#### Symphony Village Board Action Items—September 25

**Unanimous Electronic Vote Ratified at the September 25 Meeting:**

Change to Board Meeting Date: A unanimous email vote was taken to change the SV Board meeting date from Friday, September 18, to Friday, September 25, at 6 p.m. due to the Jewish holiday

and approved unanimously.

### **Regular Board Motions**:

• **2021 Draft Budget:** A motion was unanimously approved to send the draft 2021 budget, as recommended by the Budget & Finance Committee, to homeowners for their review and comment.

- Snow Removal Contract: A motion was unanimously carried to approve the snow removal contract for 2021 with Chester River Landscaping with pricing proposed on a unit cost basis for labor, equipment, and materials as in previous years.
- Pool Maintenance Contract: A motion was unanimously carried, based upon the recommendation of the Operations Committee, to approve the 2021 contract with Anchor Aquatics at a cost of \$23,370.

Interim Rules & Regulation Update: A motion to accept the revised Interim Rules & Regulations was approved unanimously. Per the revisions—residents will be responsible for cleaning/sanitizing furniture and equipment before and after use on weekends and holidays using only the wipes provided (other household cleaners or sanitizers should not be used without consulting with management). Any furniture or equipment used should remain marked with a pink ribbon until staff returns.

- Common Area Aeration and Overseeding: Unanimously approved a motion, based upon the recommendation of the Landscape & Irrigation Committee, for \$4,147 to be used for common area aeration and overseeing by Level Green with work to be done before October 15.
- Tree Pruning: Unanimously approved a motion, based upon the recommendation of the Landscape & Irrigation Committee, to begin a routine tree pruning program beginning this winter by pruning 60 trees in

Priority 1, 2, and 3 of the proposed program at a cost of \$5,500 with work to be done by Bartlett Tree Experts.

- Parking Lot Asphalt: Following a request from the Operations Committee, the Board unanimously approved a motion to request a proposal from McCrone Engineering to evaluate the current condition of the two Clubhouse parking lots at a price not to exceed \$6,000. This assessment should include taking core samples to document the thickness of the gravel and asphalt layers. It should also provide for parking lot openings (test pits) to investigate obvious utility settling. All openings will be returned to useful condition. The final report will include all findings and appropriate repair/replace recommendations.
- Clubhouse Drainage: Unanimously approved a motion, based upon the recommendation of the Operations Committee, to approve drainage work in locations 2, 3, and 4 as presented in Level Green's proposal at a cost of \$3,908 so that the Clubhouse shrubbery refurbishment project can proceed.
- **CFG Bank CD:** Unanimously approved a motion, based upon the recommendation of the Budget & Finance Committee, to roll over the \$200,000 CFG Bank CD (current rate 0.08%) or purchase a \$200,000 3-year CD from United Texas Bank (current rate 1.05%), whichever rate is the highest on 10/23/2020 when the CD matures.

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### Symphony Village Board of Director's Electronic Vote, October 9

#### **Bill Wells Bugs!**

The Landscape and Irrigation Committee thought this month's article should be informative and fun. So, we decided to highlight some of the beautiful and beneficial insects that have been identified throughout Symphony Village this past summer. Since they will not harm your gardens, they may even make you smile!

### The Monarch (Danaus plexippus)

This brightly colored caterpillar is found on milkweed. That's all they eat. They will not harm the plants in your gardens. They aren't too hard to spot, with their bright stripes of black,




white, and yellow. At both ends of their body (thorax and abdomen) are pairs of black tentacles. The milkweed that monarchs feed on is protected by having poisonous sap, which in turn makes the monarch caterpillar poisonous to any potential predators. Pretty good defense! But don't be alarmed, they don't

sting and although they are very delicate you can handle them, just be careful. As you can



see they are brightly colored and turn into one of the most beautiful and popular of all butterflies—the Monarch Butterfly.



The Eastern Hercules Beetle (Dynastes tityus)



This bug is one of the largest bugs in the United States. It easily reaches 2" to 4 ½" long and is heavy. The one pictured is male. Its horns are used in battles between rival males competing for a mate. The female looks just like him, but without the horns. Their mating may take up to fifty minutes.

Although it looks menacing, it's not. It's slow and cumbersome and is usually only seen at night. It lives in and near decaying tree roots and trunks where it aids in the decomposition of fallen trees, although this one decided to visit our pool patio. Maybe all the beautiful women drew him there?

