Thank you to all who attended the May 5 HOA meeting in-person and virtually. If you did not attend, these highlights are offered from that meeting.

President's Report—Bill Ridgway

- **Parking Lot Asphalt**: We are soliciting proposals to resurface our Clubhouse parking lots, perhaps as early as this fall. The pre-bid meeting with the contractors is scheduled for May 31.
- New Reserve Study: The Study will determine appropriate capital reserve requirements and our budget contributions for the next few years. Reserves are at approximately \$1,265,000 as of March 31. The Reserve Study this year will have more urgency and impact than previous years because new Maryland requirements allow less flexibility in funding capital reserves.
- Irrigation System Assessment: A new team is reviewing our irrigation components for ways to mitigate failure risks. In addition to possible new control devices, a longstanding consideration is whether to drill a new fifth well to replace the failed one at Bravo and Harmony.

• **Terms of Reference HOA Document**: The Board is seeking feedback from Committees to make suitable updates to this document, that defines the roles of Committees and members to support the work of the Association.

New Business Topics the Board Voted upon during the Meeting:

- Clubhouse Signs: With a goal to make monthly signage more attractive and to harmonize, a proposal from Shore Sign was recommended by the Artisan's Guild. It was unanimously approved for an amount not to exceed \$1.2K. - **2022 Draft Audit**: This document is an assessment of the Association's financial statements. The Budget and Finance Committee recommended this audit be approved as submitted by Goldklang Group CPAs, P.C. The motion passed unanimously.
- **Common Area Bluebird House Placement**: Guided by resident Bluebird expert, Pete Zerhusen, the resident at 138 Symphony Way requested a Bluebird house on a 6' metal stake be placed in a tree landscaping bed in the common area close to the putting green. The Bluebird house will be maintained by either Pete or the resident, with no maintenance nor cost to the HOA. The motion passed unanimously.
- Sweetgum Trees in Opera Court Common Area: Several homeowners on Opera Court are concerned about the Sweetgum seed pods (nicknamed 'gumballs') being a nuisance. Three trees were requested to be removed. Since common areas are the jurisdiction of the Board, a discussion and vote (with one abstention) resulted in the decision not to remove the trees. Instead, the General Manager will coordinate with the community landscaper, Level Green, to determine the cost of removing the 'gumballs' more frequently.
- Clubhouse Entrance Planters: Level Green will seasonally update the planters by the Clubhouse front doors on May 11. Since the Landscape and Irrigation Committee will not meet until May 16, the Board was asked to make the decision to keep or donate the Hinoki Cypress in the planters. The unanimously approved vote result was to allow replanting since the trees will become too large for the planters, and to donate the Hinokis to the Town of Centreville for their beautification project. Mary Colling-Officer volunteered to coordinate the donation to the Town.

Gateway System (aka the Antenna/Water Meter project): This system will be located in the Town's rightof-way in the traffic circle on Symphony Way. While the HOA maintains all traffic circles throughout Symphony Village with the same aesthetic quality as our common areas, these traffic circles are each a right-ofway belonging to the Town. The Town continues to work closely with the Board in an attempt to be transparent and to coordinate with the HOA.

You may know, the Gateway System is a Town of Centreville Public Works project designed to allow customers to view their water usage in "real time" through an online portal that graphs usage over periods of time. The System will also eliminate time-consuming manual scanning and its related input system by the Town. The Gateway System components that will be installed in the Symphony Way traffic circle are an 80' aluminum flagpole with lighting (for the flag) outfitted with a 5' antenna (an electronic device that receives low-power radio signals from curbside water meters), with a 3' x 5' electric water meter base (looking much like a green utility cabinet, the unit collects water meter data and transmits it using mobile cellular connectivity). The antenna will be utilized to keep track of pre-existing radio water meters in Symphony Village. However, it is also part of a larger project called the 'Gateway' encompassing the entire Public Works system used by the Town of Centreville. All costs of the Gateway System, including landscaping to camouflage the water meter base, along with symmetrical landscaping on the other side of the traffic circle, will be assumed by the Town.

IMPORTANT: The Gateway System (previously referred to as the Flagpole/Antenna Water Meter) does *not* emit high-powered transmissions and it will *not* support WiFi capability.

COVENANTS CORNER

Well, this has been a very busy time for Symphony Village. There have been forty Exterior Modification Forms (EMFs) submitted since April 1. Twenty modifications were roof replacements and seven involved some form of landscaping.

