SYMPHONY VILLAGE AT CENTREVILLE CLUBHOUSE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Revised – January 29, 2016

Early in 2015, the Board of Directors of the Homeowners Association (the "Board") decided that the Rules and Regulations dealing with the use of the Clubhouse needed to be updated. At first, the Board appointed a committee of volunteers to revise and update the Rules. After further discussion, the Board decided that this matter affected all Symphony Village Residents and wanted to get as much input from as many residents as possible.

The Board engaged the firm of Fishergate to perform the survey. They were tasked with developing the questions (with input from the members of the Board), mailing the survey to the residents, receiving the responses from the residents, and tabulating the responses to each question. Of the 347 surveys mailed to residents, 255 surveys were completed and returned.

After receiving the survey results, the Board decided that the changes to the Rules should reflect the majority responses to each question asked by the survey. The survey dealt only with the usage of the Clubhouse and outdoor amenities; therefore, the changes to the Rules are found under the section titled Symphony Village at Centreville <u>Clubhouse Rules</u> Outdoor Amenities found on page 4 of the document with the exception of guests using the Billiards Room which is on page 7 of the Clubhouse Rules.

<u>Questions 1a and 1b</u> asked about the \$250 rate for renting the Concert Hall/Ballroom for private events and \$150 rate for renting the Card Room in conjunction with the Concert Hall/Ballroom. The majority of responses to each question provided that the rates should not be changed.

<u>Question 2</u> asked should residents hosting meetings/activities in the Conference Room that are open to non-residents be required to pay the \$25/hour rental fee for the use of the Conference Room. The majority of responses were yes. Number 19 on page 5 was added to the Rules to provide for the payment of this fee.

Question 3 on the survey asked if Outreach and Sneakers should be charged a rental at the prevailing rate for their charity events. The majority of responses provided that Outreach and Sneakers should not pay a fee to host their events in the Clubhouse. Number 18 on page 9 has been added to the Rules stating the rates, the requirement to obtain a rental agree from Management, and that Outreach and Sneakers are exempt from having to pay a fee.

<u>Question 4</u> asked should complimentary use of the Clubhouse for memorial celebrations be restricted to the use of the Concert Hall/Ballroom. The majority of responses said no. Nothing was added to the Rules dealing with this issue.

<u>Question 5</u> asked should individuals who charge residents for classes in the Clubhouse be required to pay a fee to Symphony Village HOA. The majority of responses said yes. A fee schedule was added to new number 20 of the Rules.

<u>Ouestion 6</u> asked should activities such as aerobics, line dancing, tae kwon do, etc. be allowed in the Concert Hall/Ballroom. The majority of responses were yes. New number 20 provides for these activities.

Question 7 asked should residents hosting/holding resident-only activities be required to complete an Activity Request Form to reserve space in the Clubhouse. The majority of responses were yes. Number 17 was added to the Rules requiring the completion of an Activity Request Form to reserve space in the Clubhouse. Number 17 also provides that weekly occurring (regularly scheduled) activities cannot preclude another resident from using the Clubhouse for hosting a one time or infrequent event.

Question 8 asked should non-residents (who must be accompanied by an age-qualified resident), when using the Billiard Room, be at least 19 years of age. This was once a requirement in prior versions of the Clubhouse Rules. Somehow it was deleted from the Rules. The majority of responses were yes. Number 1, under Billiards Room (page 7), reinstates this requirement.

Question 9 asked should residents and guests be required to wear shoes or sandals at all times in the Clubhouse. The majority of the Board believes this should be required from both a liability and sanitary issue. The majority of responses were yes. Number 4 was added to the Rules on page 4 to require that residents and guests wear shoes or sandals at all times in the Clubhouse.

OPERATIONS & MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE -

The year 2016 kicked off with an election of new chairpersons and a welcome to a number of residents newly joining the Committees. Some long time stalwarts chose to move on to other things, and we will miss their seasoned input.

At the first 2016 HOA Board meeting, the Board members voted to divide the very large Operations & Maintenance Committee into two standing committees. As a result there will now be a separate committee managing Irrigation and Landscaping. The balance of the items will remain with the Operations & Maintenance Committee. This includes all interior and exterior aspects of the Clubhouse, guard house, pergola, picnic pavilion and equipment, gazebo, the indoor and outdoor pools, the interior and exterior sports areas (gym, pool tables, bocce court, tennis court, horseshoes, putting green), parking lot, sidewalks, walking trail and bridge, etc. Care for our trees and HOA-owned building plantings will also be managed by Operations and Maintenance.

TREES

During the January 2016 meeting, the Board approved another contract for Bob Stanley, the arborist who worked with the community in 2015. He brought knowledge and professionalism to the effort and in the process saved many SV trees through proper treatments (insecticides, soil drenching) and thousands of dollars in tree replacement fees if they had died.

