County Ride

Did you know that Queen Anne's County operates its own transit system? The service is available to the

general public, seniors, and disabled persons.

"County Ride" is a bus service with two

"deviated" routes. (A "deviated" route means that
the driver will deviate from the scheduled route for
a pick-up provided that doesn't make him late to
the next scheduled stop.) County Ride also offers
specialized services. You schedule a pick-up at
home, transportation to your desired destination
(doctor visits, shopping, hair appointments, etc.),
and a ride home. A variety of vehicles (not buses)
are used for this service. Fares for specialized

services range from \$2.50 for a roundtrip of ten miles or less up to \$10 for a trip of 50 miles or less. For more information, go to www.qac.org on your computer and click on the "Services" tab. When that page comes up, search for "County Ride."

"Routine" oral hygiene and check-ups are anything but "routine"



RESTAURANT REVIEW

BERTUCCI'S RESTAURANT

Lighting the fire at Bertucci's symbolizes the warmth, heart, and soul of this Italian restaurant. Before the door opens at Annapolis's Bertucci's, Ken Blanchard, ten-year managing partner, lights an authentic wood-fired brick oven. Baking or roasting their pizzas and other Italian dishes at temperatures of up to 650 degrees is what "coaxes out the natural flavors of our roasted and homemade dough," and creates many delicious culinary choices for lunch or dinner. Although 32-year-old

Bertucci's is a chain restaurant found mostly in the Mid-Atlantic and Northeastern states, it really doesn't feel like you're eating in one. It's no coincidence that an Italian immigrant started Bertucci's, because the food at Bertucci's tastes a little like you're eating Italian food in Rome. This may be due to the spices and flavors meshed together in the restaurant's intensely hot oven.

Do you have cravings for a delicious wood-fired pizza? Okay, drive 35 minutes on a good day and choose from 11 or so different choices, including your own crafted pizza. Try my favorite, the **Pucillo**, with pepperoni, sweet Italian sausage, mushrooms, peppers, onion, sauce, and cheese. Or without sauce, the **Pizza Verde** is delicious and lush with fresh mozzarella, prosciutto, and arugula spritzed

with a balsamic vinegar. A specialty coming out of the oven are the **Fruitte Di Mare**, a fisherman's stew of mussels, shrimp. and Pacific cod, simmered in a
light tomato and caper broth and served with grilled focaccia bread. From the **Classics** section of the menu, and new this fall, the **Roasted Eggplant Pomodoro**, is a sweet brick oven eggplant layered with house-made pomodoro
sauce (Italian tomato sauce, similar to marinara, "liquidy" yet lighter than
marinara) and finished with melted mozzarella over pasta. Or try the new **Sautéed Chicken Piccata** made with lemon, capers, white wine, Romano cheese,
and fresh herbs atop tender breaded chicken on fresh fettuccine. Two selections
from eleven or more different pasta dishes are the **Chicken Domani**, a
delightfully sautéed chicken, which is tossed in a white wine sage sauce with
pasta and spinach, finished with asiago cheese. Secondly, try the **Shrimp Rossini**, consisting of sautéed shrimp in a tomato cream sauce with capers, a hint
of hot pepper, and tossed with pasta.



Both starter and entrée salads are fresh and colorful. One to sample is the **Grilled Chicken Caesar**, Romaine lettuce with shaved asiago cheese tossed with Bertucci's own Caesar dressing with homemade garlic croutons. I like to pair one of their special soups with a small salad and maybe an appetizer such as **Sauteed Mussels** prepared with one pound of mussels, sweet Italian sausage simmered in spicy roasted garlic, tomato, and served with homemade focaccia. Another great offering at Bertucci's is the **Handcrafted \$7.99** lunch offered until 3 p.m. For SV lunch bunch folks, try the unlimited **Insalata** and **Fresh Baked Rolls**, with your choice of a sandwich or **Menucci** (flatbread). Also, don't forget the desserts. The **Tiramisu** and the **Five Layer Chocolate Cake** are awesome. You may also be tempted by the **Piccolo Flourless Chocolate Cake** and the **Italian Cheesecake**.

