



COMMITTEE REPORTS

Symphony Village HOA Board of Directors April Meeting Voting Summary - Pat Fox, Vice President

- ❖ Concert Hall Rental Agreement: Approved the revised Concert Hall Lease Agreement which now includes requiring an insurance rider for no less than \$1,000,000 in general liability naming Symphony Village as additional insured and a requirement to pay for a staff person to be present during the event to assist with any building or room issues at a fee of \$25/hour. The rental fee of \$250 remains the same, and the resident will have a much larger room in which to hold their event.
- ❖ Outdoor Fans: Approved the proposal from Garrett German & Sons for \$1,150 to install two outdoor fans in the patio area outside the existing ballroom.
- ❖ Fitness Rooms/Restroom Repairs: Approved up to \$6,000 for Ray Painting to do the following work: remove all wallpaper in the locker rooms and restrooms, paint restrooms, drywall repair in women's locker room, drywall repair and paint in the fitness center, and replacement of door kick plates.
- ❖ Indoor Pool: Approved purchasing additional screens for the sliding doors for \$257.

- ❖ CD Rollover: Approved rollover of a \$150,000 CD at Provident Bank into a CD at Revere Bank (paying 2.2% for 1 year).
- ❖ Putting Green: Approved tabling the decision to remove the putting green and having the Operations Committee review the options and costs to repair it.

Grilling season is going into full swing now and warnings have been renewed from the NIH that cooking and grilling meat, poultry, and fish at high temperatures for long periods of time can be dangerous to your health and promote cancer. Grilling meats, in particular, to well done states causes fat, protein, and sugar molecules to fuse together, making them difficult to cut, chew, and digest. Cooking meats at high temperatures for long periods toughens the meat, destroys the nutrients, and creates carcinogens. Your best bet is to use a meat thermometer and shoot for (if you have to) medium-well and never well done.

BOOK CLUB - April 2018 Review - Joe Sikes


The Symphony Village Book Club held a spirited meeting on April 17 to review *Fall Down 7 Times Get Up 8* by Naoki Higashida. Members present were Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Bob Nilsson, Lee Ettman, Pat Loiacono, Mary Jo Volpicelli, and Mary Colling-Officer. Peggy Decker voted by proxy.

Naoki Higashida was born in Kimitsu, Japan, in 1992. Diagnosed with severe autism when he was five, he subsequently learned to communicate using a handmade alphabet grid and began to write poems and short stories. This book follows his first book, *The Reason I Jump*, which he wrote at the age of thirteen. He offers profound insight into autism and specifically his extreme non-verbal variety.

The group found his insights extremely interesting and applicable to people dealing with the whole spectrum of autism from severe to mild. As we continued the discussion, the group was able to apply the author's insights to many other social interactions beyond autism. Bob Nilsson, for example, recognized similarities with the struggles faced by wounded warriors suffering from traumatic brain injury and PTSD.

I was struck by one simple example related by the author when he was offered a reward for completing a task in school. The students were allowed to pick a *well-done* sticker to attach to their work and the stickers came in the form of different animals. While intended to be a reward, for the author the open-ended choice was just another difficult task. He eventually picked a *panda* sticker just to be done with the task. His teachers mistakenly assumed pandas were his favorite animal. It wasn't until years later that his communication skills progressed and allowed him to explain that his choice did not express a preference but simply completed a task.

The challenge of communication can be daunting even for those who don't face the severe limitations of the



author. His ability to overcome his condition and express himself with such clarity and depth can be an inspiration for us all.

The group rated the book at 7.6 on our ten-point scale, which is above the historic average. (The score was 7.56 but I rounded it off ... in case Jack Hennessey reads this). The group commented that this was not a book that many of us would have picked out on our own. We are grateful to Lee Ettman for recommending it.

Our meetings are held on the third Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Clubhouse. Everyone is welcome. Upcoming books we plan to review are listed below:

CERT Prepares for the 2018 Hurricane Season

Community Emergency Response Teams (CERTs) can, and do, improve their neighborhood's ability to protect against, respond to, and recover from disasters. Did you know that CERT programs could have a national impact, too?

