



We appreciate homeowners abiding by the Architectural Guidelines as they help keep the community looking like it does. Remember that any landscape project you undertake on your property requires the homeowner to submit an exterior modification request.

<u>Another Reminder</u> - Outdoor wood burning is not allowed in the community. We have had reports of some residents using fire pits in the rear yards. Wood-burning fire pits are not allowed in Symphony Village. Our homes are too close together and any live cinders can easily spread by the wind in this area.



Did you know archeologists discovered the fossilized remains of wild roses in Florissant, Colorado, that are over 34 million years old? Did you know the world's oldest living rose bush is thought to be 1,000 years old (it continues to bloom on the wall of the Hildesheim Cathedral in Germany)? And, did you know Shakespeare refers to roses more than 50 times

throughout his writings? "So what"

you might think. What does that have to do with Symphony Village? Well, just look around you. We are filled with the beauty of roses ... or are we?

Has your rose bush become the largest plant in your garden? Or, the smallest? Are the thorns as large as the blossoms? Can you smell its seductive scent ... used by Cleopatra when she entertained her lover, Mark Antony? Whether your responses are yes or no, a presentation on the care of roses may be quite interesting to you.





On **Saturday, June 17, at 2 p.m**., you are invited to attend a speaker event on rose types and how to care for them. naked eye. The spacecraft will end its 20year mission of exploring Saturn and its many moons this September. After its last pass through the rings, it will dive into Saturn's atmosphere. The photo of Earth, taken from the perspective of Saturn, is offered here to remind us of how small we are within the

Cosmic Perspective. That little dot in the photo contains all the countries,

all their inhabitants, and all their problems as it journeys around the sun. This little speck within the cold vastness of space is the only warm home we have. Our present polarization only increases the separateness we have from one another. Through this perspective, it should motivate us to be more kind and understanding toward each other, to seek what we have in common instead of what divides us. For now, we are alone in the Cosmos.

Bird Club – by Linda Blume



I see a lot of Chipping Sparrows here in SV, and they are here year-round and often sighted. The bird is smaller than a house sparrow and identified by its distinctive reddish cap and dark eye stripe. Their diet is mostly insects in the summer and mostly seeds during the rest of the year. They nest

in conifers and deciduous trees, and usually raise two broods per year. The female incubates the eggs, and both parents feed the nestlings. Their song is a loud trill and once you hear it while watching a bird, you won't forget it.

Book Club – by Jack Hennessey

The book for our April 18 meeting was *A House with No Windows*, by Nadia Hashimi, recommended by Lee Ettman. It received a rating of 8.0, on a scale of 1 to 10. The primary action takes place in a women's prison in Afghanistan. The lead character, Zeba, is accused of murdering her husband. We are introduced to her three cellmates who are all accused of sexual crimes. Zeba is defended in court by Yusuf, an American lawyer born in Afghanistan. The judge in the case is an Afghan



woman! However, women are considered second class citizens in Afghanistan. There are many surprising events before the issue is resolved. Read this story for a night of adventure!

The book for our May 15 meeting is *The Power of One* by Bruce Courtenay, recommended by Jack Hennessey. The setting for the novel is South Africa, during the 1940s and 1950s. The story is told from the perspective of Peekay, a man who is reflecting on the events of his youth. The novel charts Peekay's life, from his ghastly experiences as a six year old in a boarding school to his chance meeting with Hoppie Gronewald, who instills in him the desire to become the world champion welterweight boxer (145 lb. limit). Another really interesting person he meets when he is only seven years old is Professor Karl Von Hollensteen, a fabulous botanist and a classical musician. The story is a little slow starting; but by page 200, you will not want to put the very long book down. It is a truly inspirational book! It has a happy ending, but not what you expect.

The Talbot County Department of Emergency Services CERT program trains volunteers to be prepared to respond to emergency situations within their communities. CERT training includes disaster preparedness, disaster fire suppression, basic disaster medical operations, and light search and rescue operations. When emergencies occur, CERT members can give critical support before first responders arrive by providing immediate assistance to victims and organizing spontaneous volunteers at a disaster site.

While CERT members help to improve the safety of their community, they can never replace the professional training of a first responder. *So, always dial 9-1-1 in an emergency*!

VIN 909 Winecafé is located at 909 Bay Ridge Avenue in the Eastport neighborhood of Annapolis. The restaurant is nestled comfortably in a residential neighborhood in a home that looks like it just might be your home with a beautiful front garden and a cozy front porch. The atmosphere is very casual; you can dine out on the front porch or in the back on a beautiful patio. You can also choose to dine inside at the bar or at one of the tables in the dining room. I enjoyed my first experience at the **VIN 909 Winecafé** in the summer of 2016 at the recommendation of friends. Seating is at a first come, first serve basis; you need to arrive early—dinner starts at 5 p.m.

