## SV Board of Directors Report - June 2017 <br> Approved Motions

## March Minutes:

- Approved the minutes of the March 24 Board meeting as written.


## Clubhouse Expansion:

- Approved a motion based on the May 5 majority-homeowner vote to approve a Clubhouse expansion to earmark \$230,000 of unobligated Homeowners' Equity to be used for the Clubhouse expansion project.
- Approved a motion to authorize the Budget and Finance Committee to begin negotiating with banks for a loan to provide Clubhouse


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- Approved a motion to approve the contract to hire the Torchio Architects project team, including sub-consultants, to complete the Clubhouse expansion design, manage the contract bid phase, and provide construction administration services at a cost not to exceed $\$ 72,200$. These funds will be available through the life of the project and will not expire at the end of calendar year 2017.
- Approved a motion to authorize the submitted Request for Proposal to competitively procure a General Contractor/Construction Manager for the Clubhouse expansion project with a proposed budget not to exceed $\$ 438,000$, including site work.


## Asphalt Walking Path:

- Approved a motion to purchase four signs to be posted along the asphalt path at either end (Walgreens to Symphony Way) posting hours of access and limiting use to pedestrians, bicycles, and motorized devices to meet ADA requirements based upon requirements set out in the 2003 easement agreement.
- Approved a motion to purchase no less than four steel safety bollards to be installed at either end of the path (at Walgreens and at the split on SV property at the utility node) and at the intersection of Laser Drive and Route 213 at a cost not to exceed $\$ 400$.
- Approved a motion to send correspondence by registered mail to the Town of Centreville requesting that it take over the maintenance and liability of the asphalt pathway from Walgreens to the Centreville side of the creek bridge and include this in their Open Space inventory.


## SV Finances:

- Approved a motion based on the recommendation of the Investment

- Approved a motion to authorize the Budget and Finance Committee to develop a Reserve Fund Use Policy for consideration by the Board.


## Pool Rules:

- Approved a motion to amend \#17 of the Pool Rules to read: "Residents who bring children to the pool must be on the pool deck supervising the child in the pool at all times, and if the child is a non-swimmer (even if they are wearing a flotation device), the resident or a parent must be in the pool with the child. No child can be left on the pool deck unsupervised at any time."


## Tennis Courts:

- Approved a motion to authorize three repair items for the tennis courts to be paid from the 2017 Operating Budget at a cost not to exceed \$2,900: (1) Clean and fill structural cracks and apply overlay paint with a three-year warranty at a cost of $\$ 1,640$; (2) clean and fill overlay fence post cracks with asphalt-treated fiberglass fabric (120-day warranty) at a cost of $\$ 1250$; and (3) replace water-removal sponge roller at a cost of $\$ 95$.
- Approved a motion to authorize replacement of the tennis court fence top rail (approximately 330 LF ) with a new black vinyl-top rail at a cost of $\$ 3,420$ to be paid from the Reserve Fund.


## Next Board Meeting Date:

- Approved a motion to hold the next Board meeting on Wednesday, August 2, at 10 a.m. in the Clubhouse.

## School Book Giveaway

Sneakers hosted four end-of-year elementary school book giveaways. We were able to give books to students at Kennard, Centreville, Church Hill, and Sudlersville schools. These students now have a new book of their choosing to read over the summer.

Thank you to all the SV residents who helped with this most worthwhile event.

## Do You Know What Sneakers Is?

Sneakers is a non-profit organization exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Our mission is to provide support to children and families in the QAC school system that have financial needs as identified by the school counselors.

Sneakers began almost 13 years ago by adopting a very poor family who were sending their children to school in flip-flops or shoes without soles during the winter. We were asked to provide sneakers for this family. Thus, the name Sneakers was born.
We continued adopting families every year for the holiday season, providing them with clothing, a new pair of sneakers, and a few toys. This past holiday season, ten families had happier holidays because their children had gifts to open.

Sneakers gives books away two to three times each school year to elementary-age children in the Kennard, Centreville, Church Hill, and Sudlersville schools. We assist with helping financially strapped sixth graders attend the overnight outdoor education program, as well.

Each year Sneakers awards scholarships to high school graduating students going on to Chesapeake College or to other Maryland schools. Their respective school guidance counselors identify these graduating students. This year we awarded $\$ 2,000$ to these deserving students, who might otherwise not be able to further their education.

We also provide funds on an annual basis for children to attend Camp New Dawn, an overnight summer camp sponsored by Compass Regional Hospice, to assist children dealing with the loss of a parent or immediate family member.

