BOARD OF DIRECTORS APPROVED ACTION ITEMS - OCTOBER 25, 2019

- **2020 Proposed Budget:** Unanimous approval that the proposed 2020 budget as prepared by the Budget & Finance Committee, with the help of management and various committee chairs, be sent to all owners for review and that it be placed on the Association Website immediately. Owners are encouraged to review the budget and provide feedback in writing before the December 4 annual meeting or make comments in person at the annual meeting when the Board will vote.
- **Reserve Study:** Unanimous approval of the 2019 Reserve Study based on the Operations Committee recommendation.
- ProCom Management Addendum: Unanimous approval of the addendum to the

management contract that requires a meeting with ProCom and the Board and Budget & Finance Committee at least once a year.

- **Beaver Lodge Removal:** Unanimous approval of \$2,100 for Solitude Lake Management to remove the beaver lodges in Ponds 1 and 2.
- Front Bed Landscaping Declination (Opt-Out): Unanimous approval of the Front Bed Landscaping Declination form as presented. Owners will have until January 1 to submit the form at which time it will have been determined by the Landscape and Irrigation Committee what type of mulch will be used next year.
- Fall Tree Planting: Unanimous approval of six trees recommended by the Landscape and Irrigation Committee to be planted in common areas by International Landscape Design (ILD) at a cost of \$2,905.
- **Sidewalk Shaving:** Unanimous approval to spend up to \$14,000 for Precision Concrete Cutting to shave down all sidewalks that are raised ½ inch or more based upon the recommendation of the Operations Committee.

COVENANTS UPDATE

It's not easy to create a culture of good, effective communication, be open to learning, be flexible, and (most importantly) make yourself available to help residents every week. However, the Covenants Committee is working very hard to do that!

There were 76 exterior modifications submitted for review this year; it is apparent the community wants to improve their properties and is seeking small changes to stay competitive with neighboring communities. These changes have encouraged Covenants members to learn in order to vet projects thoroughly. We have become aware of the difference between a sliding and double-hung window, now know what a knee wall is, what constitutes a structure, what a building restriction line (BRL) is, and much, much more. All of this helps us understand the needs and desires of the community. A Covenants Committee's ability to help its HOA adapt to change is essential for long-term success of the community (think property values)!

A BIG change for the Covenants Committee and the Community: On the advice of the community lawyer, the Covenants Committee is being required to emulate the Board on voting by email. That is, the Committee's email vote must be unanimous for any decision. Since the inception of the community, a majority vote by the Covenants Committee via email was sufficient to make a decision on an exterior project. However, starting November 1, 2019, any resident requesting an email vote (to expedite their project for any reason) must obtain all Covenants Committee members' approval via email, and that may be a challenge.

Want to ensure your exterior modification project receives a decision the first time presented? Here's how: please submit your Exterior Modification Form (EMF) AT LEAST one week prior to the Covenants Committee's monthly meeting. The earlier you submit the EMF the better! This allows Covenants members to thoroughly evaluate proposed projects, ask important questions of the homeowner, and acquire any missing information before the project is presented and voted upon. Tabling an EMF at a meeting, due to lack of information, can result in a lengthy wait by the homeowner to initiate their project. As all in Symphony Village know, no exterior project (as outlined in the HOA covenants document, called the

Architectural Requirements) may be initiated without review and receipt of an HOA Management approval letter, after review by the Covenants Committee.

The better the communication, the better the relationship. It's all about building a real sense of community. That's the reason input from residents is always welcomed, as is your attendance at monthly meetings. The Covenants Committee meets the first Tuesday monthly at 10 a.m. in the Concert Hall. Please join us for part of a meeting, an entire meeting, or join as a member! We could use your help!

LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION COMMITTEE

Is This Something New for Your Salad?

Not really! But, if you've seen this in your yard, either on a plant, rocks, garden hook, or tree trunk ... you're pretty lucky! Don't disturb or remove it! It's a praying mantis egg case, otherwise known as an "ootheca." The egg cases look like frothy, liquid-like structures, but it's hard and papery. They have a compartment-like special formation for each single egg. These compartments have a tiny one-way, valve-like structure that helps the insects hatch with minimum efforts. These "oothecas" are meant to protect the 100 to 200 baby mantises during the



cold weather. When they hatch, they look exactly like adult praying mantises, except they are very tiny.

The reason you are lucky? Praying mantises are exactly what we need to naturally control many of our garden and crop pests. Their speed and stealth make them excellent hunters. They literally eat anything they can catch—from small aphids and spider mites to Japanese beetles and more. If you see them in your garden, rest assured they, like many other beneficial insects, are helping to reduce the insects that are attacking your flowers and ornamentals.

Here are some interesting praying mantis facts you may not know:

- A praying mantis has only one ear, which is at the same ultrasonic frequency bats use.
- In Maryland, the entire adult population die when cold weather sets in. But, their eggs make it through to spring!
- Praying mantises are diurnal insects, which means they are active and hunt only during the daytime.