Landscaping has been very popular this spring season, as many homes that were built in the early stages of our community are showing signs of overgrown plants and shrubs. I must commend the residents who have submitted landscaping EMFs throughout this spring season. Most have been very prudent to check the *Recommended List* or more importantly, the *Unapproved or Maryland Invasive* lists before purchasing the plants, shrubs, and trees they planned to plant. Please continue this practice as we move through the planting season.

Perhaps some of you are asking where the lists are located? The <u>links</u> are referenced in our Architectural Requirements Document (located on our website) on page ten under the topic of Plantings. See below:

<u>Prohibited Plantings</u> in Symphony Village will follow the Maryland Department of Agriculture invasive-plantlist: <u>http://mda.maryland.gov/plants-pests/Pages/maryland_invasive_plants_prevention_and_control.aspx</u>

<u>Prohibited Trees, Ornamentals and Shrubs</u> are listed on the Symphony Village Website within the Landscape and Irrigation topic at <u>https://symphonyvillage.net/landscape-irrigation-and-trees/</u> (Just click on each icon on the page to see the database. Approved and Prohibited Trees, Ornamentals and Shrubs will be listed first; scroll down to see what is prohibited.)

<u>Approved/Recommended Plantings</u> including trees, shrubs and natives perennials are on the Symphony Village Website within the Landscaping and Irrigation section:

<u>https://symphonyvillage.net/landscape-irrigation-and-trees/</u>. Plantings of trees, shrubs, ground covers, perennials, grasses, and vines shall consider future growth, be at a reasonable distance from foundation walls and be maintained.

Some residents have submitted plants and shrubs were not on either list. Provided that your selections are within reason with regards to overall height and width dimensions, consistency with other residents' gardens, and do not infringe on the common areas adjacent to your lot, these EMFs have been generally approved by the Covenants Committee (CC). As you continue to plan your new landscaping designs and/or enhancements of existing flowerbeds, please continue your much appreciated vigilance in these areas.

By the way, regardless of what your project entails, how has your overall experience been with the EMF process? Would you like to provide feedback regarding that experience? Please keep an eye out for an invitation to do just that coming to your email inbox. A one-page questionnaire is being sent out to SV residents who have submitted EMFs from the beginning of 2022 and through April 5, 2023. Instructions of how to record and send in your responses will be included in the email blast. Please take a few moments to help the current and future members of the Covenants Committee to understand how we can improve this experience for our residents. That's it for this month. Enjoy Spring 2023 as it *finally* arrives!

A creative use for fallen twigs

Early spring often means twigs scattered around the yard. Put them to good use with this easy paper flower project for children! In addition to a nice twig, all you need is tissue paper, scissors, glue and a vase for the finished artwork.

Flowering dogwood (Cornus florida)

History

The flowering dogwood is native to much of Eastern North America, from Southern Ontario to Central Florida, and west to parts of Texas and Oklahoma. Popular since the 1700s, dogwood was planted by both Washington and Jefferson, exported to England, and gifted to Japan. It has stunning white bracts in the spring, followed by shiny red fruits that are highly attractive to birds, and beautiful red to purple autumn foliage. There are many cultivars, including those with pink bracts.

Culture

- Does best in moist, well-drained, acidic soil (pH 5.5 6.0) high in organic matter
- Prefers morning sun and afternoon shade
- Needs adequate soil moisture during dry periods because of its shallow roots

Concerns

- May be one of the first trees to show drought symptoms if not mulched and watered
- Thin bark is susceptible to lawn mower and trimmer damage
- Shallow roots compete poorly with turf
- Anthracnose, powdery mildew, root rot, and other diseases are common problems
- Stressed trees become vulnerable to borers

Bartlett Management Practices

- Expose root flares and mulch a large area around the tree to help retain moisture and prevent damage from mechanical equipment
- Fertilize according to soil analysis
- Prune disease-susceptible shoots on trunk and branches, as well as dead and dying branches
- Protect against foliar fungal diseases to reduce stress and new infections



It is wise to plan before planting a flowering dogwood.

This species can be difficult to transplant and keep healthy. Many die within a few years of planting if site conditions are poor.

OPERATIONS COMMITTEE

The Operations Committee is responsible for aiding the HOA Board of Directors (BOD) and the General Manager (GM) regarding management and operation of community common property. We share this responsibility with the Landscape and Irrigation Committee and focus on things such as the Clubhouse, swimming pools, and sidewalks.

The Operations Committee met on April 20 and received a briefing by Solitude Lake Management regarding procedures for dredging our three stormwater ponds. The ponds are divided into two parts. The main pond is protected by a forebay whose function is to filter silt to avoid overfilling the main pond basin. The forebays of our ponds may require dredging over the next couple of years. John Phelps of Solitude Lake Management provided good information on what the dredging procedure would entail. Operations will use that information in our annual inspection.

