

GAZEBO GARDEN CLUB & VICTORY GARDEN - Steve Guy



At our August 19 meeting, we reviewed the novel *Broken for You*, by Stephanie Kallas. Ellen Reid recommended this book, which received an 8.0 rating on a scale of 1 to 10. The story displays the amazing relationship between a very rich widow and a broken-hearted woman whom she takes in as a boarder. The widow also takes in many other boarders, each of which has his/her own story to tell.

In order to appreciate the story, one must be familiar with "Kristallnacht," the night of broken glass, which occurred on November 9 and 10, 1938, throughout Germany,

when Nazis broke glass from windows of Jewish homes, stores, and synagogues.

Ellen was unable to attend the meeting, but as the sponsor, she provided delicious peach tea and cookies for dessert.

The book for our September 16 meeting is *A Star for Mrs. Blake*, by April Smith. This novel, recommended by Dorthea Turek, follows the adventures of several Gold Star Mothers, each of whom has lost a son in WWI, as they visit their sons' graves in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery. A major feature of the novel is the introduction of "tin noses," soldiers who wear metal masks to cover their facial scars received in battle. Propane and Winter Heating Season – *Linda Blume*



A number of residents had the unpleasant experience of running out of propane during last winter's icy blast. Let's not have a repeat this winter. Suburban Propane (our current supplier) does <u>not</u> monitor the SV tank levels as United Propane did. <u>Residents</u> are responsible for knowing how much propane is in their underground tank and for calling for a fill-up when necessary. Suburban Propane <u>does</u> do a "projected" delivery schedule based on past consumption, but when a winter is more severe than usual, that projected schedule can fail. Also, if your propane consumption changes (e.g., you are sick and require the house to

be heated to a higher than usual temperature), Suburban's projection can fail. So what do you do? If you are physically able to lift the outside hatch cover, it is not hard to read the percentage gauge to tell you the level of propane. If you are unable to lift the hatch cover, find a neighbor who would be willing to check for you every now and then. If the percentage is in the red, call Suburban Propane to schedule a propane delivery.

One more reminder – before the ground freezes for the winter (but after lawn mowing is finished), put a stake next to your propane hatch cover so you can easily find it should there be measurable snow. It's a lot easier to shovel out an area when you know exactly where the hatch cover is.

Farm to Food Bank Program



Volunteers helped glean 2,447 lbs. of sweet corn from Mason Farms Produce on August 7.

Did you know that there are approximately 450,000 individuals in Maryland who do not know where their next meal will come from? Of that number, about 42,000 reside on Maryland's Eastern Shore. Residents of Symphony Village have been assisting with the Maryland Food Bank's Farm to Food Bank program gleaning produce from Queen Anne County farmers to help feed the hungry. Gleaning

is mentioned in the Bible and refers to the act of gathering produce that is left behind in fields after harvest.

This summer, volunteers have visited three farms across Queen Anne County to glean a variety of produce including squash, cabbage, kale, and sweet corn. The farms within our county that have permitted volunteers to glean include Lowery's Produce on Kent Island, Mason Farms Produce outside Centreville, and Homestead Farms in Millington. From these three farms, 42,000 lbs. of produce has been gleaned by volunteers and delivered to the Maryland Food Bank—Eastern Shore which is located in Salisbury. The Maryland Food Bank then distributes the fresh produce to its network of 200 agencies located across the Eastern Shore.

The goal for the program this year is to procure 1 million pounds of fresh produce from farmers of Maryland's' Eastern Shore. Currently, the program is 90% there, thanks in part to volunteers donating their time and energy. Want to help? The Farm to Food Bank program is always looking for individuals of all ages who are willing to volunteer with gleaning. No experience is necessary. All that is required is time to give, a heart to help, and the physical ability to do so. This is an amazing program of which you can be a part. Our Visit to Normandy -- Ray Goodmuth

Recently, Harriett and I, along with shipmate Jerry Wester and wife, Shirley, embarked on a 12-day



river boat cruise on the upper Seine, located in the Normandy area of France. We booked our trip through Vantage Worldwide Travel and boarded our boat, the MS RIVER VENTURE, at Conflans, located a short distance from Paris. While we enjoyed the many scenic towns and villages along the river, including the city of Paris, our primary goal for making this trip was to experience the Normandy coast and its beaches that were involved in the D-Day landings, as this year marks its 70th anniversary. The mission was coined Operation Overlord by the planners. The beach landings

were originally scheduled for June 5, 1944; however, weather conditions forced postponement until the next day.

Our tour guide, Naomi, did an outstanding job of giving us interesting facts related to that fateful battle. She kept us thoroughly informed as we worked our way through the major points of interest, including the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial where too many soldiers, sailors, and airmen are laid to rest. Adding to the drama of D-Day were stories related to us by Naomi about her grandparents' experiences fighting with the French Resistance against the Germans.

