

HOA Board of Directors - Process for Obtaining Bids & Contacting Government Officials

1. <u>Procurement Procedures</u> – At the Board of Directors meeting held on January 30, the Board adopted the Symphony Village Homeowners Association Procurement Procedures. These procedures will be added to the Terms of Reference as Appendix C. The Terms of Reference can be found on the Website under "Governing Documents" on the "Official Documents" page accessed from the <u>HOA Board</u> page.

The procurement procedures point out that only the Board of Directors may obligate or spend HOA funds, with the exception of the General Manager, who has authority to approve contracts or expenditures of \$3,000 or less. However, unless it is an emergency situation, the General Manager will advise the Board before proceeding with any purchases over \$3,000. All HOA Committees must obtain approval from the Board before moving forward with any project.

The General Manager is the point of contact for the HOA when bidding out contracts with all outside vendors. This is for both internal and control purposes and to ensure uniformity in obtaining bids.

2. Contacting Government Officials – From time to time it is necessary for the Homeowners Association to contact Officials of the Town of Centreville, such as when dealing with the landscaping of the Storm Water Management Ponds. The HOA is limited as to what can be done to these ponds and, before doing any work on them, it must be approved by the Town. The HOA's General Manager is familiar with the responsible Town Manager and what can and what cannot be done around the ponds. The General Manager is the only individual who may contact Town Officials on behalf of the HOA.



BIRD CLUB - Linda Blume

Six members attended the "Great Horned Owls" lecture at the Chesapeake Bay Environmental Center last month – very informative, very entertaining, and the slides were wonderful. We may attend the fourth lecture in the series, "Bird Migration," on **Wednesday, April 22**, if there is interest.





We will attend the <u>15th Annual Eagle Festival</u> at Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge on **Saturday, March 14**. The festival celebrates birds of prey with live bird programs, guest speakers, eagle prowls and refuge tours, and children's activities. Watch for the sign-up sheet in the Activities Book.

Last month I asked for sightings in your yards, and you certainly have more variety than I've seen at my feeders: wrens, tufted titmice, white-breasted and red-breasted nut hatches, mourning doves, cardinals, bluebirds, woodpeckers, chickadees, Cooper's hawks, juncos, mockingbirds, and even a wayward killdeer.

Two sightings of Red Tailed hawks have been made – one at the **Victory Garden** and another at the **Gazebo Garden** (the flower garden). Also, Eleanor Strietman reported seeing a Cooper's hawk in her backyard. Many snow birds, gold finches, and house finches feed regularly at the Gazebo feeders and at local feeders. We continue to provide sunflower seeds and thistle for our beautiful song birds. Several residents have been saving egg shells for me to provide "calcium" for the purple martins, who will be arriving about the time of our March report (weather permitting). We now have all the shells we need. On February 21, we will be trimming the overgrown bushes at the Gazebo. Call Jack if you can help.

By the time our March *Libretto* is published, Dave Peterson will have tilled the **Victory Garden**. It is traditional to plant peas, spinach, and other spring crops by St. Patrick's Day. We will label plots for responding residents. Lastly, we need a few more gardeners to each sponsor one of the 20 plots in the Gazebo Garden. We are looking forward to the arrival of the purple martins!

READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – *Jack Hennessey*

At our January 20 meeting, we discussed the book *Lisette's List*, written by Susan Vreeland and recommended by Lee Ettman. The story tells how Lisette tries to find many paintings by Pissarro, Chagal, and others which had been hidden to save them from the Nazis during WWII. If you are an art lover, you will enjoy this book. This book was rated 6.1 on a scale of 1 to 10. Lee provided wonderful cookies and a



beverage for the members. The selection for our February 19 meeting is *The Boys in the Boat*, recommended by Mary Jo Keefe. The boys are the eight oarsmen and the coxswain of the Washington College sculling crew, who won the gold medal at the 1936 Olympics in Nazi Germany. The emotional heart of the story lies with one rower, Joe Krantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not for glory, but to regain his shattered self image. The crew is assembled by an enigmatic coach and mentored by an eccentric British boat builder. The popularity of this book is attested to by the fact that I was number 12 on the waiting list for the book at the Talbot County Library.

His first immunization clinic will be held on Wednesday, March 18, at the Symphony Village Club House for the administration of Prevnar, the latest pneumonia vaccine.

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NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

Prevnar Wellness Clinic



Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV13 or Prevnar) has been recommended by the CDC and NIH as of August 2014 for adults 65 years and older. The recommended guidelines are as follows:

- All patients with no previous history of pneumococcal vaccine (PCV13 or PPSV23).
- A one-time dose of Prevnar followed by a one-time dose of Pneumovax 6-12 months later.
- All adults who have received Pneumovax at least one year previously.

Pneumococcal disease is caused by infection with Streptococcus pneumonia bacteria. These bacteria can be spread from person-to-person through close contact. Pneumococcal disease can lead to severe health problems, including pneumonia, blood infections, and meningitis. About 4,000 adults still die each year because of pneumococcal infections, with the majority coming from the over 65 age group.


