At our Annual Meeting, the Association elected new board members Dave Mason, Steve Nelson, and Carol Peed, who join current members Nancy Emerick and Janet Leister. The following report was prepared for that meeting.

President's Report for the Annual Meeting on December 6, 2023

Welcome to our 2023 Annual Meeting. Thanks to my fellow residents for your attention, committee members for their impressive work this year and my fellow HOA members for their time and dedication to the community. We are also fortunate to have a very capable management team from ProCom with Rebecca, Julia and Nick working on site.

Our community and Association benefit tremendously from the initiative and leadership of committee members as well as neighbors who serve in other ways. You help the HOA manage facilities while keeping costs in line. You enhance our quality of life by planning events that bring us together as well as offering us opportunities to serve charitable causes in our community. All our committees need your support, and we urge you to volunteer to join them next year.

To recap the past year, we remain well within our current budget and in a position to go forward into 2024 with no fee increases. We have transitioned all invested Certificates of Deposit and Money Market Funds to Fidelity

Investments. We were recently reimbursed by the Town of Centreville for a 2018 EDU payment (\$12,369.60) made to secure a permit for the Clubhouse expansion project.

We completed an updated reserve study by Miller Dodson. Operations also led us in completing major infrastructure projects, including parking lot asphalt resurfacing with curbing and drain repairs, replacement of about 140 damaged sidewalk blocks, and stormwater pond inlet restoration. We added and replaced fitness equipment and made incremental improvements to our Concert Hall audio system.

Landscape and Irrigation initiatives included a completed vegetative buffer garden with grant funding by the Chesapeake Bay Trust, new plantings along Bravo Boulevard, major tree pruning, and irrigation system upgrades -- some completed with some in progress.

We also responded to unplanned facility maintenance issues including failure and replacement of the indoor pool evaporation coil, water leaks above the gym ceiling and elsewhere, and recurring maintenance issues with the Clubhouse fire suppression sprinkler system.

Some tasks were not finished by this Board and remain worthy of consideration in the next year. We did not complete updates to the Terms of Reference document, or an Architectural Requirements review. It may be in the Association's interest next year to get rebids on the larger maintenance contracts and revisit the topic of third-party residential inspections. Finally, turf maintenance always has its challenges, but it has been difficult to find a cost-effective solution for swale areas with advanced turf erosion.

We welcome the participation of our talented residents with our new Board to lead us forward. Thanks for the opportunity to be of service.

LANDSCAPE AND IRRIGATION—AUTUMN ACTION

THE WINTER GARDEN



The start of a New Year brings incentives to rethink or resolve. So....it's never too early to think ahead and plan any additions/changes in your garden. It's important to know what annuals, perennials, shrubs, etc. are best for each growing season (spring, summer, and fall). But, what about winter??

Even though most all flora are dormant in winter, there are many opportunities to provide eye-catching beauty to your yard, even when snow covered. Some plants bloom in winter, like **Lenten rose** (*Hellebores orientalis*) with multi-colored blooms. A drab winter landscape will brighten with the **twig dogwood** (*Cornus sericea*) after the leaves have fallen, leaving red, orange, or yellow stems. Winter jasmine (*Jasminum nudiflorum*) reminds you of forsythia with its splash of yellow blossoms along the stems. The native witch hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*) will show orange/copper flowers in winter.



Other winter interest favorites are the dried flower seed heads of purple coneflower (Echinacea




purpurea), hydrangea, and black-eyed susan (Rudbeckia hirta). Ornamental grasses like little bluestem (Schizachyrium scoparium), switchgrass (Panicum virgatum), and Japanese forest grass (Hakonechloa macra) provide graceful movement in the yard on those breezy days. Some grasses (like sedges) and ferns are evergreen throughout the coldest months.

Finally, why not brighten up a barren corner of

the yard with native berry-producing shrubs like beautyberry (*Callicarpa americana*), winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*), or chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*) which produce purple or red berries, welcomed by local avian winter residents. One SV resident has a beautiful winterberry shrub that "pops" in their rain garden.

The winter garden can have amazing powers of rejuvenation and serve to energize those gray, chilly days from late November through March. It's sure cure for those "winter blahs."



