SV HOA BOARD OF DIRECTORS UPDATE - APRIL 2023

BILL RIDGWAY, PRESIDENT

At the April 7 meeting, the Board discussed whether in-person or hybrid meetings are to be the norm for Board Meetings going forward. This meeting also tested a new sound mixer, but unfortunately the audio experiment was mostly a bust. We have not solved the primary challenge, which is to get reliable sound quality to those in the meeting room. The use of hand-held microphones also proved to be a step backward for Zoom users, so we will return to the drawing board to build a better plan. We'll do more testing before putting everyone through a repeat of this experience. Randy, I feel your pain!

Board Meeting Venue: Despite being cumbersome, the Board voted 3–2 NOT to abandon hybrid Board Meetings. No guidance was given to Committees on their meeting venue format. The Board's split vote was a recognition that Zoom meetings can be both a blessing and a curse. We value access for those traveling or who have medical/physical limitations. Remote access is something that people have come to expect post-Covid. However, the price we pay for large-room hybrid meetings is awkward hand-offs from speaker to speaker, missed communications, and disruptions that can make meetings longer and sometimes tedious. Hybrid meetings are also demanding of staff time. We all hope they can be made to work much better.

Hearing Assistance Device: The Board approved an Operations recommendation to purchase AudioFetch Express at a cost under \$1,000. The technology will use Clubhouse Wi-Fi with a phone app to deliver audio to Bluetooth-capable hearing aids. Look for details to be announced when operational.

Parking Lot Repaving: The Board voted to release a Request for Proposals developed by Operations. We are soliciting bids to mill and pave parking lots, replace curbing, and repair the north-corner stormwater drain. We are aiming for a possible contract approval in August with work to be done in the fall.

Association Legal Counsel: The Board unanimously approved two motions regarding our Legal Counsel. The first motion was an agreement to retain one of two firms recently interviewed, thereby terminating the current agreement with Whiteford, Taylor & Preston. A second motion was approved to retain the Law Offices of Gregory Alexandrides in Annapolis.

Audit & Tax Preparation: The Board approved a proposal from Goldklang Group CPAs for 2023 and 2024 Financial Audits and Tax Preparation.

Clubhouse Recycling: Following a recommendation by Operations, the Board voted to pursue a contract with Chesapeake Waste to pick up Clubhouse recycling weekly (at a cost of \$42/quarter). We also approved purchase of Clubhouse and event recycling containers at a cost not to exceed \$1,000. There will be future communications to clarify recycling practices and encourage residents to recycle responsibly, both at the Clubhouse and at home.

Instructor Insurance Requirements: The Board was asked to clarify insurance requirements for instructor-led activities. After much discussion and feedback from residents, the Board agreed to guidance that Item #20 in the SV Rules and Regulations should only apply to sponsored instructor-led activities involving physical activity (as the preamble suggests). Fees and Proof of Insurance will NOT be required of other sponsored instructor-led activities (whether or not a fee is charged to participants).

Clubhouse HVAC Repairs: The Board approved replacement of faulty HVAC control valves and actuators (bar area and craft room) for \$2,756. Additionally, to address a leaky/failing indoor pool HVAC evaporation coil, the Board approved replacement of this system component for \$17,218.

Finally, we want to thank Dave Peterson and Pat Fox for conducting a review session on April 5 covering our Terms of Reference document that spells out Committee roles and how Committees are expected to engage with Management and the Board. The document also covers the Budget process, Replacement Reserves policy, and recommendations regarding Contracts and Contractors. The primary purpose of the review was to highlight established policies. A second purpose was to invite committees and others to identify shortcomings in the present document and recommend updates. The Board expects to publish any proposed changes for comment by residents in the coming months.

CERT Sponsored Presentations for 2023

Symphony Village CERT members strive to be proactive and know what to do during an emergency, and we also focus on prevention. Throughout the year, we plan several activities to increase awareness and help avoid potential emergencies.