The PREVNAR CLINIC will be held at the Clubhouse, Wednesday, March 18, 9 a.m. to noon and 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. This clinic is brought to you by EDWARDS PHARMACY and administered by their new Personal Community Pharmacist, Tony Loiacono of Symphony Village.

IF You Are Interested, You Must Do The Following:

Sign up in the Clubhouse at the Reception Desk. The vaccine is covered by Medicare and will be administered free of charge, but an accurate count is a must. This Clinic is for Medicare patients only. Others who are 65 and older and have coverage other than Medicare can obtain the vaccine directly at Edwards Pharmacy, their own medical office, or another pharmacy of their choice.

As always, please consult with your physician with regard to your personal health care needs.

The Village Propane Consumer Group

Wanna Be a Docent?



There are a number of historic homes in Centreville. Arguably, two of the most historically significant are Tucker House and Wright's Chance. Tucker House was built on the second lot sold when the new town of

Centreville was laid out in 1794. It is unclear exactly when Wright's Chance was built, but it was referred to in a 1744 survey as an "old dwelling." Both homes are on Commerce Street near the library and are owned by the Queen Anne's

County Historical Society. On the first Saturdays of May through September,

historic sites throughout Queen Anne's County – including Tucker House and Wright's Chance – are open for visitors. Docents are people who act as guides and are needed to staff the houses from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Open House Saturdays. They lead informal tours and answer questions. Being a docent is a great way to meet new people and to help them (and yourself) understand and appreciate

our history. "That sounds like fun," you may be thinking, but you might be hesitant to volunteer because you've never done anything like this before. Not to worry! Docents receive basic training and are provided with information about each house and its furnishings. The Village's own Ellen Norman, a trained and experienced docent, will conduct a docent training session at the library on Thursday, April 16, from 10 a.m. to noon. 

RESTAURANT REVIEW Suicide Bridge Restaurant

Well, we have discovered the best restaurant yet since we moved to Maryland a few months ago. Four of us went to Suicide Bridge Restaurant in Hurlock thanks to Dominick and Carolyn Mancinelli's recommendation. Hurlock is east of the Choptank River between Easton and

Cambridge and on Cabin Creek – a branch of the Choptank. It's a "long and winding" backcountry road to get there once you leave Route 50, but Dominick cheerfully drove on.

The food was excellent! We started with nice, yeasty rolls, and libations followed by different soups (cream of crab and French onion) and seared tuna. Three of us had a special of the day – meaty steamed lobsters cracked in the kitchen. They had little candle-fired platforms of melted butter for dipping. Howie – not being a seafood guy – had a terrific cut of filet mignon which was perfectly cooked. You have a choice of sides which from what we sampled were not your typical restaurant arrangements – the sweet potato casserole had pineapple in it and a blanket of toasted marshmallow topping. Their green beans were freshly made with pimentos, roasted slivered almonds, and a spicy mix that really made them more unique than the average.

Then we get to the dessert! I have never had an éclair like the ones they make on premises. They were huge and the chocolate icing had bits of Heath Bar in it. The cream filling was more pudding-like than the too sweet white icing often used. Advance warning – eat lighter or share the éclairs. They even bring you little boxes along with the dessert, since so many people probably have to take them home. A cute touch!

During the winter months the restaurant is quieter, but with their proximity to Easton and Cambridge they get more crowded in the warmer months. Regardless of the season, make a reservation. The restaurant also has two paddle wheel boats (or stern wheelers) moored at the dock. From May to early October, they have lunch and dinner excursions, Crab Feasts, and several on-board Murder Mystery dinners. The Lifestyle Committee will be looking into coordinating a paddle boat group event in warmer weather.

Now for the name – the actual Suicide Bridge is about 50 feet from the restaurant. You'd think from its name and reputation that it would be a towering structure; however, the bridge deck is only about 12 feet above the river! There is a history of the bridge on the back of the menu – I'll leave it to the reader to go there to enjoy a meal and find it out!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Cream of Broccoli-Carrot-Cheese Soup

From The Kitchen of Nancie Cameron for The Outreach Card And Game Party

- ½ cup unsalted butter
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1/3 cup flour
- 4 cups whole milk
- 2 cups vegetable broth
- 4 heads broccoli, florets only, cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1 cup carrots, julienne
- ½ tsp. each nutmeg and garlic powder salt & pepper
- 12 oz. mild cheddar cheese, shredded (about 3 cups)
- 2 cups half-and-half

Directions:

- In a large pot, melt butter over medium-low heat. Add the onions and cook 3-4 minutes until softened. Sprinkle flour over onions and stir to combine and cook for about 1 minute. Slowly whisk in milk and vegetable broth.
- 2. Add nutmeg, garlic powder, salt (to taste), lots of freshly ground pepper, broccoli, and carrots. Cover, reduce heat to low, and simmer for 20-30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. With an immersion blender, blend to desired "chunkiness" or smoothness.
- 3. Remove from the heat and stir in half-and-half and the cheese.