### The Black and Yellow Garden Spider (Argiope aurantia)

This spider has been spotted in a few gardens this year. She is considered one of the largest spiders in Maryland, growing up to two inches long. She is three to five times the size of the males. The stabilimentum, or that zig zag web in the center of her web is distinct to this spider. It actually reinforces her web so when larger insects are caught, she doesn't have to constantly rebuild her web. When it's time to mate, the smaller male will build his web right inside hers. Not too close though! Then, at that special moment, he gently plucks her web strands to get her attention. These spiders catch many larger insects that typically harm our gardens, so please don't hurt it. It's a gardener's friend!



### The Velvet Ant or Fire Ant (Dasymutilla occidentalis)



Velvet ants look like large hairy ants, but they are actually wasps. Also known as a cow killer they differ from ants in having only a slight constriction between the thorax and abdomen, and they have straight antennae rather than elbowed. It's native to the eastern United States, but not commonly seen. The females are smaller than the males and lack wings. Velvet ants are not aggressive and will try to escape when encountered. The females will emit a squeaking sound when they are in danger and will give a powerful sting. Only the females have stingers. So, if you see a male gathering nectar from a flower, he is harmless. When

mating time comes, the larger males will size up the females and take his choice. So intimate that it cannot be described here! But, once the female regains her composure, she searches for a place to deposit her egg. She looks for mature larvae of other solitary ground dwelling insects such as cicadas, wasps, bees, and ants. She will forcibly enter these ground nests to place her egg beside its larval victim. When the egg hatches, the young consume their nearby hosts and emerge as new velvet ants. So, if you are lucky enough to see this mesmerizing bright red streak of a velvet ant, keep your distance! However, have no fear, for this cow killer comes in peace.



### Eastern Cicada Killer Wasp (Sphecius speciosus)



The eastern cicada killer wasp is an enormous wasp that is often mistaken for the Giant Asian hornet or murder hornet. But, the adult eastern cicada-killer wasps are ½" -1 ¾" long, smaller than the 2' long murder hornet. The one pictured is 1 ¾" long. In addition, the eastern cicada killer's stripes are bright yellow and its murder hornet's stripes are orange, and its head is a distinct orange. This fearsome looking wasp is actually quite harmless. They are found east of the Rocky Mountains. These wasps are extremely nonaggressive and can actually be handled if you are gentle.

Following a rather bland mating ritual, the females begin searching for a suitable place to dig their burrows. Their favorite sites are embankments and under sidewalks. The female digs the 10-inch-deep burrows with an open area in the back large enough for individual cicadas. The female then hunts for cicadas in trees and then visually captures them in midair. She will lay one egg in a cell with one, two, or three cicadas, then seals the chamber. The young feed on the cicadas and then spin a cocoon where they remain until the following summer when they emerge. The males will defend their territories, usually containing one or more nests of females, by flying into other insects, but they go around people. The males do not have stingers which accounts for this unusual way they defend their nests. These beneficial insects will really be needed next summer when the 17-year cicadas emerge and inundate our community. So, if you are lucky enough to see them, don't harm them. They are our friends!

Please remember, when using insecticides use the ones made especially for the specific insect you're dealing with. Products like Sevin kill every insect regardless of whether it is beneficial or beautiful. The 17-year cicadas (locust) will be here this spring! Called Brood X, they are coming! Please protect those cicada killers and velvet ants, we're going to need them!

### **OPERATIONS COMMITTEE**

The Operations Committee is responsible for aiding the HOA Board of Directors and the General Manager regarding management and operation of community common property. We share this responsibility with the Landscape & Irrigation Committee and focus on such things as the Clubhouse, swimming pools, and sidewalks. We meet on the third Thursday of each month at 9:30 a.m. Since the Covid-19 crisis, we have started to meet virtually using ZOOM technology.





### **OPERATIONS COMMITTEE**

Operations held a virtual committee meeting on September 17. Our next meeting will be on **Thursday**, **October 15**. SV management will send out an invitation for residents wishing to attend.

At our last meeting, the Committee accepted a proposal from Level Green to fix three drainage spouts on the expansion side of the Clubhouse. The Board of Directors subsequently approved this action which will allow commencement of plantings arranged by the Landscape & Irrigation Committee. Proposals to fix drainage issues around the rest of the Clubhouse are being reviewed for possible action in early 2021. Replacement of damaged sidewalk on Harmony Way and Encore Court will be done by Mid Shore Masonry and Construction. Their proposal was accepted by the committee and approved by the Board.

The Committee discussed planning for replacement/repair of the Clubhouse parking lots and requested permission to seek input from concrete companies. The Board of Directors subsequently decided to fund an engineering firm to assess the condition of our parking lots. This expert input will guide our planning.

