## Symphony Village Irrigation Informational Update Report

The irrigation report is developed every Wednesday so that we have a consistent and accurate flow of information. As the title of the report indicates, we "monitor" or track our cumulative water usage versus the 12-million-gallon cap. If the report indicates we're using our allotment too quickly (due to limited rainfall), we know that we may need to limit our irrigation for a period of time in order to "bank" some of the allocation for later in the summer and fall. The summer is clearly the time of the year when we can go weeks without measurable rainfall. If we don't get consistent rain, there may be times we don't irrigate at all for a period of time in order to conserve for future weeks.

Our management will make every effort to communicate not only the irrigation schedule, but also when we need to conserve and not irrigate. Last summer was unusual in that we had an abundance of rain and only used between eight and nine million gallons of water.

We feel it is important that the residents understand the limitations based on our 12-million-gallon cap. We will do everything possible to keep the system working and to communicate when an issue does arise.

I hope this information helps you better understand some of the issues we're dealing with regarding our irrigation system, the 12-million-gallon cap, and how we plan to monitor our usage and manage our irrigation to insure we don't exceed our allotment.

## Reading for Fun Book Club—Jack Hennessey

At our May 19 meeting, we discussed the novel, We Are All Completely Beside Ourselves, written by Karin J. Fowler. DeAnn Cheyne recommended this book. Joan Hennessey led the discussion since DeAnn was out of town. Rosemary, the daughter of a college professor, narrates the story. Rosemary believed that she and her sister Fern were twins. When she is five years old, Rosemary is sent for a week's visit to her grandparents. She feels that she is being punished. On her return, the thrill-seeking Fern is gone-never to be seen again. There are no explanations.

Rosemary's brother, Lowell, absconds, commits a series of crimes in the name of animal rights, and becomes a fugitive from the FBI. Well into the story, it is revealed that Fern is really a chimpanzee! The girls' imposed sisterhood was part of an animal-human behavior experiment conducted by their psychologist father. Now 22 , Rosemary is at college and is confronted by a strange classmate, Harlow, who forces Rosemary to confront her strange past. The novel explores the relationship between humans and chimps, with startling results. Read the story to see how the situation is resolved. On a scale of 1 to 10 , the book received a rating of 7.9.
The book recommended by Pat Loiacano for our June 16 meeting is The Pearl That Broke Its Shell, by Nadia Hashimi. This novel gives a fascinating look at the lives of two Afghan women, a great-grandmother and her great-granddaughter, separated by generations and by miles. The story is set mainly in Kabul, the capital, in 2007. The streets are ruled by the Taliban. With a drugaddicted father and no brothers, Rahima and her four sisters can rarely leave their house or attend school. They resort to the ancient custom of bacha posh, which allows young Rahima to assume the identity of a boy until she reaches marriageable age. We find that her great-great-grandmother, Shekiba, had gone through the same process to form a life for herself. The novel interweaves the stories of these two remarkable women who are separated by a century, but share the same
 courage and dreams. This is a "must read"!

The point is, there are other things to do in OC. If your children want to spend the day getting a glorious $\tan$ and your grandchildren want to play in the surf, drop them off with their beach chairs, umbrellas, and the all-important cooler filled with the requisite snacks, drinks, and lunch. Then take off.

Totally off the beaten path is Dennis Thrift Shop in Bishopsville (13308 Hatchery Road, Bishopville). 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## RESTAURANT REVIEW

## Luisa's Cucina Italiana-by Marge Strano

While taking a leisurely ride through Chestertown a few weeks ago, we came upon Luisa's Cucina Italiana located at 849 Washington Avenue in Chestertown, a short distance from Washington College. Our Symphony Village neighbors, Patty and Andy Parks, told us that
 Luisa's is one of their favorite restaurants. The restaurant recently moved from the strip mall to a beautiful stone building on Washington Avenue adjacent to Washington Square.
Upon entering the restaurant, we were greeted by a friendly hostess and an inviting aroma from the woodburning pizza oven and a view of a beautiful and comfortable bar. There are two main dining rooms-one upon entering to the right and a larger dining room in the back with large windows. There is also a small outside
terrace with tables and a take-out service room with several tables to the left of the main entrance. We were escorted to our table in the comfortable and relaxing dining room in the back.
Luisa's menus include a variety of both Southern and Northern Italy dishes. The lunch and dinner menus include appetizers, contorni (sides), a wonderful list of salads, and a variety of chicken, veal, pasta, seafood, and other oven-baked dishes. Prices for lunch entrees start at $\$ 9$ and do not rise much above $\$ 11$, with a couple of exceptions in the seafood selections. Likewise, dinner selections start at $\$ 9$ for pasta and do not rise much above $\$ 20$, with a few exceptions for seafood. There is a wide variety of food on the menu for all tastes and appetites including vegetarian selections, such as Eggplant Parmigiana; Tortellini Emiliani made with egg pasta, Parmesan cheese, fresh mushrooms, tomatoes, and broccoli with a delicate cream sauce; or perhaps a side of spinach, broccoli, or mushrooms to compliment a Mozzarella Caprese. Luisa's features a full selection of thin-crust pizza. You can order your favorite pizza-possibly a Margherita Pizza at $\$ 10.95$ or perhaps a Hawaiian Pizza for $\$ 11.95$. You may also be interested in a catering menu that includes a large choice of entrees accommodating a wide variety of tastes and appetites.

Luisa's has a good selection of beer and wines by the bottle or by the glass to complement entrée selections. In addition to the usual variety of soft drinks that restaurants offer, Luisa's has special coffees and lattes on the menu. Luisa's uses local meats and vegetables whenever possible. All in all, we enjoyed our dining experience and recommend that you go to Luisa's for dinner or lunch soon.

## Barbecue Meatballs

## Sauce

$1 / 4$ cup sugar
1 cup catsup
$1 / 4$ cup Worcestershire Sauce
2 T vinegar
Combine above ingredients in a saucepan. Cook until bubbly.

## Meatballs

1 pound extra-lean ground beef
1 onion, diced
$1 / 2$ cup crushed saltines
2 T milk
Salt and pepper
1 tsp chili powder

Form above ingredients into balls
Place meatballs on a cookie sheet lined with foil and bake at 450 degrees until brown, about 10 minutes. Place baked meatballs in a casserole.
Cover with sauce.
Bake at 325 degrees about 35 minutes or until bubbly. Cover last ten minutes.