PRESENTATIONS FOR SV RESIDENTS

The following presentations will be open to all SV residents.

NUTRITION – APRIL 17 – 1 TO 3 P.M. IN THE CONCERT HALL

Registered Dietician Nutritionist from Anne Arundel Medical Center, Ann Caldwell, will speak. All residents are invited. Sign up in the Wall Street Room!

MEDEVAC TOUR - MAY 11 - 3 P.M. AT EASTON AIRPORT

Maryland State Police helicopter sections transport many sick and injured patients to the hospital, search for missing persons, and assist state and local law enforcement agencies with a variety of missions. Based at Easton Airport in Talbot County, Maryland's Eastern Shore is the home of Trooper 6. It primarily serves Queen Anne's, Caroline, Talbot, and Dorchester Counties, but also serves those in Anne Arundel County as well. It's just a quick flight across the Bay! Space available for the Medevac tour will be limited so keep an eye out for an eBlast announcement and sign up.

SHERIFF'S PRESENTATION – MAY 15 – 6 P.M. IN THE CONCERT HALL

Sheriff Gary Hofmann will present a briefing on cyber security, scams, and criminal activity in Queen Anne's County. There will be a question-and-answer period. All residents are invited. Sign up in the Wall Street Room.

WATER SAFETY DEMONSTRATION – JUNE

This will be early in June by the outdoor pool. Queen Anne's County Department of Emergency Services (QAC/DES) will provide an instructor to conduct the training. All residents are invited. Sign up in the Wall Street Room.

CERT SOCIAL HOUR – AUGUST 19

A brief demonstration of using the LifeVac choking rescue device will be provided. We will also have Emergency Information Forms on hand to distribute.

SV SAFETY DAY - SEPTEMBER 20

For the second year, the Symphony Village CERT, in coordination with the QAC/DES, will host a Symphony Village Safety Day on **September 20 from 3 to 6 p.m.** This will be an open house event with drop-in and learn sessions.

There will be a series of demonstrations, activities, and exhibits including CPR/AED training, home safety, Meet the First Responders, etc.

ACTIVE SHOOTER/TERRORISM PRESENTATION

The objective of the presentation is to identify actions to take when confronted with an active shooter and to describe actions to take to prevent and prepare for potential active shooter incidents. All residents are invited. We are still working out details for the event.

BAD WEATHER PREPAREDNESS

Given that SV experiences high winds, we are exploring a possible presentation on what SV residents should do in the case of tornados and hurricanes.

PRESENTATIONS FOR CERT MEMBERS

CERT members are also eligible for numerous other educational opportunities including the following:

CPR/AED/LIFEVAC TRAINING

QAC/DES provides training to CERT members on CPR, AED, and LifeVac. The training takes about an hour. We are also exploring the possibility of offering this training to SV residents.

SYMPHONY VILLAGE DISASTER "GAME"

The full CERT team will participate in a Symphony Village Disaster Game. This allows members to practice procedures to be used in an actual emergency.

COVENANTS COMMITTEE

Spring has sprung and your external home projects are starting to roll in. In my three earlier articles thus far in 2023, I have emphasized helpful hints about our Exterior Modification Form (EMF) process. However, I thought I would take this opportunity to commend our residents for their excellent effort in following the Symphony Village Architectural guidelines!

The aforementioned areas include but are not limited to:

- Checking the SV approved and/or disapproved plant, tree, and shrub list before making your landscaping selections.
- Being proactive in ensuring that all rear patios and extended landscaping are well within your property lines and not infringing into SV common ground.
- BEING ON TIME WITH YOUR EMF! Thank you. Thank you!
- Thus far in 2023, all EMFs have been submitted well before the seven days prior to the next CC meeting.

• Utilizing the Ground Installation Form that involves the engagement of Miss Utility or the necessity to move irrigation lines prior to project beginning. Irrigation line issues are sometimes overlooked by a resident and can cause unnecessary project delays. This form is referenced on page 2 of the EMF that is copied below.

