Reading for Fun Book Club—*by Jack Hennessey*



At our June 21 meeting we discussed *Orphan X*, by Gregg Hurwitz. *Orphan X* is Evan Smoak, an actual orphan, selected by Jack Johns to be trained in a government program of covert assassins. The story goes from current assignments to flashbacks to the training Evan received as a teen in the government's secret Orphan Program. After successfully completing many assignments, Evan decides to retire from the program. He still maintains his luxury facilities and extensive training, but is destined to face another team member, Orphan O. Read this novel to learn the interesting outcome! We do find that Jack Johns survives, setting the scene for the next book in the Orphan series. The Book Club gave this novel a rating of 7.0 on a scale of 1 to 10.

Lee Ettman has recommended *The Muralist*, by B. A. Shapiro for our July 21 meeting. The main character, Alizee Benoit, is one of the earliest abstract painters. She mysteriously disappears amid the turmoil of the approaching WWII. Her great-niece, Danielle Abrams, also an artist, goes to great lengths to trace her aunt's art works. She is even successful in recruiting Eleanor Roosevelt as an artistic patron! The author touches on the works of Jackson Pollock, Mark Rothco, and Lee Krasner, three of the earliest and most successful abstract painters. This book gave me a new appreciation for abstract art.

Several new residents have asked me, as the secretary of the Book Club, to explain the rules for using our library in the card room. Joan and I have been co-librarians since 2004. The rules are very simple, with only minor changes since the original rules were issued.

1. Books can be taken from the library with no sign-out required. Since all books are donated, we do not care if you do not return them. Jack has a perpetual store of books in his garage to replace books that are not returned.
2. We do not want books that were printed before 2000. We also do not want public library rejects. They have been rejected because they have not been in demand for a long time.
3. New item: One shelf has been reserved for books that have been read and rated by the Book Club. Only books which have a rating of 7 through 10 will be placed on this shelf. These books can be identified by a double green stripe on the side opposite the binding. We request that these books be returned to the library as they have been paid for by members of the Book Club.
4. On three different occasions we have requested permission to install additional library shelving, but each time permission has not been granted.

P.S. At our September 20 meeting, we will be discussing *The Oblate's Confession*, written by William Peak. The author will be making a presentation about his novel. THIS WILL BE THE 100TH BOOK REVIEWED BY THE BOOK CLUB! All residents are invited to attend, but must sign up on the sign-up sheet.

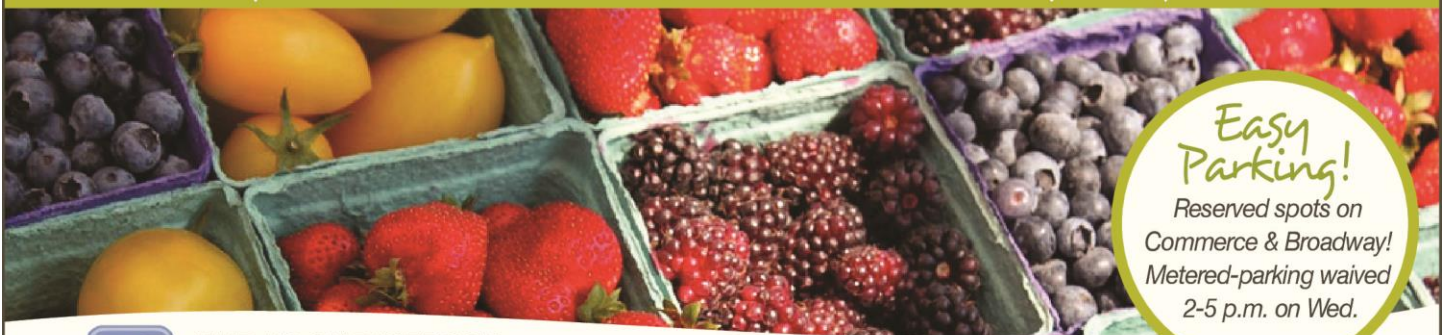

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Bunco Is Coming to Symphony Village! —by Debi Wells



Do you like to play games, but like to talk, too? Then Bunco might be for you! The beauty of Bunco is that you don't need to count cards or strategize. And, after each round, you move to a different table and switch partners, thereby getting to chat with everyone playing by the time the night is over. It's a great way to make new friends and it almost always guarantees laughter.