A list of contractors for replacement of the borders on the Bocce courts, previously approved by the Board of Directors, was provided to management following our meeting. Proposals will be sought to accomplish the work. Lastly, the committee will be walking the community to update our sidewalk survey. This will provide a template for improvements in 2021.

We have an awesome community, and we are committed to keeping it that way.





### Reading for Fun - SEPTEMBER 2020 REVIEW

The SV Book Club met on September 15 to discuss *The Deep South* by Paul Theroux. Images of these readers danced on my computer screen: Bob Nilsson, Jim & Kathryn Buckheit, Sue Goldberg, JoAnn Walker, Pat McManus, Peggy Decker, Diane Briggs, and Mary Jo Volpicelli. The images of Jan Withers and Joe Sikes danced nowhere since our camera refused to cooperate. The lack of Jan's image was much bemoaned. Mine, not so much. We had a great discussion anyway.

*The Deep South* held special interest for me since I was born in Augusta, Georgia, and the book commences about 30 minutes from where I lived in South Carolina. The author is a well-known travel writer who has catalogued travels all over the world. He lives in New England and realized he had never traveled in the rural South. With the excellent highway systems in America, he relished the idea of exploring this unfamiliar part of the

country, free of schedules and time constraints. His method of observation has always been to strike up random conversations during his travels.

A fan of William Faulkner, the author alludes to Faulkner's writings when describing many of the situations he encounters. He even visited the home in Oxford, Mississippi, where Faulkner wrote most of his novels. The author focused his travels on the rural (or old) South that is depicted in Faulkner's stories. The cities of the new South, which have blossomed in the last half century, were avoided in hopes of comparing how attitudes had changed since the civil rights era.

My wife, Jan, lived in Mississippi in the 1970s, and we were both somewhat depressed by the book. The conversations in the book highlight how little attitudes in the rural South have changed despite the many changes made to our laws during the civil rights movement. This is not a huge surprise, however, given the current social unrest in the country.

When the book is not waxing on the writings of Faulkner, and many other famous authors going back to Plato, there are many interesting encounters along the way. For example, the author visits Money, Mississippi, the site of the Bryant Grocery Store where Emmett Till was accused of whistling at a white woman and subsequently abducted and killed in 1955. The Bryant store still stands, abandoned and overgrown with weeds, and the town has a small museum dedicated to Till. The author also meets Sue Evans, a white bank officer in

Greenville, Mississippi, to discuss lack of federal support for affordable housing. A common theme in the book is the large discrepancy in funding that the U.S. Government and charities send to poor foreign countries where the author has traveled, in comparison to what is provided in the Deep South. But the discussion with Sue Evans takes an unexpected turn when the subject of music in the Mississippi Delta comes up as a hotbed of the blues. It turns out this sixty-year-old white bank officer was married to B.B. King for ten years.

The author's method of travel writing turns up many interesting anecdotes ranging from the many motels run by Indians (and specifically Patels), the culture of gun shows, and a deep dive into the supporters of Alabama football (Roll Tide!).

This style keeps the pages turning, but the underlying lack of progress in race relations in the Deep South, as the book repeatedly details, ultimately left many of the club members dispirited. We gave the book an overall score was 5.85 out of 10, which is below the club average. I think the club was in the mood for a much more upbeat book.

### BOMBAY HOOK NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge is located on the Delaware Bay in Smyrna, Delaware. It's a pleasant country drive from Centreville. Plug this address into your GPS, and you'll arrive at the entrance to the refuge: 2591 Whitehall Neck Road, Smyrna, Delaware. Bombay Hook is one of our favorite spots for viewing a wide variety of waterfowl, raptors, and songbirds. Every season offers opportunities to see different species, as Bombay Hook welcomes spring and fall migratory waterfowl and songbird visitors, as well as overwintering waterfowl. The wildlife diversity is amazing because of its landscape, fresh water, salt marsh mud flats, swamps, forest, and grassy and brushy areas! We saw herons, egrets,

avocets, terns, grebes, shovelers, swans, Canada geese, eagles, and hawks on a recent visit this fall.

Bombay Hook stretches eight miles long and covers over 16,000 acres. There's a beautiful 12-mile wildlife drive. Be sure to bring your binoculars and cameras. No one is in a rush, so feel free to stop and take in the sights. There are five walking trails and three observation towers (two are handicapped accessible). It's flat, just like home, and the trails aren't long or arduous. Be prepared for pesky bugs in late spring, summer, and early fall, especially if it's humid and/or the air is still.

There is a lovely visitor's center, which is unfortunately closed due to Covid-19.

Don't worry, there are outdoor toilets at several locations, should the need arise...and they are well-tended.

So grab a friend, pack a picnic, binoculars, and camera and take a walk on the wild side!