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) leads national-level exercises every two years. National Level Exercise (NLE) 2018 will examine the ability of all levels of government, private industry, and nongovernmental organizations to protect against, respond to, and recover from a major Mid-Atlantic hurricane. The scenario involves a major hurricane that makes landfall near Hampton Roads, Virginia, causing





severe damage to residences, businesses, and critical infrastructure throughout the Mid-Atlantic. Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria last fall reinforced our need to prepare for hurricanes, and NLE 2018 provides a well-timed opportunity to apply lessons from those storms before the 2018 Atlantic hurricane season, which begins on June 1.

The Symphony Village CERT is actively taking part in NLE 2018 by examining our readiness for hurricanes and other disasters and developing a Symphony Village Hurricane Emergency Plan. Help spread the word to your family, coworkers, and neighbors. Here are some ways you can get involved and prepare:

Get Alerts and Warnings

Receiving timely information about adverse weather or other emergency events can make all the difference in knowing when to act to be safe.

Download the FEMA App to learn what to do before, during, and after emergencies, and receive weather alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five different locations anywhere in the United States.

Create and Test a Family Communication Plan

Make a plan today. It is important to understand which types of disasters could affect your area. Your family may not be together when a disaster strikes. Know how you will communicate and reconnect if separated. Establish a family meeting place that is familiar and easy to find.

Get started on your plan at www.ready.gov/make-a-plan.

Use FEMA's Family Communication Plan to help your family practice and remember your plan.

Document and Insure Property

When a disaster strikes, having the right insurance for your home is needed to help you repair, rebuild, or replace what has been damaged.



Strengthen Your Financial Preparedness

Know your disaster costs. Taking the time now to collect and secure personal financial, insurance, medical, and other records will give you peace of mind and, in the event of an emergency, will ensure that you have the documentation needed to start the recovery process without delay.

Visit http://www.mymoney.gov to learn how to save, invest, and get insured for your financial future.

Get Trained

Minutes matter in a disaster, and if emergency responders aren't nearby, you can be the help until help arrives. There are many ways to get involved in your community.

Consider taking a CERT training or refresher course offered in your community.

The Armchair Astronomer - Larry Rayner

Continuing our Celestial Sphere or Where in the Sky is that?


You know in the past I've said look to the north, northeast, about 40 degrees to find the constellation Cassiopeia, well exactly how do you know where is north, northeast and how do you tell the degrees. A compass can find north for you, but Polaris is your True North, as we discussed before. Once you have north, northeast is easy because we can picture our Celestial Sphere.

We know there are 360 degrees in a circle. We know the Cardinal Points of North and South are on the horizon, at 180 degrees apart, half the distance of the circle. We know the Zenith is directly overhead, 90 degrees, now let's find the Angular Separation of any point in the sky.

Half the distance from the Horizon and the Zenith is 45 degrees, that is the easy part. I'm going to let *Cosmic Pursuits* explain just how easy it is to find smaller degrees than 45.

Your hands and fingers are remarkably accurate in measuring degrees.

- ✓ Stretch your thumb and little finger as far from each other as you can. The span from tip to tip is about 25 degrees.
- ✓ Do the same with your index finger and little finger. The span is 15 degrees.
- ✓ Clench your fist at arm's length and hold it with the back of your hand facing you. The width is 10 degrees.
- ✓ Hold your three middle fingers together; they span about 5 degrees.
- ✓ The width of your little finger at arm's length is 1 about degree.



That is the end of our first Astronomy Lesson, The Night Sky. Now for more fun viewing this month we are in for a treat.

All of the major planets are on display between May and July. These include: Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, and Venus. During this time period, they will all be closest to the earth for the year. Jupiter, in the night sky, is brilliant this month as it is only out shown by the Moon and Venus. It is the brightest star in the southeastern sky and can be seen with the naked eye or binoculars. If you remember, last June we viewed Jupiter with my telescope and we were able to see four of its moons. Venus, looking west, about an hour after sunset will be visible, just to the right of the moon, approximately 20 degrees above the horizon, on May 17. On May 15, at midnight, look for Saturn in the southeast, on the Elliptic (the path the Sun took in the day). Saturn will take center stage during the month of June. In the morning sky, Mars will appear in the south as a red star. It is now the closest to Earth in 15 years. *Happy Star Gazing!!*