- They shed their exoskeleton (outer skin layer) for a record 12 times, before growing into a complete adult. Can you imagine if they were crabs? You would have 12 opportunities to have soft crab sandwiches!
- They can turn their head 300 degrees enabling them to see almost the entire area around them without moving the rest of their body.

So, if you see these nests around your yard, don't remove them—delay using insecticides next spring and summer. Let nature help your gardens achieve their full potential!

The wild turkey is native to Maryland, and I've seen them in and around Symphony Village. Wild turkeys have adapted to living on the edges of suburban habitat, rebounding in the wild after having been seriously depleted by the beginning of the 20th century. Benjamin Franklin would have preferred the wild turkey, rather than the bald eagle, be chosen as the national symbol of the United States.

Wild turkeys generally get around by walking or running, but they can fly strongly

and typically roost overnight in trees.

Wild turkeys are omnivores and forage mostly by walking on the ground, scratching in leaf litter to expose food items. Their diet varies by season, but it is mostly plant material including acorns, leaves, seeds, grains, berries, buds, grass blades, roots, and bulbs. They also will eat insects, spiders, snails, and sometimes frogs, lizards, snakes, salamanders, and crabs. Sometimes they climb in shrubs or trees to eat berries.



Turkeys segregate into flocks based on sex and age.

In summer, fall, and winter, the basic unit is the family flock consisting of the hen and this year's brood; one or more successful broods may combine into larger flocks in late summer and fall. Adult males form flocks

that rarely associate with hens outside the breeding period. In spring, large flocks will form as gobblers join flocks of hens in large groups; mating flocks break off and consist of two to three adult gobblers and five to fifteen hens.

READING FOR FUN

The SV Book Club met on October 15 to review *Beneath a Scarlet Sky* by Mark T. Sullivan. Attendees were Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Kathryn and Jim Buckheit, Peggy Decker, Lidija Kampa, Mary Jo Volpicelli, Bob Nilsson, DeAnn Cheyne, Sue Canfield, Lee Ettman, and Susan Goldberg.

Beneath a Scarlet Sky tells the amazing story of a young teenager, Pino Lella, during the last two years of World War II in Northern Italy. The Nazi occupation of Italy and the Catholic underground railroad (formed to save Italian Jews) has received scant attention compared to Allied efforts in Western Europe. During my military career, I studied at various War Colleges, rarely touching on this theater of World War II. My Catholic education mostly avoided discussion of the uninspiring role of the Catholic Church during the Holocaust. But the Catholic Church in Northern Italy was nothing less than heroic and the story of the 17-year-old Pino Lella highlights this heroism.

Pino was sent from Milan to the Swiss Alps by his parents to be safe from the allied bombing of his city and was enlisted by a Catholic priest to guide Jews over the mountains into Switzerland. An expert climber and skier, Pino quickly became adept at avoiding Nazi patrols and leading groups of Jews to safety through steep mountain passes, including surviving an avalanche. This mountain phase of the book would be a thrilling story on its own, but it is just the beginning.



When Pino turned 18, he became eligible to be drafted by the Nazis and most Italian boys were immediately sent to the Russian front where survival rates were very low. His father convinced him to join the German army that kept him in Italy but made him scorned by the Italian populace. By fate, he becomes the driver for the second highest ranking German general in Italy and becomes a spy for the Italian resistance. This part of the story is equally harrowing and when the Germans are eventually defeated, Pino's position is precarious. Few Italians knew that he was working as a spy and collaborators were despised and often killed.

The author stumbled onto Pino's story in 2004 during a visit to Montana and was amazed that the story had not been publicized after the war. But he discovered that the teenager at the heart of the story was then living back in Italy after a life as an international jetsetter. After the war, he emigrated to the United States and met Gary Cooper and Ernest Hemingway, but had never shared his story. The author constructs the book from the 60-year-old recollections of Pino, extensive research of Allied and Holocaust records, and visits to the locations in the story. Because the Nazis engaged in the comprehensive destruction of records in Northern Italy, there was a dearth of



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German war records. But the author fills in the personal interactions based on the best evidence he found. This is particularly true of a love story between Pino and his soulmate, Anna, that is interwoven throughout all the adventure. (So, it is not just a war story!)

The Book Club members unanimously loved the wartime adventure story and especially the first-hand account from Pino Lella. Much like our reaction to *America's First Daughter* last month, we had a good discussion about how the author combined history and fiction to tell a compelling story. Some members enjoyed the wide variety of characters but recognized that they were described through the biased perceptions of Pino himself. At least one member was concerned that this heroic teenager was really a classic machismo Italian male as his later jetsetter lifestyle seemed to indicate. This generated an interesting discussion about military war heroes. Often those who emerge as admired leaders in war are often less admirable during peacetime.

The Book Club scored the book as 7.98 on a 10-point scale. Bob Nilsson graded the book as 7.95 and quickly pointed out that, being so close to the average, he had his finger on the pulse of the Book Club. The Club was dubious about his claim, but agreed that there is nothing average about Bob!

