crab* soup paired with one of the best salad bars around or select an entrée which comes with two sides, salad bar, soup, and dessert. One of my favorites is the *Open Face*

Crabmeat Imperial Melt. Yours may be the Fried Crab Cake Deli Sandwich or the Sliced Turkey Hoagie. Both are served with soup, French fries, and coleslaw

Some of the *House Specialties* that stand out are the *Broiled Seafood Combination* of shrimp, scallops, crab cake, and flounder. I recommend trying the *Easton Diner Special*, featuring a 12 oz. rib-eye steak with stuffed shrimp, stuffed mushrooms, rice pilaf, and vegetable. On a visit last month, two of us chose this diner's deliciously prepared *Easton Chicken*, a sautéed chicken breast with three cheeses and chicken gravy with two vegetables, and a *Veal Parmigiana Sandwich* which was tasty and tender. One of our friends tried the *Seafood Trap*, a broiled combination of scallops and shrimp, the salad bar, and two vegetables. Two of us shared the *Roast Turkey* with stuffing, giblet gravy, and cranberry sauce and the *Broiled Tuna Steak*. Each entrée we sampled was cooked well and seasoned nicely. Overall, the feeling was that the Chef here is using good ingredients in recipes prepared with pizzazz.

The menu features ten different *Senior Citizen Meals*, none of which exceed \$11.99, which are paired with soup du jour or salad bar, one vegetable, and pudding or ice cream. For the grandchildren or great-grandchildren, Easton Diner offers meals for ages 12 and under, and they are served with milk or soda and choice of dessert for \$6.99. Last but not least, are their breakfast offerings. Some of us from SV have enjoyed *Hotcakes*, *Specialty Omelettes, Waffles*, and *Club Breakfasts*. The breakfasts are quite enjoyable.

Diners often elicit romance with the old days. I dare you to pass by the pastry display next to the register without a memory or two about some enjoyed diner experience from

the past. Venture east to "a gathering place for honest-to-goodness, unpretentious grub," as one nostalgic diner stated.

Easton Diner is located at 8451 Ocean Gateway in Easton (just past the Holiday Inn Express). The telephone number is 410-819-0535 or 0536. Open 7 days per week. Hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 11 p.m.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

From the kitchen of Carol Hodges

Mexican Lasagna

1 lb. extra lean ground beef or turkey ½ large onion, chopped
1 large clove garlic, minced
1 ½ cups low-fat cottage cheese
1 cup fat-free sour cream
1 can (4 ounces) chopped green chili peppers
½ cup chopped cilantro (optional)

2 tsp. ground cumin

1/8 tsp. salt

2 1/2 cups salsa

4 whole wheat tortillas (6" in diameter)

1 1/4 cup (5 oz.) shredded, reduced-fat Monterey Jack cheese

- Preheat oven to 350° F and coat 13" x 9" baking dish with cooking spray.
- Cook ground beef or turkey over medium heat in large nonstick skillet, turning several times, for 5 minutes or until no longer pink.
- Remove the meat to a medium bowl. Wipe the skillet with a paper towel. Coat the skillet with cooking spray. Add the onion and garlic. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally for 7 to 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Add to the meat in the bowl.
- In another medium bowl, combine the cottage cheese, sour cream, peppers, cilantro (if using), cumin, and salt.
- Spread 1 cup of the salsa across the bottom of the baking dish. Arrange half of the tortillas evenly over the salsa. (Halve 1 of the tortillas and quarter the other to fit evenly in the corners and sides.) Spread half of the cheese over the tortillas. Top with half of the meat mixture. Top with 1 cup of the remaining salsa and ½ cup of the Monterey Jack cheese. Repeat the layering sequence with the remaining tortillas, cheese, and meat mixture. Sprinkle with the remaining salsa and ¾ cup Monterey Jack cheese.
- Bake for 30 minutes or until heated through. Loosely cover with foil if the cheese browns too quickly.
