




"PERSONAL TRAINER"




READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB - Jack Hennessey

The book for our October 21 meeting was *The Reader*, written by Bernard Schlink, and recommended by Mary Jo Keefe. This book was first published in 1995 in Germany, where 500,000 copies were sold. It is



the first German book to top the New York Times best seller list. The story is a parable, dealing with the difficulties that post-war Germans had in dealing with the Holocaust. A 2008 film version of the book was nominated for five academy awards. Kate Winslet won best actress for her portrayal of Hanna Schmitz, the primary female role in the movie. On a scale of 1 to 10, the book received a rating of 7.8. Many varieties of cookies, along with peach tea, were provided for dessert.



The book for our November 18 meeting is *The Distance Between Us*, by Reyna Grande. This book was recommended by the Centreville Library. It is One Maryland, One Book's choice to be read by every Marylander. The library has 20 copies, so residents should have no problem getting a copy. This book tells of the great trials and tribulations suffered by

Mexican immigrants in their effort to seek a better life for their families, especially children.

We will have a holiday in December, so January will be a good time for new residents to join the Book Club. Due to limited shelf space, Jack and Joan, colibrarians, will be setting aside one shelf for books that have been read by the Book Club. We will rotate these books periodically, since they will not all fit on one shelf. A rated books list will be available for use by residents. 4th Annual CENTREVILLE DAY

On Saturday, October 25, the **Centreville Day Steering Committee** provided a wonderful assortment of activities for people of all ages during their **4**th **Annual Centreville Day** event. Many Symphony Village residents are members of the various organizations making up this Steering Committee, and some residents volunteered at various exhibits.

It should be noted that, just prior to the kickoff of the Centreville Day festivities, folks were treated to a very special **U.S. Army Honors Ceremony** to recognize three local Navy heroes who died in service to their country in the War of 1812. One of the highlights of this program, organized by the **QAC War of 1812 Committee**, was the Drill Team from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point who put on an amazing demonstration of precision and skill in honor of these three men. SV neighbors, Hart Anderson and Tom Baker, also participated in the ceremony. The final tribute was placing the bronze plaque engraved with the names of these fallen heroes —Clinton Wright, Lodowick Morgan, and Jacob Hindman—on the War Memorial in front of the QAC Courthouse.

Following the ceremony, Centreville Day was officially open. Walking around the QAC Courthouse greens, you might have run into Mary Drake working the Great Centreville Cookie booth. The winner of this contest and the four runners-up had made samples of their cookies to give out to visitors—the cookies quickly disappeared. The cookies had been judged

disappeared. The cookies had been judged on which one <u>best</u> represented Centreville and, of course, how they tasted. The **History** Scavenger Hunt, sponsored by the Queen Anne's County Historical

Society, was manned by **Eleanor Strietman** and **Teri Nudo.** A \$50 prize went to the lucky person who was first to find the correct answers to 10 questions pertaining to Centreville's historical buildings and past events. **Cass Smith** and **Betty McAtee** came up with the idea of having visitors make their own mini-greenhouses out of gallon milk jugs, seeds, and soil. All the seeds they handed out to be planted were from native plants, and all seeds had been collected from SV gardens. They gave instructions for starting the seeds so each greenhouse would have sprouted plants to plant next spring. **Doris Pullman** gave out information for the **League of Women Voters.** A very popular area was the interactive kids' zone, featuring a moon bounce, pumpkin painting, face painting, pumpkin bowling, story time, cornhole toss, an anti-bullying puppet show, and more. Food venders and artisans' booths were scattered throughout the area surrounding the Court House.

Needless to say, it was a very successful event, and I'm sure folks are looking forward to the 5th Annual Centreville Day in 2015. – by Brenda Stoltz






Thank You

RECIPE

Pumpkin Dump Cake From the kitchen of Brenda Stoltz

1 (30 oz.) can pumpkin pie mix

1 cup sugar (Use 34 cup if you prefer it less sweet.)

1 (13 oz.) can evaporated milk

3 large eggs

½ tsp. salt

1 box yellow cake mix

2 sticks of melted butter

1 cup chopped pecans

Combine first 6 ingredients (pumpkin, sugar, milk, eggs, and salt) and beat well.

Pour into greased and floured 9 x 13 inch glass pan.

Sprinkle cake mix on top of pumpkin mixture. (Do not mix together.)

Sprinkle the pecans on top of the cake mix.

Pour melted butter over cake mix and pecans.

Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

Watch closely so top looks brown but does not burn. (Use middle or lower rack.)

Serves 12 to 15
