Covenants Committee

The Covenants Committee has completed a survey of solar panel installations from 2014 to present. We were looking to see if the solar panel installations were installed according to the requirements as stated in the architectural guidelines. A majority of the installations were completed in accordance with the guidelines. Several homes that had solar panel installations will require "screening" to hide some of the **auxiliary equipment**. Those residents will be receiving a letter from the Covenants Committee advising them what they will need to do.

We encourage people to review the Architectural Guidelines very carefully when they are planning any projects for their homes. The Architectural Guidelines are there to help you understand what is required for these projects. If you ever have any questions about what is needed for any project, please contact the Covenants Committee for further clarification.

Operations & Maintenance - Pat Fox, Chair; Dominick Mancinelli, Vice Chair; & Jinny Guy, Secretary

There has been a flurry of maintenance activity in the Village over the last few months. The inventory of cracked or heaved sidewalk sections has been replaced. New concrete sections intersecting the outdoor pool walkways and the pool deck have been poured to replace flagstone slabs and eliminate tripping hazards. The Clubhouse gutters have been cleaned and a gutter capacity analysis has been completed; the drainage system has been deemed adequate for the building size and design. The Gazebo fan has been replaced with an outdoor unit.

In addition, a new double oven and stove was installed in the kitchen. Worn pool table felt covers have been replaced in the Billiard Room.

The malfunctioning treadmills in the gym were fixed at no charge. Users are advised not to let their feet/heels drag on the moving belt when they are getting on or off. Go directly from the metal running board to the belt.

The Clubhouse had a thorough two-day deep cleaning by an outside service that tackled every nook and cranny throughout the building. The indoor pool and poolroom also had a detailed cleaning that included the walls and ceiling.

Shrubs that have seen better days were removed from the rear yard and the indoor poolroom. Remember to please keep your plants at home – the Community has plenty.

A leak into the Craft Room from the front window has been repaired. Tyvek wrap was added under the siding for better weatherproofing. Exposed wiring in the Gatehouse was fixed. The bar floor was treated with colored stain that did a good job covering up nicks and scratches.

The Transition Subcommittee has been dutifully combing SV to find any issues that must be addressed by Caruso Developers before they exit the community. The subcommittee is reviewing the *new section* that has not been completed or turned over to the town addressing incomplete items from the 2010 Transition Report after first phases and the Clubhouse were turned over to Centreville and the SVHOA.

Special Storage Committee Update — Pat Fox, Chair; & Joe Brown, Vice Chair

For the last several months, the Special Storage Committee has been gathering information to assist in making a recommendation to the HOA Board for a preferred firm to provide architectural services. These professional services would include the development of conceptual designs and costs to expand the Clubhouse to provide storage space and a possible ballroom expansion. A proposal was developed outlining our project goals and details; architectural firms with related experience were identified, and proposals sent to them; a pre-proposal meeting was held to brief interested firms and give them the opportunity to ask questions. Submitted proposals were reviewed and interviews held. The hiring recommendation—unanimously approved by the full committee—has been drafted and submitted to the Board. A request for a Special Board Meeting to approve a conceptual design and cost estimating contract has been requested within the next month as the next Board meeting isn't scheduled until October.

Summertime Safety From SV CERT by Debi Wells

August in Symphony Village is hard to beat with our beautifully maintained outdoor and indoor pools, shade trees, and close proximity to a number of beaches. But, for some of us, the heat and sun can be a concern if precautions are not taken. Here are some tips to make sure everyone continues to have a relaxing and safe summer.

Know your neighbors! Yes, communication plays an important role in insuring safety in summer or any



season. Get to know your neighbors and check on them occasionally to make sure they're okay. The friendship that can result is a bonus!

Stay hydrated! Seniors are more susceptible to dehydration than younger folks because we lose the ability to conserve water as we age. We can become less aware of thirst and have difficulty adjusting to temperature changes. Remember to drink water often, especially if you're spending time with friends at the pool.

Check your meds! Talk with your doctor to be sure increased temperatures won't affect your medications.

Wear the right stuff! We all know this, right? But do you do it? Dress for the weather, natural fabrics (think cotton) are cooler than synthetic fibers. And, stock your summer wardrobe with loose-fitting clothing to feel cooler and more comfy.

Protect your eyes! Vision loss is common among our age group. Don't help Mother Nature by exposing yourself to more sun than necessary. Wear sunglasses with UV ray protection.



Guard against hyperthermia! Be cautious about high body temperature, hyperthermia. Heat stroke is an advanced form of hyperthermia. If you feel the onset of hyperthermia, cool your body. Warning signs of hyperthermia can include:

- Feeling overheated (body temperature greater than 104 degrees)
- A change in behavior (being confused, agitated, or grouchy)
- Dry, flushed skin (more pink or red coloring than normal)
- Nausea and vomiting (no explanation needed here!)
- Headache
- Heavy breathing or a rapid pulse
- Not sweating, even if it's hot out
- Fainting

Wear sunscreen! What do you tell your children and grandchildren? Yes, wear sunscreen ... and do it for yourself. As our skin ages and becomes thinner (ugh, an awful thought) put that sunscreen on for the protection we need now more than ever.

