THE MISSION

Symphony Village Outreach Program, Inc. (SV Outreach) is a tax exempt public charity organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. SV Outreach's mission is to provide financial support to local social services and to support educational programs and other lawful, charitable organizations within Queen Anne's County (QAC). Outreach also provides compassionate, short-term assistance for SV residents during times of illness, disability, or death in the family.

ACTIVITIES & EVENTS

SV Outreach sponsors fundraisers throughout the year such as the Artisan's Fair in September, a food drive in November for the QAC Food Pantry, a Card Party in January, a monthly Bingo, a Spring Tea, a Happy Hour, and various other events throughout the year.

BENEFACTORS


Proceeds raised by these events are used to support nonprofit organizations such as the American Legion Wounded Veterans Project; the QAC Crossroads Community, Inc., Dental Program; Our Haven Shelter; QAC Department of Emergency Services; Compass Regional Hospice Camp New Dawn; QAC Historical Society; University of Maryland Shore Emergency Center at Queenstown; and the QAC Social Services Food Pantry. There are many other nonprofit QAC organizations that we support on an annual or a one-time basis.

Neighbor-To-Neighbor, which is under the *SV Outreach* umbrella, is comprised of volunteers from every street in Symphony Village. This group of residents provides short-term volunteer support to SV residents during times of illness, disability, or loss of an immediate family member.

Caregivers is another Outreach activity that provides compassionate support to SV caretakers who are managing a sick or disabled person.


Website New Governance Page

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Reading for Fun Book Club – Jack Hennessey

The novel we reviewed at our October 20 meeting was *Unexpected Pleasures*, by Phyllis Naylor.



There are several books by that same name, but the others happen to be sex stories, as one of our members discovered. The Naylor story revolves around Foster Williams and his

cohorts, who all are working on the Chesapeake Bay Bridge. It gives the reader an insight into the perils of working on the high steel. (It was of particular interest to me, Jack, since that was how

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my father qualified for immigration into the USA from Canada.) This unlikely love story unites April Bates, the 16 year old sister of two town prostitutes, with Foster, who is twice her age. Foster agrees to marry her to save her from going into a juvenile home. The poignant but realistic novel tells of developing love and adjustment to married life. The two are separated for a while, but are reunited in a happy ending. On a scale of 1 to 10, the book, recommended by Pat Fox, received a rating of 7.4.



The true story selected for our November 17 meeting is *The Wright Brothers*, by David McCullough. All of our members remember the brothers as the pair who invented the first successful airplane. The first few chapters introduce the reader to the relatively poor family, headed by a minister. It quickly gets into how the two bicycle repairmen evolve into the

inventers of the first successful airplane, in spite of much competition in European countries.

The group welcomed Ellen Nichols, an avid reader, to the Book Club. All residents are invited to attend meetings and to join the club. We will be taking a holiday in December. For our January meeting, Jack recommended the book *A Man Called Ove*, by Fredrik Backman.

The Halloween Bear Revisits Symphony Village

Have you heard the story of the bear who came Trick-or-Treating in Symphony Village the Fall of 2008? Do you know he revisited Centreville in the Spring of 2009?

Halloween night 2008 B J McClaeb was at her front door on Harmony Way when she first saw the bear.

It was slowly moving down the driveway of 818 Harmony Way. (At first she thought of kids trick-or-treating. No, this furry thing was gliding down the driveway on all fours too easily-besides, it didn't have a candy bag.) The police were called and neighbors were alerted. Ellen Norman jumped into her car and tried to follow the bear as it wandered through the neighborhood. Jean Morais jumped into her car and drove to the Clubhouse to warn folks at Happy Hour not to <u>walk</u> home. Meanwhile, the bear was wandering through the Village sniffing cars, eating birdseed, and clawing

pumpkins. Bird feeder poles he grabbed were bent as if they were sticks of licorice.* The Centreville police searched for the bear to no avail. The last bear sighting in SV was a bear heading into the woods behind 242 Opera Court. We learned later that the bear was seen in downtown Centreville and heading north. Wildlife officials believed that the bear had come to Maryland from Pennsylvania. They suspected he would find his way home on his own, so they decided not to capture and relocate him. Needless to say, many bird feeders in SV were removed from porches and backyards for the remainder of the year.

