Musings from the Board

Recently, management, an Operations Committee representative, and several Board Members met with John Kling from the Queen Anne's Department of Public Works to review the status of Ponds One and Two. It was determined that any woody vegetation within 15 feet of the concrete intakes or outtakes to the ponds has to be removed. Most of these were swamp oaks that have a tendency to spread in a low, ugly manner. These have since been removed from Pond Two. The landscapers also cut back all the vegetation around both ponds to a one-foot height. Future work will be to remove the swamp oaks around Pond One and to remove all the volunteer trees that have started to grow on the slope at the end of Encore Court. We continue to be hopeful that we will be allowed to increase the grooming around both ponds since the original grant has expired.


GARDEN CLUB – Jack Hennessey

JOY OF MUSIC – Eleanor Strietman


The "JOY OF MUSIC" returns to Symphony Village on January 27!


READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – Jack Hennessey

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chicken Noodle Soup

¹/₄ cup finely chopped shallots

2¹/₂ cups chicken broth*

¹/₂ cup finely diced celery

4 cups water

1 ¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon marjoram
¼ teaspoon thyme
3 oz. egg noodles, uncooked
pinch black pepper

- Place chicken skin side down in preheated 3-quart saucepan.
- Brown over medium heat for about 5 minutes.

1 chicken breast half, bone in, with skin $(\frac{3}{4}$ lb.)

- Remove chicken, reduce heat to low, add shallots, and stir a couple of minutes. Don't brown.
- Return chicken to pan, add remaining ingredients except noodles, and bring to a boil.
- Reduce heat to low simmer, leave pan uncovered, cook 30 minutes or until chicken is tender.
- Remove chicken and let cool. Discard bones and skin.
- Dice chicken and return it to pan. (Soup can be refrigerated at this point.)
- Just before serving, return soup to boil.
- Add noodles and cook until they are done.