CERT NEWS—Emergency Preparedness

Centreville was recently on high alert for a possible tornado. Were you prepared? If you are under a tornado warning, find a safe room to shelter in place right away. Go to a basement if you have one. If you are willing to share it in an emergency, let your neighbors know.



- If one of your neighbors has a basement, agree ahead of time if you can share it in an emergency.
- If your home has no basement, then get to a small interior room on the lowest level.
- Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls.

Experts say everyone should have a *go-bag* in case they have to shelter in place or leave home in a hurry. The classic *grab-and-go bag* should have essential items for up to three days in case you have to evacuate or shelter in place. Go to www.Ready.gov for information on planning for emergencies and what to include in your *grab-and-go bag*.

For a short-term shelter in place event, such as a tornado, you might consider preparing a *mini go-bag* for your designated safe room. This could include a battery or hand crank radio, battery backup cell phone charger, LED lantern or flashlight, bottled water, non-perishable snacks, medications, blanket(s), and anything else you might need.

In order to have as much warning as possible in an emergency, don't forget to sign up for Queen Anne's County alerts on the web. Go to $\underline{www.qac.org}$ and under the $How\ Do\ I...$ tab at the top of the page, click on $Sign\ Up$ for Emergency Notifications.



We are very pleased to share with you a lovely addition to our Night of Lights and Soup Supper. To start our evening off, Cathy Toney and Nancy Cook will be enriching our evening by providing a musical interlude of flute and piano duo.

Cathy Toney and her husband, Byron, moved to Symphony Village in May 2018. Prior to moving here, she taught music at the Naval Academy Primary School for 30 years, director of music in two Anne Arundel County Catholic Churches for 40 years, directed the Queen Anne's Chorale Youth Chorus for five years, sang with the New Renaissance Voices for 25 years, and played flute in the Annapolis Symphony for two years. Cathy and Nancy's friendship dates back 40 years when they met through choral music with the Annapolis Guild of Organists.

Nancy Cook has been a resident of Queen Anne's County for 60 years. During this time she has been actively involved in music as a teacher in Anne Arundel and Queen Anne's County for 32 years, served as mentor to teachers in the county school system, Music Minister in Kent Island Methodist and Centreville United Methodist Churches for 20 years, and has been instrumental in preserving the history and heritage of Kent Island and Stevensville.

BEAUJOLAIS NOUVEAU

Every year, on the **third Thursday of November**, the region of Beaujolais (just below Burgundy and above Rhone) comes alive with its Nouveau wine, as they race toward Paris. In the past, the old houses would race to Paris to see who gets there first with the year's vintage. All of the cafés would be filled with revelers trying the wines to determine, *who made the best Nouveau*, and what the vintage of Burgundy would be like—Good? Bad? Headed for Greatness?

The wine is made from the Gamay grape and, unlike other red wines, it is only fermented for a few weeks, making this a very young wine ready to drink; but don't lay it down. This wine is meant to be consumed by New Year's Day. The French have very strict laws surrounding its wine and the production of wine. The Gamay grapes must be hand-picked, and fermented as a whole-cluster press (carbonic maceration) with the clusters being placed in a large vat, allowing the weight of the grapes to crush themselves. This produces a fresh and fruity wine without the strong tannins from the grape skins. It is easy to drink and young.

"Le Beaujolais nouveau est arrivé!" is the traditional expression used on this celebratory day, but in 2005 it was changed to *It's Beaujolais Nouveau Time*! It is the wine of Thanksgiving in that its fruity character and low tannins make it perfect for the Thanksgiving menu. Georges Dubouef, along with other producers, create a special label, posters, and even neckties each year to show off the artwork.

This fun wine makes for a great party, with a little pâté, a wheel of brie, crusty French Bread, and a full glass of Nouveau. Bon Appetite!

STORYTIME ON WHEELS LOOKING FOR VOLUNTEERS -

Storytime on Wheels is a program run by the Queen Anne's County Library. I have been a volunteer with the program for seven years. The library is currently recruiting additional volunteers.

Due to the distance and the logistics of traveling with many young children, most home day-care providers cannot bring their charges to the library for traditional storytime. *Storytime on Wheels* was developed to bring storytime to children in licensed day care homes in QAC.

Trained volunteers make monthly visits to a site to share books, poems, finger plays, and other reading readiness activities with the children. The goal of *Storytime on Wheels* is to help day care providers assist busy parents develop the love of books and reading to young children.

The library has 37 kits that consist of up to 24 books and many hands-on activities to choose from. Each kit has a theme such as Bears, Weather, Zoo, Farms, and Insects—a wide variety of subjects. I choose which books and which activities I'll take and present during my visit to a day care home each month. I spend 30-35 minutes presenting what I've brought. The children I interact with every month really look forward to my visit and to what I bring to read and to do. Each child gets a Storytime Times activities sheet to take home with them for their parents (with additional ideas for books and activities) and a "take-home" to remind them of the theme of the particular kit.