Fast forward 7 months — a young black bear reappeared in April 2009 and was captured in the backyard of a residence just outside downtown Centreville by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife and Heritage Service. The 250-pound bear had crawled into a trap baited with, you guessed it, birdseed. Surprisingly, it was learned that the bear was originally captured in Mercer County, New Jersey, in June 2008, approximately 110 miles from Centreville. New Jersey biologists had tagged the bear and marked him with a lip tattoo prior before relocating him to a nearby wildlife management area. Following his second capture in 2009, the bear, believed to be between 2 and 3 years old, was tagged and transported to a new home in Washington County. According to the MDNR, the young bear's appearance caused quite a stir in Centreville because a black bear had not been seen on the Eastern Shore since Colonial times.**

RESTAURANT REVIEW

Stoney River Steakhouse and Grill - Charlene Smallwood Brown





On a warm and sunny Friday evening in October, I was joined by my friend, Dianne, for my 5th visit to the **STONEY RIVER STEAKHOUSE AND GRILL** in Annapolis. Our dining experience started with the receptionist's cordial remembrance of my 4 previous visits to the restaurant. I suspect it was my oxygen

paraphernalia that tipped them off. Our timing was perfect, because the after-work crowd had not yet arrived. We were led into the large dining area with diverse seating options, including tablecloth-covered tables, booths, and couches. The walls are covered with brick and



wood tiles and decorated with soft still life art. In the center of the long wall is a large cozy fireplace. For the sole benefit of our SV *Libretto* subscribers, we began with a tasting of wine, from which we selected a bottle of cabernet sauvignon. We ordered the Whiskey Shrimp on Country Toast as our


appetizer, and immediately concluded that the size was sufficient for a meal, and we should have shared one appetizer or ordered this as our dinner. It was utterly delicious, and the toast was the perfect texture with a well-seasoned sauce. The menu is a diverse offering of steaks, prime rib, filet mignon, seafood, chicken, pasta and baby back ribs. A variety of soups, salads and sandwiches are available as well. I ordered the coffee-cured filet mignon with mashed potatoes and broccoli, and Dianne ordered the blackened salmon with jasmine rice and sautéed spinach. The filet was cooked to order, the mashed potatoes and broccoli were perfectly seasoned and not over- or under-cooked. As we sampled each other's dishes, I noted that the salmon meal was so delectable and flawlessly cooked that I wished I could have ordered some combination of the 2 meals. We struggled, unsuccessfully, to do as our mothers said and eat everything on our plates. Having failed to do so, we ordered "to go" bags for our unfinished meals and "legally-secured" partial bottle of wine. And, we could not resist ordering a dessert that could survive the ride home – none other than the delicious key lime pie. I noted that my favorite cheesecake was no longer on the menu.

Throughout the meal, the service was prompt and efficient, without being disruptive. At our request, Marty, the waiter with the most seniority, offered a history of the restaurant. He pointed out that **STONEY RIVER STEAKHOUSE AND GRILL** originated in 2000 as one of three collections of J. Alexander Holdings, Inc.'s boutique restaurants that focus on providing high quality food, outstanding professional service and an attractive ambiance. The Home Office is in Tennessee, and the Annapolis restaurant opened in October 2008. **THE STONY RIVER STEAKHOUSE AND GRILL** collection currently has 10 restaurants in 6 states, and another will soon open near Memphis, Tennessee. The General Manager, Rob Ochotnicky, stopped by our table to chat and answer some of our questions. He emphasized that all items on the

menu, including sauces, dressing, and dessert, are made from scratch at the restaurant, with the exception of the scrumptious little rolls. He described the menu as "contemporary southern." They are open daily for lunch and dinner. On Monday and Tuesday nights, they offer ½ price bottles of wine. He suggests reservations for weekend dining, and pointed out 2 smaller dining areas for private dining or if guests prefer a quieter environment during the busiest times. When he asked if we lived nearby, I told him that we were from Symphony Village in Centreville; and he said to make sure that future SV guests inform him that they are from Symphony Village. (Maybe they'll get a free drink or appetizer?)

Regardless, if you seek a relaxing, delicious meal for any occasion, I highly recommend **STONEY RIVER STEAKHOUSE AND GRILL** in Annapolis. Dianne and I concluded that this restaurant sets itself apart from any negative stereotypical bias one might have regarding "chain" restaurants. In summary, they met their goal of providing a fine culinary experience that exceeded our expectations. It should be noted that, as we were leaving around 7 p.m. on this Friday night, the dining room was full, and the joyful, celebratory noise level had increased a few decibels.

teaspoon olive oil
 ½ tablespoons balsamic vinegar
 tablespoon thyme
 teaspoon salt
 cup tomatoes, roughly chopped
 clove garlic cloves, minced
 tablespoon Dijon mustard

½ cup mayonnaise
4 French bread rolls
2 cups chicken, cooked & chopped
2 teaspoon olive oil
½ teaspoon salt
2 cups salad greens (I use spinach.)
½ teaspoon pepper

- Mix oil, 1 tablespoon vinegar, thyme, salt, pepper, and tomatoes.
- Combine mayonnaise, mustard, and garlic in small bowl. Spread mayonnaise mixture evenly over bottom half of roll.
- Spoon chicken on the mayonnaise.

- Combine 2 teaspoons oil, 1 teaspoon vinegar, ¹/₈ teaspoon salt, and spinach. Put mixture on top of chicken.
- Spoon on tomato mixture. Place on top half of the roll. Slice into servings. Yield: 8 servings