Come dine on delicious oven-fired Italian food and experience good service in a warm woodsy ambiance. Changing some of the words of The Doors' 1966 recording titled, "Light My Fire," but sung in a very Jose Feliciano way, take a drive to Bertucci's to "LIGHT YOUR FIRE."

2013 DANUBE RIVER CRUISE

On August 22, a group of intrepid travelers got on a bus for Dulles Airport where we boarded a plane for our flight to Frankfurt and then on to Prague, our ultimate destination being Budapest via the Danube Canal and River. With the change in time, Mary and I celebrated our anniversary somewhere over the Atlantic Ocean with glasses of wine. Linda and Bob Farrar's anniversary was a bit more formal. They marked their anniversary while onboard our ship with a cake with sparklers, surrounded by good friends.

Lest you think this was an exclusive Symphony Village group, I must tell you in addition to the Eastern Shore, our traveling friends were from Virginia, Massachusetts, Kentucky, and South Carolina.

Ah, where to begin without this sounding like a "dear diary" listing everything we did during our two-week trip.

Prague is a beautiful city, both cosmopolitan and old, located in the northern part of the Czech Republic on the Vulta River. Most of us toured the Prague Palace: Beautiful architecture with flying buttresses. Those who did not tour the palace experienced an impromptu feeding of a group of falcons. A highlight of our Prague stay was a tour to Cesky Kromlav, a quaint Czech town. There were lots of cobblestone paths with plenty of ups and downs and another beautiful castle. We enjoyed a great lunch, including local beer at the Krumlovsky Mlyn, an older restaurant that is part of an old mill. While in Prague, Mary and I hired a car and driver to take us to Poland, which is where her grandparents were born. Our destination was Jelenia Gora, a small town, completely untouristy. We ate lunch in a local pub where the bartender understood beer and soup!

We boarded the *AMA Lyra*, which would be our home for eight days, in Nuremburg. The ship was waiting for us on the Danube Canal, a manmade waterway which connects the Rhine Delta at Rotterdam to the Danube Delta at the Black Sea. Passing through many locks, some of which provided only about eight inches of clearance for our ship on each side, we reached a maximum height of 1200 feet above sea level, the highest point on earth currently reached by a ship.

Each day while on our cruise, we toured the surrounding countryside. The towns of Salzburg, Vienna, Melk, and Budapest were highlights. We visited the Schonbrunn Palace, the summer residence of a long line of Hapsburgs. Schonbrunn, meaning "beautiful spring," is a "typical" palace, consisting of 1,441 rooms and is surrounded by manicured gardens which seemingly stretch on forever.

While in Salzburg, we ate in a restaurant built in the late 15th Century. Not your typical fast food place! The Wiener schnitzel was the best we ever had; veal pounded very thin with just a light coating of flour. Of course we tasted and enjoyed the local beer.

Another highlight for us was the Lake Country of Austria, just outside of Salzburg. This is where some parts of the Sound of Music were filmed. If you liked the geography as depicted in the film, you would love being there in person.

Alas, all wonderful trips need to end. Our trip ended in Budapest, but not before an excursion to Szentendre, a small artsy town outside of the city; a trip to a local market; and thanks to our captain, a cruise at night to see the beautifully illuminated buildings of the city.



River cruising is different than ocean cruising. First no one was seasick or needed to wear those little patches behind the ears! Second, there are no sea days, so every day begins a new tour. The crew couldn't have been more helpful. Having only about 140 guests, the crew got to know our names and really went the extra mile to be sure we were enjoying ourselves.

After saying goodbye to new friends, we began our return trip home at 9:45 a.m. and arrived in Dulles at 3:45 p.m. We were tired but happy, having seen a number of the classic cities and small towns of Central Europe.