FOLIAR (RELATING TO LEAVES) DISEASES OF ORNAMENTALS

The majority of plant diseases are caused by fungi. Moist, cool weather increases the likelihood of infection and lengthens the time pathogens are active. Some common foliar diseases in our area are dogwood anthracnose, cherry brown rot, and apple scab.

Accurate identification of the pathogen is an important step in diagnosis and treatment. For example, dogwood anthracnose (*Discula destructiva*) can result in death of the dogwood host, whereas dogwood spot anthracnose (*Elsinoë corni*) causes leaf spots or death of entire leaves but does not kill the host. Many diseases share similar symptoms that may lead to very different outcomes, depending on the pathogen. One of the best ways to prevent disease in plants is to remove all diseased tissue to eliminate the source of fungal spores that initiate infection. However, with cherry brown rot (caused by *Monilinia fructicola* and *Monilinia laxa*), this is nearly impossible: because of the number of ornamental cherry trees in landscapes and the ability of spores to spread with wind and rain, removal of infected tissue from a site will not eliminate the re-introduction of spores from another area the following season. In these cases, the only disease management measures are to treat preventively or to plant cherry varieties with proven resistance.

Treatment timing and understanding disease management are also important. A good example is the treatment of apple scab (caused by *Venturia inaequalis*). Apple scab should be managed preventively during the spring because it causes premature leaf loss that reduces the aesthetic value of ornamental apples or crabapples.

Infection later in the season will not dramatically affect appearance. However, for fruit production, infection later in the season must also be managed because the scab fungus reduces fruit quality and appearance, even when it is past the point of damaging foliage.

Proper identification of pathogens, preventive management, and proper timing of treatment applications reduce the amount of material needed to treat disease and allow the use of ecologically friendly materials. Ask your Bartlett Arborist Representative to inspect your trees.

TREES AND SOIL FUNGI

When caring for trees, it's easy to see fungi as the enemy, given that, as the article above discusses, most tree diseases and decay organisms are caused by fungi. However, many fungi are important contributors to tree health. Symbiotic associations with mycorrhizal fungi are absolutely critical for optimum tree health and growth.

There is no question scientifically that mycorrhizal fungi benefit trees, but some debate exists about how to best encourage these associations. Most research shows that plants perform better with mycorrhizas; however, only a few experiments show any benefit to trees when mycorrhizal fungi are added to soil. Many times this is because spores in store-bought mycorrhiza packs are dead on arrival.

Product selection is also important because trees have very specific fungal associates, which vary depending on species, environmental conditions, soil type, and more.

Perhaps the most important reason several studies show little benefit from adding mychorrhizal fungi to trees is that no attention was paid to improving the poor soil conditions in these studies. Soils that lack mycorrhizas are too hot, too dry, too wet, lack organic matter, lack oxygen, etc., and without addressing the soil environment, any added fungi will soon perish. A better option is to create a soil environment in which natural and applied mycorrhizas can flourish.

Mulching trees, de-compacting soils, managing moisture, and adding organic matter are all methods for improving soil biology. By creating a soil environment as similar as possible to the forest floor, trees and their beneficial microbes will thrive.

Bartlett's Root InvigorationTM is a process that uses an air spade to clear away debris from roots without damaging them. It allows air and water uptake to improve, helping soil conditions to be more beneficial.

OPERATIONS

JOE SIKES, CHAIR / FRED KURST, VICE CHAIR

The Operations Committee is responsible for aiding the HOA Board of Directors (BOD) and the General Manager (GM) regarding management and operation of community common property. We share this responsibility with the Landscape and Irrigation Committee and focus on such things as the Clubhouse, swimming pools, and sidewalks.

The Operations Committee met on March 23 and provided three recommendations subsequently approved by the BOD at its April 7 meeting. The BOD approved release of a Request for Proposals to replace asphalt on the Clubhouse parking lots. The GM will arrange a pre-bid meeting with interested contractors. Proposals will be required in time to allow review and recommendations presented to the August BOD meeting.

