#### Monarch Butterflies Need You! -- Linda Blume

WHAN IN WEST

I recently attended "Milkweed for Monarchs," a presentation given by Jim Wilson at the QAC Library. Monarch butterflies are in decline. The monarchs that we see here in Maryland overwinter in Mexico. In 1996, over a billion monarchs overwintered there; in 2013, that number decreased to 33 million, a record low; and that is a decrease of 97%.



We can't do anything about some of the reasons for the decline: drought (milkweed plants die), cold springs (fewer butterfly generations), more acreage put into farming (loss of habitat for milkweed to grow), use of insecticides for crop pests (that also kill butterflies), etc. But we <u>can</u> do one very important thing: include plants in the milkweed family in our gardens. Monarchs need milkweed to survive. The caterpillars will only eat those leaves. If eggs are laid and hatch on any other plant, the caterpillars will

die. Without milkweed, there would be no monarch butterflies.

There are many varieties of milkweed, but these are easier to find: Tropical Milkweed/Bloodflower (Asclepias curassavica, an annual), Common Milkweed (Asclepias syriaca, a perennial), Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnate, a

perennial), and Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberose, a perennial).

It is also important to plant nectar plants for the adult butterflies. A good source list can be found online at <u>Recommended Nectar Plants</u>. These plants also attract hummingbirds.

# RECIPE OF THE MONTH from the kitchen of Barbara Locke

At the March Ladies' Happy Hour where we served different kinds of chili, many ladies asked for this recipe.

#### White Chicken Chili

1 can chopped green chilies, drained & strained

1 ½ cups shredded chicken breast (or more)

Shredded Monterey Jack cheese (topping)

2 T. olive oil

1 medium onion, chopped

3 T. flour

2 tsp. cumin

1 can (16 oz.) navy beans

1 can (16 oz.) cannelloni beans

• Cook onion in olive oil about 3 minutes until translucent.

- Add flour and stir until mixture is thickened.
- Add next 5 ingredients and simmer for about 2 hours. May need to add more chicken broth.

2 cups chicken broth

Chopped cilantro (topping)

(remove seeds)

- Add chicken breast and simmer on low until you want to serve the chili.
- Serve in bowls with the toppings.

I cook the chicken breasts in a pressure cooker 30 minutes. When done, they are easy to shred with a fork. Or they can be simmered for 2 - 3 hours. I cook them in chicken broth and re-use the broth.