As school guidance counselors bring other needs to our attention, we provide financial help as well as volunteer services to the local schools and support other schoolidentified needs that may occur.

All of this is possible because of the commitment of the Sneakers' members and you through your ongoing generosity. Thank you for your support!!

## CLUBS AND CLASSES

## Symphony Village Astronomy Club - by The Armchair Astronomer, Larry

 Rayner

Two LANDMARK events occurred recently. First, the Anniversary of John F. Kennedy's birth (May 29, 1917) and, secondly, the first observing session of our new SV Astronomy Club. ())
Our $35^{\text {th }}$ President deserves mention since his decision had such a positive impact on our space exploration program and astronomy in general. His Profiles in Courage set America on our present course of exploring our galaxy when he announced in Houston on September 12, 1962, in what has come to be called his "moon speech," a probe was on its way to Venus. For his full uplifting speech, see: https://er.jsc.nasa.gov/seh/ricetalk. From his vision, America was first to put a man on the moon. Now our probes have reached into our solar system and Hubble has gone beyond. For NASA, the sky holds no limits.
Our first observing session was held after our June 2 Happy Hour where we got to see the moon and its craters and Jupiter and four of its prominent moons (the same satellites observed by Galileo in 1610). The new

Astronomy Club was well received (we now have almost 30 members), as was the Blue Marble cocktail, of which we served about 60 (you do the math). The next observing session will be announced to the members through email. We anticipate this to occur the last week of June. Subjects will be the moon and the beautiful ringed planet Saturn.

Prior to our observing session with binoculars or a small telescope, you should be able to see Saturn and Jupiter after sunset and some of its moons, when looking SE and SW respectively. Look along the ecliptic path the sun takes through the sky. Saturn is at "opposition," its closest approach to Earth during the year. Saturn will be at magnitude -2.2 ; Jupiter and its four prominent moons will be at magnitude -1.7 and between magnitude 5 and 6, respectively (possibly visible to the naked eye for those with good eyesight). Another thing to look for on Jupiter is the Great Red spot (a 300-year-old hurricane). For those who don't understand magnitude or how to find/use it, try using the Sky Guide App. By placing your phone or iPad up to the sky you will see constellations, stars, and planets. They are not actual sightings, but are computer generated and well worth downloading this free App; also try Sky View.
Neil deGrasse Tyson recently said "Man is the only creature that sleeps on his back looking at the stars." Perhaps that is what has made us, since the beginning of our species, so fascinated with the sky and our galaxy. We are all amateur astronomers, every time we walk out at night and look up and wonder, is that the North Star, the Big Dipper, Venus? No prior knowledge of astronomy or astrophysics is needed to join the club, we will all learn together. We hope more of you join the Astronomy Club and dance with us across the Milky Way.

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## Gazebo Garden - by Jack Hennessey

Well, it has finally happened. All timbers have been removed from the 20 flower beds and the entire area has been sodded! I have to admit that Complete did a fine job. But the question remains - "Where have all the flowers gone?" I have a few pictures, but nothing now is left but majestic memory. A few dedicated gardeners will remember that there were 13,025 black-eyed Susans at the date of the contest when the closest guess was 10,000. Many residents were lucky enough to rescue many plants from the plow and the sickle. My favorite flowers were the daffodils, which Wordsworth immortalized thusly:

For oft when on my couch I lie,
In vacant or in pensive mood,
They flash upon the inward eye,
Which is the bliss of solitude,
For then my heart with pleasure fills,
And dances with the daffodils.

## Reading for Fun Book Club - by Jack Hennessey



The book that we discussed at our May 16 meeting was The Power of One, by Bruce Courtenay, recommended by Jack Hennessey. The setting for the novel is South Africa, during the 1940s and 1950s. Peekay (the author?) is relating the story of his life, primarily his youth. At six years old, Peekay is attending a boarding school where he is constantly harassed by the Nazi-leaning upper-classmen. Peekay happens to meet Hoppie Groenwald, a welter-weight ( 145 pounds) boxer. Hoppie instills in Peekay a desire to become the welter-weight champ. When he is only 7 years old, Peekay meets Professor Karl Von Hollensteen, a famous botanist and a classical musician. Peekay continues to pursue his dream as a boxer. On a scale of 1 to 10 , this book received a rating of 8.2.
The book for our June 20 meeting is Hillbilly Elegy, a memoir by the author, J.D. Vance. It is a passionate and personal analysis of the loss of the American dream for a large segment of the USA. J.D. Vance, a former Marine and a law school graduate, tells the story of what a social, regional, and class decline feels like when you are born into it. An interesting sideline relates J.D.'s relationship with his mom, who has several husbands and many boyfriends during her drug-addicted life. J.D. does stick by his mom thru thick and thin-which is amazing! This is a recommended read. All residents are invited to sit in on any of our Book Club meetings.