Operations also discussed a number of recent reports regarding sidewalk disruption. The committee inspects all community sidewalks each year and proposes replacement for problem areas. While SV is not governed by the American Disabilities Act (ADA), we have adopted the ADA standard of repair or replacement when a rise of ¹/₂ inch or more occurs. We also consult with an arborist when tree root invasion continues to raise the sidewalk. Cutting the roots is acceptable as long as it is not too close to the tree base. We will be inspecting recent reports of sidewalk problems this month.

Lastly, **an Audio Fetch Express** system has been installed in the Clubhouse. This system allows residents to receive audio on their Bluetooth-enabled hearing aids when using smartphones connected to the Clubhouse WiFi. Residents simply download a free app that allows them to individually adjust sound for events such as movie night. The free app automatically detects the Audio Fetch system and is fairly simple to use. We plan to schedule a demonstration for interested residents since new technology always has bugs that need to be worked out.

The next Operations meeting will be held on May 18, 2023, at 10 a.m. in the Clubhouse. The meeting will be hybrid and all residents are welcome to attend either in person or virtually.

READING FOR FUN – APRIL 2023 REVIEW

The SV Book Club met on April 18 to discuss *Letters in Time* by Susan Reiss. Attendees included: Joe Sikes, Jan Withers, Sue Goldberg, Len and Carol Saltiel, Kitty Wilson, Jim and Kathryn Buckheit, JoAnn Walker, Cathy Olson, Bob Nilsson, Mary Jo Volpicelli. Sandy Allegra and Donna Harkins. Sandy and Donna were welcomed as new additions to the club.

This month's selection is the first book in the author's *Time* series and is the first of two books by Susan Reiss that we will read in advance of a luncheon with the author. The SV Outreach Committee has invited Ms. Reiss to speak on May 17 in the Clubhouse as a fundraising event. I had an opportunity to chat with the author during a preparatory visit to SV in April.

Author Reiss described her book in terms of a recent trend in mystery writing, which combines two disparate themes in one story. In this novel, the author combines Civil War history on the Eastern Shore with a contemporary murder mystery involving Emma Chase who is a brand-new resident of St. Michaels. In this novel the connection between the two eras takes the form of some unique correspondence, hence the title *Letters in Time*. But make no mistake, this book is definitely a murder mystery. In fact, it is a double murder mystery since the author gives us a murder in both centuries.

Emma Chase relocated to Maryland's Eastern Shore to recuperate from a serious car crash and write her first novel. She inherited a quiet cottage on a saltwater creek from her beloved Uncle Jack and had spent many happy childhood summers there. It seemed the perfect place to escape her hectic big city life and start her journey as an author. The cottage sits on land that had once been a large plantation, *Waterwood*, and her Uncle Jack had left a large antique desk for her to use in her writing. The desk had belonged to the plantation manager of *Waterwood*.

So, let's get this mystery started! T.J. Dorset is a local farmer who resides in the original *Waterwood* plantation house and has been hired to provide transportation for Emma while she completes her physical therapy. Shortly after settling in, Emma is visited by the local sheriff who reports that a teenager had been found dead on land just across the creek from the cottage. The sheriff wonders if Emma heard or saw anything from her porch and left his card. So, a killer is roaming the area.

Emma is thrilled with the plantation desk, that had been in storage, but is now set up in the cottage so she can start writing. After her first night's sleep, Emma hobbles downstairs to the desk to find a mysterious handwritten letter addressed to *Emma* and signed by *Daniel. Daniel* wonders why Emma hasn't written. Emma is mystified since there are no Daniels on her contact list. She starts writing back just to keep Daniel happy by taking on the persona of this unknown Emma. She avidly researches the *Waterwood* plantation history to discover the identities of these two Civil War lovers.

Back in the present, it turns out the teenager's death was not accidental, so there is a murderer on the loose. Emma is living alone in her remote cottage with only T.J. nearby with his trusty dog, Ghost (really?). Stories of buried treasure emerge and lead to solving the current murder. Emma eventually discovers the true story behind the two lovers and continues to ghostwrite as Emma, leading to uncovering the nature of Daniel's demise. Did I really write that?

In any case, the author keeps us turning the pages and gives us interesting background on the Eastern Shore during the Civil War. She also finds a clever way to reunite the two lovers to tie the story up in a neat bow. And she sets up her *Time* series nicely so we can continue to revisit her characters as we read *Messages in Time* for next month. The Book Club enjoyed this mystery, and we look forward to meeting Susan Reiss on May 17 at the Outreach luncheon.