Bunco is a simple game to play. Players start each of the six sets by rolling three dice for ones, then rolling for twos, three, fours, fives, and then sixes. What makes the game exciting is rolling a Bunco (three of a kind in any number). This is not a quiet game! Getting a Bunco (or not!) involves screeches, giggles, and plenty of good conversation.

At each game, players pay \$5. This covers monetary prizes or gifts for the winners. The winning categories are: "Last Bunco," "Most Buncos," "Most Wins," and "Most Losses."

Cathy Olson and I will be the Bunco coordinators for Symphony Village. Cathy has already secured the Symphony Village Clubhouse for Bunco the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. starting September 1. As we obtain names of interested people who want to play, a team of 12 will be formed. Each month will be hosted by a different team member and that host will determine the theme, what foods (appetizers, desserts, and beverages) will be brought by the other team members, and they will determine whether to use the money collected for purchased gifts or monetary gifts for the winners.

SV CERT is urging all neighbors to update their 'File of Life' medical data.

A 'File of Life' is a true asset to emergency preparedness. It allows first responders to immediately review current medications, then quickly initiate the best possible treatment. When seconds count, the 'File of Life' can make a positive difference. Its format prompts users to identify medical conditions, allergies, medications, who to contact in an emergency, and more. Please be sure to keep the magnetized 'File of Life' on the side of your refrigerator with a copy in your wallet. This is the location first responders will look in SV homes. Please contact an SV CERT Team member to obtain a 'File of Life.'

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Cycling For Fun and a Cause



Four cyclists from Symphony Village joined 300 cyclists in the Two Rivers Bike Ride on Saturday, June 25, to benefit the Wye River Upper School in Centreville. George Drake, Rita Stephens, and Charles Anderson chose the 30-mile route and rode on low traffic roads through Burrissville, Church Hill, Price, and back to Centreville.

Not in the photo because he got an early jump-start on the 66-mile course, Bill Rowley cycled through Burrissville, Church Hill, Millington, Sudlersville, Barclay, Ingleside, Tuckahoe State Park, and back to Centreville. Rest areas with food and drink were provided on all routes and SAG (supply and gear) vehicles traveled the roads to check on riders for pure exhaustion, injuries, and for flat tires and mechanical bike failures.

Amateur radio operators provided communication between Centreville, the seven rest stops, and the seven SAG vehicles.

These SV cyclists and others ride several times a week and Lloyd McAtee leads local, short, slower rides for a number of SV riders on Saturdays. Saturday rides are on local trails or on local roads with very little traffic. Contact Lloyd to join other SV cyclists on small group rides. 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Water Meter Shutoff

If a water leak occurs between your water meter out front and your indoor shutoff valve (probably in the laundry), you will need the town or a plumber to shut the water off ASAP! And they need to find the shutoff at the water meter! Why? Because the leak is between your meter and your house and your meter will continue to run and you will be charged for the water!

At every other home along the roads of SV, there are water meter “pits” – usually two meters per pit. The pits are located between the curb and the sidewalk and on or close to your property line. Inside the pits are two meters – one for your house, one for your neighbor’s house. The lids of the pit are iron and are generally flush with the lawn (or above—lucky you! —or below!). AND, the grass grows over it. The meters are read electronically, so no one needs to open the pit unless there is a water leak between the meter and your inside shutoff valve.

Long story short – you need to remove the grass that grows over the lid of the pit. The lid is pretty easy to locate because it is 12 inches in diameter and says “WATER METER” in big letters. Use a putty knife, trowel, old hatchet, a hoe, or whatever to remove the grass to uncover the lid and make it accessible. See the photos. While you are at it, be a good neighbor and clear the grass from your neighbor’s water meter lids too.



Recipe of the Month -- *From the Kitchen of Zina Lichaa*

Strawberry Angel Food Cake

(Spectacularly delicious and spectacularly easy to make.)

- 1 Angel Food cake (store bought or homemade)
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 pint of strawberries (add sugar to taste)

- Cut the Angel Food cake in thirds (horizontally).
- Whip the cream while adding vanilla.
- Slice the strawberries width-wise. Add sugar as needed.
- Dollop whipped cream on bottom layer, then add strawberries to cover.
- Put the next layer on, adding cream and strawberries.
- Do the same for the next layer.
- Refrigerate until served.
- Garnish cake with red roses and leaves just before serving.

Coloring and Lemonade



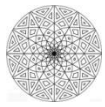