## Celebrate Spring With Blue False Indigo - by Betty McAtee

If you enjoy unique, out-of-the-ordinary flowering perennials in your garden, blue false indigo (Baptisia australis) is worth considering. From its Latin scientific name, "bapto" means "to dip" or "to dye." Early Native Americans used blue false indigo flowers for blue dye.
This perennial is native to eastern North America and the Midwest, and so is generally trouble free and deer resistant, tolerant to drought, and rarely subject to serious pest damage. Its spectacular purple-blue lupine-like flowers and unusual blue-grey foliage do well when cut for a floral arrangement.
Blue false indigo grows 3-4 feet tall into a shrub-type plant, and is a magnet for numerous pollinators, especially butterflies. Numerous butterfly caterpillars are attracted to its foliage for food. It prefers full to partial sun. Its large seed pods eventually turn black, and provide winter interest if left uncut. These are also used in decorative dried arrangements.

Seedlings of blue false indigo need about 2-3 years to produce blossoms, but established plants can remain for decades. Easily propagated by seeds from its
 pods, it's definitely a favorite of mine.

From Farm to Village - by Ann Walsh

A delightful, fun and informative evening was had when the Woods came to dinner at the Walshes'. I want to share with fellow residents how Symphony Village began.
Jean and Nicholas (Woody) Wood have lived in Centreville all their lives. Woody is older than Jean by a few years, but as is typical in small towns, they did know each other, went to the same schools, knew each other's friends, started dating in 1952, and married in 1953.

Growing up, farming was always a part of Woody's life. He joined the Air Force in the early 1950's moving several times, with Jean and two small children during his tour of duty. He thought of making the Air Force his career yet farming was still in his heart. While he was still in the service, his decision about his future came when he and Jean bought their first farm near Church Hill in 1955. Woody saved his leave time to use during the busy
time of harvesting the crops, driving across country in some cases to help his bothers. Thus his life as a farmer seriously began.

Jean received her BS at the University of Maryland and her MA from Washington College. She was a teacher for 33 years in Queen Anne's County, including being Principal at Church Hill Elementary and an instructional supervisor

Jean and Woody bought the present farm of 280 acres in the mid 70's and farmed primarily for crops: corn, soybeans, and winter wheat. Their stories of growth were delightful, including going from a small "John Deere" you had to crank to start, to a large one with a built in starter. Woods said, "l really felt like a big farmer then."

The Woods sold 220 acres of their farm to Caruso in 2003, paving the way for Symphony Village. They were asked by many in the area, "How could you sell it?" Woody admits he misses seeing the farm outside his kitchen window but he and Jean know they made the right decision and would do it
again. The many new neighbors "on the farm" that they have come to know confirm their decision.
The Symphony Village Clubhouse sits on the land where the original farm house was located. The Wood family lived there just long enough for their present home to be built. You can see their lovely brick home in the SW corner of our "village." The little brick house, used as the construction office on Taylor Mill Road, was built for their youngest son.

The pond behind Sonata Way was originally a small pond dug out by the Woods, filled with fish, providing food for the old blue heron that still
comes around, the geese, and a source of water for the deer.

While busy with farming and teaching, Jean and Woody raised three successful children and now love being grandparents to 10 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

The Woods are wonderful historians on Centreville and Queen Anne's County, knowing so many individuals since they were children and now seeing them as Council Members and the like. You can meet Woody and Jean at one of our parties or most afternoons at the indoor pool.

## Recipe of the Month

This recipe won First Place at the 2016 Great Centreville Cookie Contest

## Maple Glazed Waffle Cake Cookies

2 sticks of softened butter
1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
3 eggs
2 cups flour
For the glaze:
$3 / 4$ cup powdered sugar plus 5 Tablespoons real maple syrup

- Cream softened butter and sugar until fluffy.
- Add in cinnamon.

- Turn mixer to medium and add eggs
- Slowly mix in flour until well blended.
- Heat waffle iron to 400F degrees.
- Add about a tablespoon of dough to each section of the waffle iron.
- Bake for 2 to 4 minutes or until the cookies are golden brown.
- Let the cookies cool and crisp up on a wire rack.
- Mix glaze ingredients and dip cookies. Let cool.
