CLUBHOUSE EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT

In a crisis would you know where emergency equipment is located in the Clubhouse? The next time you are there, familiarize yourself with what available and where it is. Here is a list for your reference:

AEDs (2)

An AED, or automated external defibrillator, is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It's a sophisticated, yet easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm. There are two AEDs in the Clubhouse located:



- In the Gym next to the telephone
- In the Card Room next to the outside door

BACKBOARD


A backboard is a stiff board on which an injured person and especially one with neck or spinal injuries is placed and immobilized in order to prevent further injury during transport. A backboard is located:



In the Indoor Pool area in the alcove with the telephone

BLEEDING CONTROL

Uncontrolled bleeding is the number one cause of preventable death from trauma. There is a Stop the Bleed kit located:

- In the Indoor Pool area in the alcove with the telephone




TELEPHONES (4)

WHAT'S ALL THE NOISE OUT THERE? BILL WELLS LANDSCAPE & TREE COMMITTEE

What was all that noise out there? Why do some of our trees now have holes excavated around their trunks?

As I am sure many of you have noticed, our spruce, white pine, and some maple trees have been having issues. Almost all are the result of the trees having been planted too deep or having their roots buried under several inches of soil and mulch. This condition can be seen throughout the Village. If a tree looks like a telephone pole (that is, you cannot see roots spreading out from the trunk as it enters the soil), or there is soil and mulch piled high against the trunk, then the tree is under considerable health issues. Unfortunately, many landscape companies do not plant trees correctly. These conditions can lead to trunk and root decay, and an entryway for pathogens, girdling roots, softened tree bark, suffocated feeder roots, or other serious concerns appearing after planting. Unfortunately, these issues happen well after warranties have expired.

In an effort to help save some of our trees, the Landscape Committee together with the HOA Board and SV Management contracted Bartlett Tree Experts to perform root excavation on a select group. You may have seen the Bartlett truck pulling a generator around the Village over the last few weeks. The white pines and spruces along Symphony Boulevard were chosen because they were still healthy enough to recover from years of being improperly planted. The red maple trees on Harmony between Symphony Way and Bravo were also included because this past summer they were losing their crowns (leaves at the top of the tree) and beginning to succumb to scale infestation. Both conditions are the result of poor planting.

The excavations (holes near the tree trunks) were performed by one of Bartlett's certified arborists using an air spade. This method allowed the arborist to safely remove soil from

the base of a tree and around its roots, without significant damage. The air spade uses high-pressure air, provided by a generator, through a hose to blow the excess soil and mulch from a trunk or roots. The arborist was then able to examine the condition of the roots, trunk, and expose the root flare. In many cases girdling roots were cut out, trunk decay was eliminated, and the root flare was finally exposed (a good thing). This action should dramatically reduce the stress the trees have been undergoing and improve their overall health.

If you happen to see the treated red maples along Harmony, you will notice a hole around the root. Look closely and you will see the root flare. That root flare should be even with the sidewalk. It's too late to dig them up and replant them; however, later this year the tree beds will be evened out so there will be a gentle cupping rather than a hole. If we were successful, we should see an overall improvement in the health of these trees this year.

These actions are but a few that Landscape is pursuing to improve the health and visual aesthetics of the Village trees. If you are interested in learning more or contributing, please consider joining the Landscape Committee. We are always looking for new talent and fresh ideas.

READING FOR FUN JOE SIKES – DECEMBER 2018 REVIEW

The SV Book Club met on December 18 to review *Missing*, *Presumed* by Susie Steiner. Attendees were Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Mary Jo Volpicelli, Susan Goldberg, Bob Nilsson, Kathryn and Jim Buckheit, Cathy Olson, Lee Ettman, and Mary Drake.



The book provided the Club a chance to try and unravel a "whodunit" that was recommended to us by Kathryn and Jim Buckheit. All agreed that it successfully scratched our itch as it told the story of a missing young woman in Cambridgeshire, England. The author lays breadcrumbs throughout the book as detectives try to find what happened to Edith Hind. Not many of us solved the mystery before the end of the book...except the CHEATERS!

Our discussion of the book quickly focused, not on the story, but rather the character development. The author provides a rich and varied cast of characters, starting with Detective Inspector Manon Bradshaw. This book is the author's first featuring this character and has been followed by a second

novel. Since many of us are addicted to various BBC crime dramas, I couldn't help but see Manon as the future star of a new series (*Manon*?). She is a middle-aged woman who is a first-rate detective, but whose personal life is in a shambles. The character is in the mold of DI Alec Hardy (*Broadchurch*) or DCI Kurt Wallander (*Wallander*).

Ms. Steiner fills out the cast of characters with the affable partner Davy, upper class parents of the missing girl, and various career criminals linked to the missing girl by her volunteer work at a local prison. Desperately seeking a man in her life, Manon runs through a series of failed relationships while working away at the high-profile case. Eventually events occur that lead to solving the case but, in an interesting twist, Manon bonds with a teenage boy who becomes homeless when his older brother (and only family) is murdered. Spoiler Alert...This character shows up in the second book. If it eventually turns into a TV show, I hope I didn't ruin it for you.

The Club scored the book as a 6.4 out of 10, which is about our average score historically. Upcoming Book Club meetings will be held at 7 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Clubhouse. Everyone is welcome. In fact, I talked to an



technologies) and ability to team, this resident was asked to be one of a three-person unit to represent all of Northrop Grumman as 'one-face' to the military customer in Washington, DC—to support counter Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) technologies.

Wanting to know what the military needed, this resident read, researches, attended numerous nationwide conferences, and talked with many of our nation's finest—after they had been impacted in Iraq and Afghanistan. "There's no words for the courage and heroism our military display every day, and especially after suffering great harm. Not one-not even one-soldier ever told me they'd think twice about serving again." Instead, all told the resident, "Everyone has challenges to overcome, mine are no different than yours." 