IRRIGATION

Complete Landscaping's irrigation contract was renewed for 2016.

Caruso Homes expects to complete construction in SV before the end of 2016. A special committee will be set up to identify any remaining punch list items they need to complete in the common areas. The Outreach Committee would like to thank the residents of Symphony Village and their friends for supporting this event!! We had some new participants this year playing different games which was great!

The Outreach Committee would also like to thank Sheehy Lexus of Annapolis for once again sponsoring this event and making it possible (along with your support) for us to give a very nice donation to our beneficiaries this year, University of Maryland Shore Emergency Center at Queenstown and Chesapeake Dogs and Cats.

The Emergency Room is beginning a campaign to purchase two computers for Telemedicine, which is the use of telecommunication and information technologies to provide clinical health care at a distance. After an initial examination in the ER, if necessary, a patient can then be "seen" by a doctor in another medical facility to determine if he/she needs to be transferred to that facility or can be treated with medicine and allowed to go home from the ER with normal follow up. Imagine Skype or FaceTime!

Chesapeake Cats and Dogs have been serving our community for ten years by providing care and safe haven for many homeless animals, as well as the pets their owners can no longer care for. Our gift will be used to help in the building of the *Tree of Life Pet Sanctuary* on a 5.5 acre property in Wye Mills. This property is centered near an historic building and will allow for a much needed expansion to reach their long-term goal of building a brand new state of the art animal adoption center and home. 
LUNCH BUNCH – Marge Strano and Bea Trotta



READING FOR FUN BOOK CLUB – Jack Hennessey

The novel that we reviewed at our January 19 meeting was *A Man Called Ove*, written by Fredrik Backman, a Swedish author. It was a best seller in Sweden before being published around the world in more than 25 languages. Ove (pronounced oh-vuh) is 54 when his wife, Sonia, the only person who understands him, dies. He decides that life without her is not worth living and plans to end his life. Every time he plans to do this, something happens to redirect him. The story will bring you both smiles and tears. The book for our February 16 meeting is *Canada*, by Richard Ford. The two main characters are Dell Parsons and his twin sister, Berner. But Dell travels to Canada, as arranged by his mother, to live with Arthur Remlinger, an enigmatic and charismatic American. How Dell adapts to life in Canada is the reason for the story. 
If you are new to Symphony Village, this is a great way to meet some friends and neighbors.



QUEEN ANNE'S COUNTY HOUSE AND GARDEN PILGRIMAGE

On Saturday, April 30, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., eight beautiful and historic sites throughout Queen Anne's County will be open to the public. Sponsored by the Queen Anne's County Garden Club, in conjunction with the Maryland House and Garden Pilgrimage, these architecturally significant sites and historic properties will include: Possum Point Farm built in the late 1700s; **Bowlingly**, among the earliest dated structures in the central Eastern Shore, patented to James Bowlingly by Lord Baltimore in 1658, it survived the War of 1812; Talents Cove, a brick Georgian home built on the historic property of Governor William Grason, the first publicly elected governor of



Maryland; *Wharf House*, constructed by William Hopper in 1771 overlooks the headwaters of the Corsica River and Centreville landing; *St. Paul's Church* with its very lovely Tiffany windows; *St Paul's Rectory* newly restored; a lovely Folk Victorian built in 1901 with its newly restored gardens; and the Centreville Armory (1926) which has been restored to be the home of *Wye River Upper School*.

James E. Kirwan Museum in Kent Island, showcasing the life of its prominent owner James Kirwan (1848-1938), has been selected as the Garden Club's Project this year.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Tomato Bisque Soup

From the Kitchen of Nancie Cameron

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 cup diced onion
½ cup diced celery
1 pinch salt
3 cloves garlic, chopped
32 oz. container vegetarian stock or more as needed
28 oz. can crushed San Marzano tomatoes
½ teaspoon paprika

1 pinch cayenne pepper, or to taste

3 tablespoons uncooked rice

1 teaspoon white sugar, or to taste

1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

- •Heat olive oil in a large pot over medium heat.
- •Cook and stir onion and celery with a pinch of salt until onion is translucent, 5 to 8 minutes.
- •Stir in garlic and cook until fragrant, 1 minute.
- •Pour vegetarian stock and tomatoes into onion mixture.
- •Bring to a simmer and season with paprika, black pepper, and cayenne pepper.



- •Turn heat to low and stir rice into soup; skim foam occasionally and simmer until rice and vegetables are very tender, 35 to 45 minutes.
- •Add sugar and stir.
- •Blend soup with an immersion blender in the pot until smooth.
- •Whisk ½ cup cream into soup and adjust levels of salt, cayenne pepper, black pepper, and sugar. If soup is too thick, add more stock; if soup is too thin, continue cooking about 10 minutes, stirring often until reduced and slightly thickened.




Ladle into warmed bowls.