The Operations Committee is responsible for aiding the HOA Board of Directors (BOD) and the General Manager (GM) regarding management and operation of community common property. We share this responsibility with the Landscape and Irrigation Committee and focus on such things as the Clubhouse, swimming pools, and sidewalks.

The Operations Committee has completed a very busy year including major sidewalk and parking lot projects. Just this month the compressor for the fire suppression system died and my operations team, the plumbers, worked closely with the General Manager to find the best solution. This compressor is well known to residents since it noisily kicks on in the Card Room on 2 - 3 minute intervals. We are hoping the new system will come on less frequently with a reduced noise level. We are also looking at ways to add sound attenuation in the pump room.

The Committee is also looking forward to using funding for neighborhood benches in the 2024 SV budget. In anticipation, we have started to research benches, similar to those near the tennis courts. We hope to propose a purchase following our January meeting.

There is no Operations meeting in December as we close out the year and await BOD turnover. We will meet at **10 a.m. on Thursday, January 18**, to elect officers and kick off 2024. As usual, the meeting will be hybrid and all residents are welcome to attend either in person or virtually.

Winter Weather on Maryland's Eastern Shore

The Eastern Shore of Maryland experiences a complex interaction of atmospheric forces, geographic features, and coastal dynamics during the winter season. Understanding these interconnected phenomena enhances our appreciation of both the beauty and challenges



that accompany this time of year. Furthermore, it empowers us to proactively prepare for and effectively respond to winter weather events. Average winter weather conditions in Queen Anne's County are shown in the following table:

Queen Anne's County Weather Averages


Located between the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, the Eastern Shore often experiences a milder winter climate compared to the state's western regions. This is primarily due to the moderating influence of the Chesapeake Bay, which acts as a massive heat reservoir, releasing warmth into the atmosphere during the colder months.

The jet stream, a ribbon of strong winds encircling the globe, dictates the winter weather patterns on the Eastern Shore. When it dips southward, it brings frigid Arctic air masses and periods of icy temperatures and snowfall. Conversely, a northward shift of the jet stream delivers milder air, resulting in warmer winter days and occasional snowmelt.

Winter storms, often accompanied by heavy precipitation and strong winds, can significantly impact the Eastern Shore. As cold air masses from the north encounter warm, moist air over the Atlantic Ocean, powerful storms can develop, bringing rain, snow, and coastal flooding. These storms can disrupt transportation, damage

infrastructure, and pose threats to coastal communities.

Winter on Maryland's Eastern Shore is a unique blend of coastal and continental influences, resulting in a distinct weather pattern, and by understanding the interplay of these influences, we gain a deeper appreciation for the region's unique winter climate. This knowledge empowers us to prepare for and respond effectively to winter weather events.

The Institute for Adult Learning (IAL), a nonprofit organization whose mission is to provide learning experiences and social events which enrich the lives of the age 50+ community in the Mid-Shore area, will hold a Showcase of Classes for the Spring 2024 semester on Saturday, January 6, at the Kennard Cultural Center, located at 410 Little Kidwell Avenue, Centreville, MD. Doors will open at 1:30 p.m., and the program will begin at 2 p.m.

The Showcase will provide an overview of over 40 courses to be offered during the spring semester (February 5 - May 15) in categories such as history and current events, brain, body and soul, environment and science, literature, arts and crafts, and culinary arts. All classes are held during the day, Monday through Friday, and range from one to six sessions. On Friday, December 15, the IAL website will be updated with class descriptions for the spring 2024 semester.

The decor was inviting and the staff friendly and attentive. We started with two appetizers that were to die for: Eggplant Rustica....a tower of crispy, fried eggplant, mozzarella cheese, and sliced tomatoes sitting on a bed of delicious marinara sauce with a balsamic vinegar reduction. The other appetizer was two crispy fried



mozzarella balls with a pesto sauce on top and a balsamic reduction sitting on a bed of that wonderful marinara sauce.

For those who enjoy a fine wine, the wine list was extensive.

The main courses were every bit as yummy as the appetizers: Chicken Toscana with Tuscan beans, Italian sausage, rosemary and spinach in a delightful sauce



and Chicken Parmigiana, made to order by Chef Anthony...replacing the bread crumbs with Parmesan cheese, light and luscious and served with your choice of pasta.