Wear a hat! Especially if you have light colored hair (and are more sensitive to the sun) and if you have distant memories of a full head of hair ... protect that scalp!

Exercise smart! Wear the proper clothing if you're outside and consider exercising earlier in the morning or later in the evening. Try not to exercise outside when the sun is at its strongest, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Book Club - Jack Hennessey

At our July 19 meeting, we discussed the book *The Muralist*, by B. A. Shapiro. Lee Ettman, who led the animated discussion, recommended this novel. The author had previously written *The Art Forger*, a New York Times Best Seller, and it looks like this book will be another bestseller. The story is about abstract expressionist artists and how they changed the world. This book certainly changed my perspective on abstract art. The main character, Alizee Benoit, is one of the earliest abstract painters who mysteriously disappears amid the turmoil of the approaching WWII. Her great niece, Danielle Abrams, also an artist, goes to great lengths to trace her aunt's work. She successfully recruits Eleanor Roosevelt, First Lady, as a patron of the arts! The author cites Jackson Pollock, Mark Rothko, and Lee Krasner, three of the most successful abstract artists. One interesting fact thrown in is that Hitler had dictated that all abstract artists be thrown out of Europe! To my delight, the story has a happy ending.

On a scale of 1 to 10, this novel received a rating of 8.0.

The book to be reviewed at our August 16 meeting is *The Storied Life of A.J. Fikry*, by Gabrielle Zevin. A.J. is the owner of a bookstore on Alice Island, appropriately named Island Books. He loves books, but when his wife dies, he loses all interest in them. Then he finds that his prize possession, a valuable copy of the *Poems of Edgar A. Poe*, has been stolen. He is devastated! On closing the store one evening, he finds a two-year-old girl sitting on the floor, reading a book. There is a note left with the child. What is a middle age widower to do with her? The whole town, including the



local Chief of Police, becomes involved. Read this novel to find out how the wisdom of all his books again becomes the lifeblood of A.J. Fikry! Another happy ending!

Management has installed a new fan in the gazebo. Residents are free to use the gazebo at any time for a family picnic.


Lunch Bunch—Bea Trotta, Marge Strano

Dining In is held monthly except during July and August.

How it works:

Dining In is a monthly dinner comprised of neighbors (**Guests**) getting together in another neighbor's (**Host's**) home for a meal together. It is held at 6 p.m. on the last Sunday of each month unless otherwise published in the *Libretto* and/or ECHOES.

Guests: Are volunteers! Each guest will prepare an appetizer, salad, side dish, or dessert (one per household if a couple is attending) and bring any alcoholic beverage they may want for dinner or want to bring to share with the group.

Hosts: Are volunteers! Each host is asked to seat 8-10 guests (including themselves) in their home, set a theme (or not!), contact your guests to coordinate the food item they will bring, and provide the main course, water, and non-alcoholic beverages.

How to participate:

Sign up: Each person is asked to write his or her name on the sign-up sheet in the Clubhouse Activities Book. Please indicate whether you would like to be a *Guest* or a *Host* in the appropriate column. Fill in the columns as appropriate (filling in the columns will let us know how many guests you can accommodate if you are a host, if you have allergies, and more).

Commemorating 1776 Veterans by Honoring Today's Veterans



The Queen Anne's County Commissioners' commemoration of the 240th Anniversary of 1776 continues with a very special event on **Saturday, August 27**. August 27 is the 240th anniversary of the Battle of Long Island, the day that Marylanders (including a substantial number from Queen Anne's County) saved the new United States Army from annihilation by the British. Those men returning home were the first veterans. Therefore, to commemorate that incredible story of bravery, the Commissioners have

proclaimed Saturday, August 27, a Day of Service to Our Veterans.

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<u>Veterans</u> are asked to sign up with their service organizations, their American Legion, or Veterans of Foreign Wars. When veterans sign up, they should indicate what their needs are: help with household needs, yard needs, shopping, etc. If they have no such needs, perhaps they would simply like a visit from someone or a family, go to lunch, or have a picnic. We need to know what they would like on this, their day for service. Members of the public who wish to help by providing a veteran with a day of service should email their name, phone number, and address to <u>mmrgsierrasadie@gmail.com</u>. We will need the information to be able to match each member of the public with the nearest veteran who is in need of help. There is no better way to celebrate the enormous effort that our early Queen Anne's County men made to give us our freedom in 1776— an effort that included serious injury and imprisonment by the British for a year and a half or longer—than to honor our men and women today who have continued to protect our freedom! Thank a veteran on August 27 by giving a day of service to one of them!

Eagle Scout Project: Chesterfield Cemetery & Veterans



Local Boy Scout Troop 464 out of Ruthsburg serves young men throughout the local community. SV Outreach has contributed \$500 toward summer camp scholarships for scouts from QAC who otherwise would not be able to attend camp. The scouts have also helped several SV residents with varied tasks that they could not accomplish without help. One member of the Troop, Kelson Wright, is currently trying to achieve his Eagle Scout rank.