Vic and I decided we would go to the **VIN 909 Winecafé** for a late lunch. We enjoyed a leisure lunch in a beautiful setting on a delightful Spring day. **VIN 909 Winecafé** prides itself on serving American food inspired by California's Mediterranean cuisine. The owner/manager and the Executive



Chef have roots in Italy and New England. Many of the ingredients used to prepare the food are sourced from local, organic providers. The restaurant has a strong commitment to provide organic ingredients whenever possible.



The changing seasonal menu includes a variety of appetizers and plates such as the Roseda Farm Beef Sliders, Grilled Shrimp, Smoked Gouda Gnocchi, sandwiches, delicious vegetable sides, soups and salads, and outstanding desserts to top off your experience. The locally grown Mushroom Risotto is \$13. The Sweet Breads and Foie Gras is \$19.

The pizza is in a class of its own, hand formed and baked to

perfection in a brick oven. Each Eastport style pizza, priced from \$13 to \$19, has its own signature ingredient. Enjoy an outstanding Margherita with mozzarella and basil or perhaps an artichoke, goat cheese, and ricotta pizza. There is even a pizza topped with wild boar meatballs. 


wonderful variety of savory pizzas to satisfy so very many palettes.

The wait staff was accommodating, courteous, knowledgeable, and approachable. We were encouraged to take our time and enjoy our food out on the patio. NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

CENTREVILLE PLANNING COMMISSION UPDATE – Pat Fox, Commissioner

Everyone must have noticed that two new retail stores approved by the Planning Commission are under construction. This includes Dunkin' Donuts at the corner of Route 213 and Laser Drive (still no word on whether they plan to include the Baskin Robbins section) and Auto Zone adjacent to McDonalds.

I have heard concerns that Auto Zone may negatively impact Western Auto located on Water Street. Planning

Commissioners can only evaluate a proposal based upon its adherence to the Master Plan and Zoning ordinances. Both documents define the type of uses that can go on a site and how they can be laid out. The Master Plan identifies residential, commercial, industrial, institutional/governmental, open space, and mixed use zones. The Zoning Code provides the physical criteria by which the development can happen – such as the number of feet of setbacks on the lot, height of buildings, etc. The Planning Commission cannot approve or disapprove the type of business. Let's hope they both survive.

You also may have noticed in the weekly *Update* newspaper that an assisted living/memory wing project – Edenton -- has been proposed. This would be located further in on Laser Drive – at the end of the paved area where the mountain of soil stands. A second phase independent senior living may be added in the future. The Planning Commission gave approval to their preliminary site-plan application; however, they need to return for final approval. I had to recuse myself from the vote, as the developer wants to have an opening through the tree line to connect with the asphalt pathway that SV is both liable for and responsible for maintaining. The HOA Board has hired an attorney to evaluate our



responsibilities and liabilities regarding the path. This item is on the agenda for the May 25 HOA Board meeting.

There have been several additional approvals of lot line adjustments to allow construction of new single family homes in various locations in Centreville. All new construction adds to the tax base of the community.

FROM THE KITCHEN OF SUSAN RAYNER Shrimp Creole

Ingredients

4 cups finely diced onion
2 cups chopped green peppers
2 cups chopped celery
4 cloves garlic, minced
2 sticks of butter or half butter half olive oil
½ cup flour
5 (14.5 ounces) cans stewed tomatoes chopped with juice
3 (8 ounces) cans tomato sauce
5 (8 ounces) cans seafood broth or stock

³⁄₄ (8 ounces) can chicken broth

Instructions

- 1. In a large saucepan, over medium heat, melt butter
- 2. Add onions, peppers, and celery to the pan
- 3. Season the vegetables with salt and 2 tablespoons Cajun spice mix
- 4. Saute the vegetables until wilted
- 5. Stir in the bay leaves, stewed tomatoes, tomato sauce, and garlic
- 6. Adjust seasoning
- 7. Bring the mixture up to a boil and reduce to a simmer
- 8. Simmer the mixture for about 15 minutes
- 9. Season the mixture with the Worcestershire Sauce and hot sauced
- 10. Whisk the flour and seafood broth together. Add the flour mixture to the tomato mixture and continue to cook about 4 to 6 minutes or until it thickens
- 11. Add the chicken broth
- 12. Add the shrimp to the mixture and continue to cook for about 4 to 6 minutes or until the shrimp turn pink and cur up. Stir in the green onions and parsley
- 13. Check the seasoning and add more salt and/or Cajun spice if needed.
- 14. Serve with basmati rice.

¹/₄ cup Worcestershire sauce
4 teaspoon Cajun spice mix—
reserve 2 teaspoons for
seasoning at the end
4 Bay leaves
4 dashes hot pepper sauce
4 lbs medium to jumbo shrimp
Pinch of salt
4 chopped green onions
Sprigs of parsley to garnish
