The plant is nearing its treatment capacity and needs to be modernize—hence part of the reason for our increased water and sewer fees.

Several members of the Board and the Operations Committee recently toured the facility and were advised of this status by the Town's Director of Public Works. He also strongly suggested that residents do not use any toilet wipes—even when they are advertised as flushable—since with the age and condition of the plant the operation gets severely clogged grinding up these items.

PERSONAL BACKGROUND

Born and raised in the suburbs of Albany, New York, I married Wayne Emerick in 1978 and raised three

My dream was to couple my love of travel with my newly found love of photography when I retired. Since retiring, I have traveled to many wonderful locations. around the world and have been able to capture them with my camera. My favorite subjects are landscapes but, over the past five years, I have branched out into other genres such as wildlife, architecture, and cityscapes.



LANDSCAPE AND IRRIGATION

<u>'Forest Pansy' – A Colorful Redbud Street Tree in Symphony Village</u>

Shorter sunny days and cool brisk nights are Nature's signals to animals and plants to prepare for a more "relaxed" part of their life cycles. Animals get ready for hibernation, and trees and woody shrubs begin losing the green chlorophyll pigment used for photosynthesis, followed by defoliation.



Dormancy in plants is when metabolic activities slow down and is the safest time for any "stressful intervention" like heavy pruning and transplanting. This fall several new street trees will be transplanted from their comfortable nursery homes to new locations on Symphony Village streets.

The native tree Eastern Redbud (*Cercis canadensis*) is one example. This is an ideal street tree. It grows 20–30 feet to mature height. Its roots are noninvasive, which can easily accommodate the limited planting spaces. It is soil pH adaptable,

tolerates full sun, and can handle sandy or fertile clay-type soil.



In spring, the redbud tree produces tiny clusters of pink blossoms along its stems and branches. It has high wildlife value as it attracts butterflies, bees, and birds. A

cultivar/variety of Eastern Redbud on the planting list is 'Forest Pansy' that produces a stunning array of maroon/burgundy heart-shaped leaves in early summer following the pink blossom display. Eventually the maroon leaves turn a medium green before finally turning yellow in the fall.

Be sure to look for this impressive three-season colorful street tree enhancing the landscape in Symphony Village.

OPERATIONS COMMITTEE

The Operations Committee is responsible for aiding the HOA Board of Directors and the General Manager regarding management and operation of community common property. We share this responsibility with the Landscape and Irrigation Committee and focus on such things as the Clubhouse, swimming pools, and sidewalks.

The Operations Committee has received three additional site visits from sidewalk contractors and is awaiting their proposals. Along with two earlier proposals, we should have five proposals to choose from exceeding our competitive goal. The General Manager, accompanied by Operations and Landscape representatives, met with Bartlett Tree Services to discuss ways to minimize impact on our trees where tree roots are a sidewalk problem.

Committee sign-up sheets are now available in the Clubhouse for those who would like to join us in 2023. Our next meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the Clubhouse on Thursday, September 15. It will be a hybrid meeting so residents can also attend virtually.

Feel free to attend to see if you might like to join us next year. We strive to ensure our community remains one of the most attractive neighborhoods on the Eastern Shore.



READING FOR FUN – NOVEMBER 2021 REVIEW

The SV Book Club held a hybrid meeting on Tuesday, September 20, to discuss *Nine Lives* by Peter Swanson. Attendees included: Joe Sikes, Kathryn & Jim Buckheit, Mary Jo Volpicelli, Sue Goldberg, Len & Carol Saltiel, Cathy Olson, Joanne Walker, and Bob Nilsson.

The book was an enjoyable mystery in which nine apparently unconnected people receive an unmarked list of nine names. As persons on the list begin to be murdered, the plot thickens. You will have to wait until the end of this report before I let you know if any book club members were on the list. (Hint: Check the list of attendees. Don't see my wife, do you?)

A similar mystery story by Agatha Christie is referenced on the book cover as well as by the characters in the story itself. Both stories revolve around a list of unconnected people

who begin to be murdered, although the circumstances of the two stories differ. The author was obviously influenced by the great Ms. Christie and may have intended his novel as a homage.

Trying to piece together connections between those on the list was a challenge to investigators including an FBI agent who is on the list herself. This character provides us some law enforcement information and postulates that the connection may be between parents of listees rather than the listees themselves. (Hint #2: None of the Book Club members are FBI agents.)

Most of the people on the list are young, but two are actually old enough to qualify for Symphony Village. But, of course, the others could be younger spouses, which may or may not be relevant. For that matter, author Swanson has probably never visited our community. But I digress.

Promisingly, I found that the further I read the book, the closer I narrowed in on the killer. My premise was that, if they were dead, they probably weren't the killer. Some Book Club members, especially the avid mystery readers, were not particularly overwhelmed by my logical breakthrough.

Bob Nilsson also enjoyed the mystery, but his deductive powers failed to identify the killer. In fact most of us were equally befuddled. But the book, in addition to identifying the mystery killer, provides a surprise ending to the story just as you think you are finished. Bob thought he was finished sooner than the rest of us and was surprised to find out there was a second surprise ending. That made him the winner of a surprise trifecta: a surprise killer; a surprise twist; and a surprise discovery of the second surprise. For Bob, it was the book that just kept giving!

The Book Club found the book to be a page turner and enjoyed it very much. And, luckily, my wife was not on the list. I found her safe and sound when I got home from Book Club. Len Saltiel spent much of September amongst wild animals in Africa, but he returned safely with many great animal pictures but none of the murderer. Nor was there any photographic evidence of the SV time capsule on that continent.

Once the murderer was identified, the Book Club breathed a sigh of relief and voted the book an excellent score of 7.82. We characterized our experience in reading *Nine Lives* as: Surprise, Surprise, Surprise!

Clubhouse Safety Equipment

In a crisis do you know where the emergency equipment is in the Clubhouse? Back in January 2019, I published a list of emergency equipment located in the Clubhouse, but several items have been added since then. The next time you are in the Clubhouse, familiarize yourself with what is available and where it is. Here is a list for your reference:



 AEDs (2) An AED, or automated external defibrillator, is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. 

RECIPES EVERYONE WANTS

TEXAS SHEET CAKE

Set Oven 375°

Bring to boil: 2 sticks oleo or butter, 1 cup water, 4 tbsp. cocoa,

Pour into bowl and add: 2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 tsp. baking soda, 2 eggs, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream or plain yogurt, mix.

Pour into Pan Bake 30–40 min., 15 ½ x 10 ½ pan.

Frosting: bring to boil, ½ stick oleo, 3 tbsp. milk, 2 tbsp. cocoa; add: ½ lb. confectioners' sugar, ½ tsp. vanilla, spread on warm cake.

Nuts optional, cake freezes well.