Our first stop was the Memorial Cemetery, located just above Omaha Beach. A short walk from the cemetery grounds gives one an expansive view of the beach and water's edge that on D-Day ran red with American blood. Standing on the overlook, one can easily understand how formidable a task it

was for a soldier to slog his way into France from a landing craft with a fully loaded pack through cold water, loose sand, beach obstacles, and finally over the bluffs to gain a foothold on French soil, all the while taking intense canon, mortar, and machine gun fire from fortified German positions. We returned from the overlook to the cemetery to witness a memorial service honoring those brave souls sadly located just behind us under the many gravestones. Two fellow passengers from our boat presented the ceremonial wreath. One of the two, Jerry from California, was stationed aboard a Navy tanker in the Pacific during WWII. We used our remaining free time



to walk the perfectly aligned rows of headstones, taking note of names and hometowns. One particular marker, made obvious by its gold lettering, is that of General Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. It's ironic that, after having survived the first wave of D-Day landings with his men on Utah Beach, he died of a heart attack a month later outside Saint Mere Eglise. One can't help be emotionally moved by the supreme

sacrifice these men and women gave for their country. It stuns the senses to see so many grave markers neatly laid out on a sea of green, knowing that beneath each one lies the remains of a brave American.

We followed our memorial visit with a delicious lunch at Restaurant de la Mer, located in a scenic fishing village known as Grandcamp-Maisy. After lunch, we traveled to Pointe du Hoc, where U.S. Army Rangers accomplished the seemingly impossible mission of scaling steep cliffs with ropes and ladders to destroy a coastal battery while under intense enemy fire. What's visually striking about the point is that the landscape was left intact after the battle. The area is littered with deep depressions from both aerial bombs and naval shells. Scattered among the numerous craters are damaged and destroyed bunkers. The irony of this assault was that, once the Rangers secured the point, there were no big guns to be found, as they had been previously moved some distance inland. They were later located by the Rangers and disabled with thermite grenades. A few hundred yards back from the point, near the entrance to the site, are the notorious hedge rows. Close study of these centuries-old natural land borders helps one to better understand why it was so difficult to advance quickly against the enemy. They are quite dense, with thick, tangled, and impenetrable growth making it difficult even for tanks to traverse.

From Pointe du Hoc, we drove over to the town of Arromanches, which is located on the shores of Gold Beach. It was here, shortly after a beachhead had been established, that the British began construction on a temporary artificial harbor to enable supply movement from ship to shore. A similar harbor was constructed off Omaha Beach by the U.S. Both were impressive accomplishments, considering the enemy's ongoing efforts to throw the Allies back into the sea and the extreme weather conditions that the channel is known to generate.



Remnants of the harbor remain just offshore and are easily seen from the town. Located at the shore break are washed up barges from the original construction. Later in the afternoon, we left Arromanches for our return trip to La Havre, where our boat was docked. Along the way, we passed Juno and Beach Sword beaches. These, along with Gold Beach, were assaulted on D-Day by the British, Canadians, and Free French troops.

My only disappointment was that we were not able to see Utah Beach, where Major Dick Winters famously fought. Located near the beach in Sainte Marie du Mont is a monument of his likeness. I expected that a single-day visit would be a stretch to see all that Normandy has to offer, but I am pleased with all that we managed to take in. I believe to thoroughly explore Normandy and fully soak in the D-Day experience would require a full week. I am not sure I will have the opportunity to return, but I am extremely satisfied with this trip, as it has long been on my bucket list.

Many books have been written on D-Day. One of the most notable is *The Longest Day* by Cornelius Ryan. Another great read is the third book in a trilogy by Rick Atkinson titled *The Guns at Last Light*.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Macaroni Salad

From the Kitchen of Joan Dominelli Servings: 16

16 ounces uncooked elbow macaroni (or Rotini)*

1 carrot, shredded

Prep Time: 30 minutes

1 medium red onion, chopped

1 green bell pepper, seeded and chopped

1 cup chopped celery

2 cups mayonnaise

1 (14 ounce) can sweetened condensed milk

1/4 cup white sugar

½ cup white vinegar

1 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon pepper

DIRECTIONS:

- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add macaroni, and cook until tender, about 8 minutes. Rinse under cold water, and drain. Transfer the drained macaroni to a large bowl.
- In another bowl, mix the mayonnaise, condensed milk, sugar, vinegar, salt, and pepper together. Add the carrots, red onion, green pepper, and celery to this mixture and stir.
- Pour over the macaroni, toss gently, cover, and refrigerate for at least 8 hours.

^{*} I usually use Rotini and make this salad a day ahead of time - and I stir it occasionally to blend the flavors. The macaroni will absorb some of the liquid.