Secondly, the BOD approved purchase of the AudioFetch Express system. This system will attach to the Clubhouse Wi-Fi and allow residents to amplify audio to their hearing aids using their smartphones. Residents simply download a free app and can individually adjust sound for events such as Movie Night.

Lastly, the BOD approved contracting Chesapeake Waste to provide three recycling containers and weekly pickup of recycling waste from the Clubhouse, consistent with pickup in the community. While Clubhouse recycling brings us in line with the rest of the community, we will need to pay attention to proper recycling procedures. Expect further information and emphasis on recycling guidelines to ensure we maximize our efforts.

The next Operations meeting will be held on April 20, 2023, at 10 a.m. in the Clubhouse. The meeting will be hybrid and residents are welcome to attend either in person or virtually.

Parks and Recreation management has approved free use of any of the county's eight ballfields during the day (they charge for field use for leagues in the evening).





READING FOR FUN - MARCH 2023 REVIEW

The SV Book Club met on March 21 to discuss *The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane* by Lisa See. Attendees included: Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Sue Goldberg, Len & Carol Saltiel, Judy Sutter, Peggy Decker, Kitty Wilson, Jim & Kathryn Buckheit, JoAnn Walker, Cathy Olson, and Bob Nilsson.

Author See has fashioned a fascinating coming-of-age story centered on Li-Yan, a teenage girl living in the remote Yunnan mountains of southwest China. The year is 1988, but Li-Yan's

village subsists by harvesting tea leaves for sale in the local markets. Members of the Akha ethnic minority—they live with no modern conveniences and follow the religious beliefs of their ancestors. The early chapters of the book are jarring since their lives seem closer to the Stone Age than 1988.

The author manages to incorporate many unique facets of Chinese society into Li-Yan's story, including the tea culture, China's one-child policy, Mao's Cultural Revolution, adoption of Chinese babies, and the modernization of cities and villages during this period. Li-Yan is banished from her village for having a child out of wedlock, wanders the jungles of Thailand, and escapes being stalked by a tiger. She eventually returns home and becomes educated in the tea trade.

A transformative event occurs when the local tea grown in Yunnan, known as Pu'er, becomes a hot commodity on the world market. Tea merchants arrive in droves and the Akha tribes start raking in profits hand over fist. Lin-yan becomes a celebrity as a Pu'er tea guru and starts her own business. But Lin-yan had given up her daughter for adoption when she was destitute and now is determined to use her wealth to find her.

Her journey takes her around the world, but she always returns to her Akha roots and the tea leaves that her village has always cultivated.

Her village modernizes because of their financial good fortune but the effect on their customs and beliefs is interesting to examine. Lin-yan's wealth moves her into the elite reaches of society. In that world, she takes on an Anglo name becoming known as Tina.

Characters come in and out of the story and seem to be connected by an inordinate amount of coincidence. For me, many events seemed unlikely in a country with over a billion people. The author includes epigraphs

throughout the book based on Chinese proverbs and one of them was, "No coincidence, No story!" OK, I guess if the Chinese have a proverb to cover it, I will have to accept all the coincidences. They definitely made the story more interesting.

When we met to discuss the book, it seemed appropriate to have some Pu'er tea. Unsurprisingly, the Clubhouse coffee mess was lacking that selection, but Judy Sutter came to our rescue. She brought some Pu'er for us to share, and she is now our official Tea Lady! The tea was enjoyed by all who were not afraid to be kept awake all night. It turns out Pu'er tea is very caffeinated.

The Club enjoyed the book immensely and awarded it a score of 8.62 of 10. That is our seventh highest score since 2019. We hold our meetings on the third Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse. We hold hybrid meetings, so contact me if you would like to attend virtually. My email is sikes.withers@yahoo.com.


